Oklahoma's Price carried away the broad jump championship for the third straight year with a conference record breaking leap of 25 feet ¾ inch. It broke his 24 feet, 11¼ inch mark of last year.

Frank Cindrich of Kansas clipped one-tenth of a second off the conference record by running the 440-yard dash in 47.9 seconds. The old mark was set in 1942 by Bill Lyda of Oklahoma.

Santee withdrew from the half mile run Saturday to permit his teammate, Lloyd Koby, to win his first Big Seven conference championship. Koby, a senior, has been utdistanced by Santee in their last two Big Seven meets. Santee ran the half mile in 1:51.8 in Friday's preliminaries. Koby's winning time today was 1:53.8.
