# Arizona Second, Tech Third and Lobos Are Fourth

Four new records were established on Zimmerman Field Saturday afternoon as Arizona State College at Tempe won the Border Conference track championship for the third successive year.

The records that fell were in the 440-yard dash, shot put, discus throw and broad jump.

Tempe won by a handy margin of 12 1-2 points over its nearest competitor, the University of Arizona, 53 1-2 to 43. Texas Tech was third with 24 1-2 and the University of New Mexico fourth with 22 1-2.

Texas Mines scored seven points and Arizona State at Flagstaff picked up 2 1-2. New Mexico A. & M. Hardin-Simmons and West Texas State failed to score.

The first record to fall was in the 440, second running event of the program. Bob McCrea of Arizona passed Costin Buffkin of Tech in the last 100 yards and hit the tape at 49.3 seconds. He broke the record of 49.6, established only a year ago by Cecil Crouch of Arizona, who is not on the team this season. McCullah of Tempe also edged in ahead of Buffkin in the stretch drive to take second place.

Another year-old record bit the dust when Parker Gregg of Arizona hurled the discus 148 feet 1 5-8 inches. It was his own record of 146 feet seven inches that Gregg shattered.

The oldest record to topple was in the broad jump, last event to be completed. George Diggs, Tempe Negro athlete, leaped 24 feet 1 7-8 inches for that one. The mark that he beat was set back in 1937 by Robert Lister of New Mexico. It was 24 feet 1 1-4 inches.

## Shot Goes Farther

John Payne of Tempe hung up a new figure for the shot put when he shoved the sphere 47 feet 8 15-16 inches. The old one was 47 feet 7 1-4 inches, set by Walter Nielsen of Arizona in 1939.

Ed Clepper of Texas Tech was the individual scorer with 14 points. He won both the high hurdles and high jump, finishing third in the low hurdles and third in the broad jump.

Jack Campbell of Tempe ranked second with 10. George Howard of Arizona and Don Hildreth of Tempe tied at eight points.

Arizona did just as well as Tempe in capturing first places. Each grabbed five. But the Sun Devils had too much depth for the university team. The only two events in which Tempe failed to score a point were the two-mile run and the discus throw. Arizona was shut out of the shot put, 880, high jump and low hurdles.

## Watson Wins Two-Mile

New Mexico registered its only first in the two-mile. Clarence Watson took the lead early in the race and held it steadily. He never was pressed in the last two laps.

Tech took three firsts and the remaining one of the 15 on the program went to Texas Mines, whose L. Montoya won the mile race with Spence Devitt of New Mexico a good second. Bill Watson of Tempe, who set the current record of 4:28.4 last year on his home track, led the field into the home stretch this time, but had nothing left for the finishing drive and collapsed as he crossed the line in third place.

Fast times were recorded in several races besides the 440.

The high hurdle time was only a tenth of a second off the record. The 220-dash was three-tenths over, the 100 two-tenths over, the mile relay one-tenth over.

Buffkin took the lead for Texas Tech on the first lap of the relay and his team mates held it through the second and third laps and around the last turn of the fourth lap. But as the anchor men straightened out for the final dash to the tape McCrea of Arizona leaped ahead of Charley Reynolds of Tech and McCullah of Tempe also caught and passed Reynolds just before he reached the finish line.
