Memorial Stadium, Lincoln—Missouri's well-balanced track and field team ran away with its second straight Big Seven outdoor title Saturday.

But Coach Tom Botts's Tigers didn't hog all the glory. They had to share the cheers of seven thousand fans with three athletes from rival schools.

Big Rollin Prather of Kansas State, swift Henry Meginnis of Nebraska and Bob Karnes of

the meet. He was fourth in the 100.

Karnes became the first runner to sweep the outdoor mile and two-mile titles since Peerless Glenn Cunningham did it in 1933 and 1934.

He was pushed in the mile by Bob Bosworth of Mizzou, but ran away from Colorado's George Fitzmorris in the final 100 yards of the longer race.

Husker disappointments were Vaulter Don Cooper of York and Half-Miler Harold Kopf of Lexington. Both were troubled by injuries which have handicapped them during most of the outdoor season.

Cooper shared second place at 13 feet 3 3/4 inches, as Warren Bateman of Colorado won at 13-7.

Scotfield Repeats

Kopf led the first lap against a fancy 880 field, but faded to third by the final turn. Then he pulled up lame in the last 40 yards and failed to place.

Last year's winner of the Schulte award, Tom Scotfield of Kansas, retained his high jump honors. But he was more than three inches under his record leap of last year.

So the huge trophy will be passed over to Kansas State for the coming year, while Prather gains permanent possession of a Henry F. Schulte plaque. Summaries:

Gregg Predicts Finish

For the second consecutive year, Gregg McBride of The World-Herald sports staff correctly tabbed the order of finish in the Big Seven Outdoor Track Championships.

Kansas each captured two individual championships.

The Mizzou point total of 143 was 15 less than last year's output. In landing second, Coach Ed Weir's Huskers totaled 93, two points better than a year ago.

Schulte Award to Prather

Kansas won a four-way battle for third place with 67 1/2 points, to 59 for Kansas State, 48 1/2 for Colorado, and 40 1/2 for Oklahoma. Iowa State trailed with 12.

Conference coaches voted The World-Herald's Henry F. Schulte Memorial Award to Prather, 220-pound weight man.

The 21-year-old sophomore from Eureka, Kans., set a shotput record with a heave of 53 feet 2 1/2 inches. That bettered Bill Bangert's old mark by seven inches.

Rollin doubled in the discus, beating Tiger Mel Sheehan by seven feet, but falling more than three feet short of the record held by Nebraska's Edsel Wibbels.

Only other records to fall were in the hurdles, where two Missouri timper-toppers broke long-standing marks.

Madill (Bud) Gartiser whipped over the highs in :14.2 to cut three-tenths of a second off the time set by Iowa State's Bob Hager back in 1931.

Then Gartiser pushed Teammate Richard Ault to a new mark of :23.3 in the lows. This was a tenth better than Heye Lambertus's time for Nebraska in 1935.

Meginnis Wins Dashes

The Husker fans had a chance to applaud only one of their own as a champion—Harry Meginnis.

He led Dick Hutton by two strides in a 10-flat 100-yard dash, then had about the same margin over the Auburn boy in a 220 in :21.7. Harry was sixth in the broad jump, to be the meet's high man with 21 points.

Alan Thompson from Omaha Central placed third in the furlong to give Nebraska the only one-two-three accomplishment of
