

# CHAMP MAKES 125 YARDS IN TWELVE FLAT

## Cedar Rapids Sets American Mark in Quarter.

A world's record almost hoary with age was smashed at the Drake stadium yesterday when Charles Faddock, the world's fastest human, ran the 125-yard dash in 1:11 flat in the feature event of the Drake relay, cutting four-tenths of a second from the mark set thirty-two years ago by Charles H. Sherrill of Yale.

Pared by Young of Drake and Keanigbaum and Phelps of Iowa, each of whom had been given a handicap of four yards, the Cedar Rapids flyer thundered down the Drake track faster than any other man in athletic history ever has run the distance.

Faddock got off to a perfect start and passed his three rivals at the seventy-five yard mark. He crashed into the tape in full stride instead of slipping into the wire as in his custom.

### Record Should Stand.

Faddock's performance yesterday will in all probability be accepted as an official world's record for the distance. The track was surveyed prior to the race by Luke Higgins, Des Moines civil engineer, and was again measured after the race by Isaac Neff, another local engineer.

The official timers were men of twenty years or more experience. Two of them caught Faddock in 1:11 flat while the third clocked the champion in 1:11 1/16. Two other timers also caught Faddock in 1:11 1/16. Fredric H. Yost, veteran referee of the meet said after the race the official timers were Dr. Channing G. Smith of Chicago, Ia.; Harry H. Stipp, a Harvard man with a practicing diploma in the States, and William H. Jagger of Minneapolis, president of the M. & St. L. railway.

After breaching the four-yard handicap given his pursuers, Faddock continued to gain with every stride and was leading Young of Drake by about three yards at the tape. He rounded the left side of his feet and his stride under full speed measured about twenty feet.

### Faddock Runs Hundred.

Later in the afternoon Faddock ran a second race, this time running the 100-yard dash. He was clocked in 1:05 5/16. As he struck the tape Faddock left the judges that there was little need of timing him as he felt that the time was slow. In his opinion to avoid beating the gun as he did in Friday's race, Faddock got away to a slow start and jockeyed down the course he stepped into a slight depression in the track which slowed him a trifle, he said.

Faddock's mark in the 125-yard dash is his best world's record. In 1911 he was ranked as the old time holder of this mark but that record was shattered by the late runner who had set the record at the same time. He was here yesterday but authorities refused to recognize the record as he had set it for the distance on the same race.

A new American international record and three more Drake relay marks were broken in yesterday's competition. Cedar Rapids High school, with Knapp, Potts, Loftis and Child running in the order named, set more than a second off the former national record in the 440-yard relay, established by the University High school team of Chicago in 1918. The Cedar Rapids team covered the distance in 4:15 4/16 yesterday, while the former mark was 4:16 4/16.

### More Records Fall.

Drake relay records were broken in the straight, pole vault and two-mile college relay. Parma, Kansas State Teachers college of Pittsburg, Kan., shattered the straight record established yesterday by Harman of Nebraska, with a mark of 41 feet 3 3/4 inches.

Arkans, Kansas State Teachers college of Emporia, broke the pole vault record with a leap of 17 feet, bettering the former record of 12 feet 10 inches set in 1911 by Brownell of Illinois. After qualifying for the finals in this event Friday, Brownell was forced to withdraw from the pole vault because of an injury to his shoulder and was unable to defend his record.

The Mansfield college team, composed of Cline, Holt, Ninkovik and Goodwin, set a new Drake relay record in the two-mile college relay by covering the distance in 8:16 3/16. The former record was 8:18 4/16, established last year by the same school. Six other Drake relay records were established in Friday's competition.

One of the events of Saturday's program was the debut in the patriotic game of Simon Legree of the University of Illinois, national champion in this event. Legree, who set the world record of 1:00 and 1/16 in 1922 and was American champion in 1923, was forced to take third place in yesterday's event.

### Legree Takes Third.
