

# Wolverine men's 4th straight championship; women's 3rd

LINDA — Sierra College dominated both the men's and women's divisions to run away with the Bay Valley Conference track championships on Saturday afternoon.

The Wolverine men won the title for the fourth straight season by posting a score of 202. Other scores were Contra Costa 155, host Yuba College 112, Merritt 95, Solano 20, Marin 15, Cosumnes 1 and Alameda 0.

The Sierra women took the

championship for the third consecutive year by amassing 219 points. Other results were Yuba 71, Contra Costa 32, Solano 26, Cosumnes 18, Alameda 2, Marin 0.

The women, fresh from winning the small schools state title last weekend, were expected to dominate the league meet. The men, though, were a bit of a surprise.

"On paper, Contra Costa looked unbeatable," Sierra College coach Wayne Barbee said. "We went into the meet scared. That prob-

ably was a good thing."

Sierra advances to the NorCals Friday in Fresno.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, Greg Neumann will compete in the NorCals decathlon at Shasta College. Barbee expects Neuman to eventually finish in the top five statewide.

"He's a good solid athlete who is willing to work extremely hard," Barbee said. "That's the key to success as a decathlete."

In Saturday's BVC championships, Neumann was first in the long jump, 21-feet, 6-inches; first

in the pole vault, 14 feet; fourth in the javelin, 160-2; fifth in the high jump, 5-8; third in the 110 high hurdles, 15.1; fifth in the shot put, 44-2; and third in the discus, 137.

Neumann is a freshman who attended high school in West Germany.

In other men's results Steve Abandonato won the hammer, 166-4; Randy Neitzke was second, 153-8; Brett Zimmerman third, 147-2; Jason Lamontagne fourth, 135-4; and Jason Darby, 125-6.

Pat Donnelly won the 10,000 meters, 33:28.5, finished second in the 5,000, 16:09.2, and won the

1,500 meters, 4:03.2; Matt Trengoning was first in the 3,000 meter steeplechase, 9:49.4, third in the 1,500, 16:20, and third in the 10,000, 34:08.07. Weind was third in the steeplechase, 10:30.3 and fourth in the 1,500, 16:27.6, while Steve Chapman was fifth, 13:13.49.

Adam Weston won the javelin, 196-2, while Zimmerman was fifth, 136-4.

Paul Berger placed first in the high jump, 6-6; Chapman was fourth in the 400, 61.3; and Jeff Hunt fifth in the 400, 63.9.

Adandonato took the discus, 148-11; Neitzke second, 138-2; and Lamontagne sixth, 121-6.

Neitzke also had a sixth in the shot, 42-1, while Steve Reed was third in the triple jump, 45- $\frac{1}{4}$ .

**WOMEN'S RESULTS** — In the discus, Lorraine Seiler was first, 145-9; Julie Wood second, 134-5; Billie Mills third, 121-7; and Ann Kiszke 114-11. Wood was third in the javelin, 99-7. Seiler took the discus, 41-10; Julie Reader was second, 35-11; Mills fourth, 33-6; and Wood sixth 33.

Stella Romo won the 5,000 meters, 20:42.8, and 3,000, 11:48 and placed second in the 1,500, 5:06.18; while Sue Colley won the 800, 2:27.6, and the 1,500, 5:04.5, 2:27.6. Danielle Bonebreak was fourth in the 1,500, 6:38.5, and second in the 3,000, 14:20.5.

Debbie McGuigan took the 200 meters, 26.1, was third in the 400, 59.0; while Heidi Udoffia was first in the 400, 58.5, and second in the

200, 26.4. Shelly Gavranich was second in the triple jump, 31-9 and third in the long jump, 13-11¼ ; Sandy Souza third in the 110 hurdles, 18.7, and third in the 400 hurdles, 1:16.9; Delane Christensen was second in the 400 hurdles, 1:15-4; and Angie

McCain was first in the high jump, 5-1½ .

The 400 meter relay team (Jill Killinger, Gavranich, McGuigan, Udoffia,) was first at 51.3 and the 1600 relay (Killinger, Colley, McGuigan, Udoffia) was second at 4:14.
