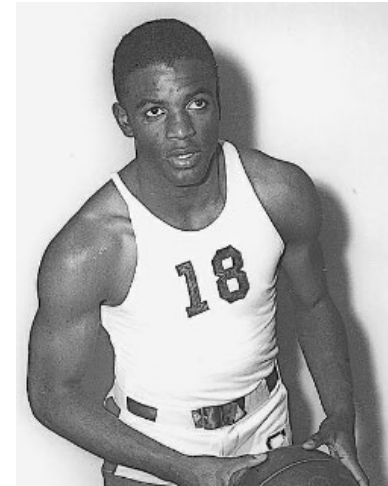
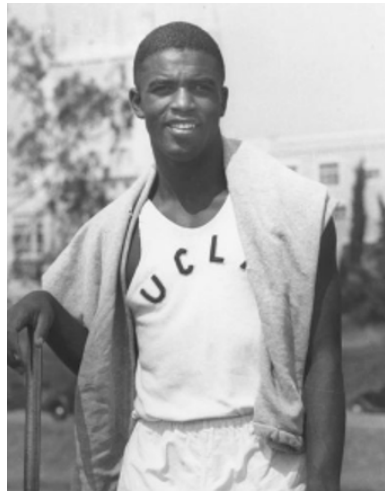


JACKIE ROBINSON

Baseball

- 1945 played with Kansas City Monarchs in Negro Leagues
- 1945 East-West All-Star Game
- Fall 1945 signed with Montreal Royals for 1946 season by Branch Rickey to integrate organized baseball
- Played 124 games in 1946 with Montreal (International League) and batted .349
- April 15, 1947 integrated major league baseball with the Brooklyn Dodgers
- Since 2004 Major League Baseball has celebrated April 15 as Jackie Robinson Day
- Major League Baseball Hall of Fame (inducted 1962)
- 1947 MLB Rookie of Year
- 1949 National League Most Valuable Player
- Played in six All-Star Games, 1949-54
- Played in six World Series
- Career: 11 years with Brooklyn Dodgers, 1947-56, 1416 games and batted .313

Miscellaneous

- Congressional Medal of Honor (presented posthumously)
- Presidential Medal of Freedom (present posthumously)
- NAACP Board of Directors
- Founded Freedom Bank in Harlem and served as bank's first Chairman of Board
- Established Jackie Robinson Construction Company to build low income housing
- Baseball diamond in Pasadena's Brookside Park named Jackie Robinson Field
- Depicted in a number of major movies including The Jack Robinson Story in 1950 & 42 in 2013
- More than a dozen fields, stadiums across country named in his honor
