

SIX SCHOOLS TO BE ENTERED HERE THIS SATURDAY AT TRACK

ACCORDING to figures given out yesterday by Coach P. M. Bliss, the Central Conference meet which is to be held here Saturday will be one of the largest jaysee meets in the state. Seventy-seven athletes are entered from the six schools competing. It is predicted that Bakersfield Junior College will have a real battle overcoming its expected loss of points in certain field events and in the sprints.

The workout held last evening by Coach Bliss was the last one which he will give his charges. The team looked to be in good shape, he said. There have been no serious accidents with the Renegades this season. Despite the small turnout earlier in the spring, Bliss has developed what is considered to be a simon-pure outfit with no deadwood.

The strongest competitor Bakersfield is expected to meet Saturday is Taft Jaysee. This team will come here 21 strong, their full force. This is a larger entry than any of the other competing schools and is known to be of first-class material in every event. In the first meet in which the Renegades met Taft Jaysee, the Cougars won by a margin of three points. In the most recent track fracas between these two rivals, they drew a tie on points.

Brutus Hamilton, Bruin track mentor who developed Glenn Cunningham, will referee the junior collegiate meet to be held here Saturday. Although his chief bid for fame lies in his ability to develop great track men, he has achieved prominence in the refereeing of athletic events.

Coach Hamilton has signified his intention to oversee every event from the opening preliminaries to the closing clashes of the day.

IN THE valley jaysee record-breaking spree held here Saturday evening, Bakersfield Junior College won with 49 2-5 points. Its nearest rival for points was Taft Taysee with 42 9-20. All but three of the valley records were smashed into bits. The opening event cast before it a promise of what was to come when Throop of Taft ran the mile in 4:37.6. The record was formerly 4:45.8, held by Livingston. From then on, the meet proceeded to become a record-breaker's paradise.

Quarter-Mile Duel

One of the most thrilling races of the evening was the quarter-mile duel between Stave of Taft and McCall of Bakersfield. Stave, former half-miler from Hoover High School in Glendale, was abreast with McCall during the entire lap, but the latter finished by a nose. Clocked at 51.9, McCall set a new 440 mark, held formerly by Sickles of Porterville with a time of 52.1.

It was the same story in the 120-yard high hurdles. Bill Benton broke the tape, leading his nearest hurdle rival by six feet. He was timed in 15.6. Johnson of Porterville held the record with a time of 16.4.

Morton's Good Race

Morton of Bakersfield, not to be outdone in this matter of record-breaking, ran the half-mile in 2:04. He was followed closely by Stave.

Although he had already set a new precedent in the mile run, Throop of Taft won a grueling two-mile race in 10:25.8. The record in this event was held formerly by Livingston of Taft, time, 10:51.0.

Make 220-Record

Crossing the 220-yard low sticks like a couple of express trains on the loose, Riordan, of Taft, and Benton, of Bakersfield, finished in a brilliant tie. They were clocked at 25.9 to break the record of 26 flat, held by Richardson, of Visalia.

Bakersfield won a wild relay amidst the music of a stadium of fans apparently trying to rupture some fine sets of lungs. The Renegades were timed at 3:31.1. The former time was 3:36.8 and was held by Porterville.

Adams Wins Javelin

Despite the fact that the javelin is supposed to be Triguero's own special event, it was taken over by the masterful Adams, of Visalia, who flung the spear 176 feet 3 inches. A mark of 166 feet 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, made by Denning, of Taft, was formerly recognized as the best.

Triguero, although he broke the meet record with a leap of 11 feet 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches, was far below his best which is 12 feet 6 inches. The record in this event was 11 feet, 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ inches, held by Van Osdel, of Bakersfield.

Wall saw fit to tumble the shot and discus records into the dust of Griffith Field. He shoved the ball out 43 feet 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches to better the record of 42 feet 1 inch made by York, of Taft. His discus throw measured 132 feet 4 inches. Roe's, of Bakersfield, of 129 feet $\frac{1}{4}$ inch was once considered the best in the platter event.
