

Illini Race Off with Honors at Drake Relays

Two World Records

FERRELL, Cal., April 28.—(Special.)—Two track and field marks, if allowed, will go down as world records, were set at the Drake day relay carnival today. John Kuck, formerly of Kansas State Teachers' college, now wearing colors of Los Angeles A. C., bettered Ralph Howe's record in the shot put. Kuck pushed the lead ball 51 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inch. Howe's old world mark, made in 1908, was 51 feet.

Leo Barnes, captain of the University of Northern California team, pole vaulted 14 feet 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches, to better the mark of Carr of Yale by $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

Des Moines, Ia., April 28.—Winning three major races and finishing second in two others, Illinois carried off the honors in the sixteenth annual Drake relays today before 14,000, the largest gathering that ever has witnessed this athletic classic.

The Orange and Blue won the distance medley here yesterday. Today the Blue won the university two mile and four mile relays. They finished second in the quarter mile and half mile sprint relays. In some of the events, however, did Illinois smash records, but its time in the medley will stand as a Drake mark, as it was the first time this event has been on the program.

Illinois Gives Battle.

Illinois was challenged in the four mile by a gritty Indiana quartet. The Hoosiers held the lead until some of Illinois took the baton on the third relay. Fields, the last Indiana runner, gave Abbott, the anchor runner for Illinois, a battle. Fields moved into the lead on the third lap, but Abbott passed him on the backstretch of the last round and won by four yards.

It was the final event, the one mile university relay, that furnished the thrill of the meet. Northwestern, which defeated Iowa at the Kansas relays a week ago, was out to repeat the achievement. Stevenson, the first Iowa runner, turned over a two yard lead to Stanton, his teammate. Baird increased the margin to five yards on the third relay. Northwestern was eight yards back. Walter took the baton for Northwestern and O'Neil for Iowa.

The Purple athletes moved into second place on the backstretch and challenged O'Neil. He drew up as they rounded the final turn, but the Iowa captain had too much in reserve and sped over the line three yards ahead of the Northwestern fleet. Iowa's time for the distance was 1:55.14.

Iowa Wins Two Relays.

Iowa was second in the honor list of university relays. The Hawkeyes won the 440 yard event with the same team that won the mile.

Northwestern captured the 330 yard relay. The Purple team, which had Walter as anchor runner and Hermann as the team, won its section easily. This race, like several others, was decided in heats and time comparisons determined the place winners.

Weather conditions were not favorable for record breaking performances. A strong wind blew from the south which handicapped the sprinters and hurdlers. Despite this handicap, one mark went by the boards.

Walter White of the Kansas State Teachers' college of Pittsburgh got the shot 48 feet 8 inches. This shattered the old record of 48 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inches made by John Kuck of Kansas State Teachers' college of Emporia in 1918.

Elder Outpaces Heiser.

In the individual events, Jack Elder of Notre Dame further demonstrated his claim to a place on the American Olympic team by winning the 170 yard dash by six inches from Heiser of Michigan in 20 seconds. He bucked a strong wind all the way.

Harold Trumble of Nebraska, developed by Henry Schultz, who will be a member of the coaching staff of the American Olympic team, won the 120 yard high hurdles in 1:11.4, another creditable performance considering the wind.

Martin of William and Jewell won the running hop, step and jump with an effort of 47 feet 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches and Shelby of Oklahoma took the running high jump with a leap of 8 feet 1 inch. Walden of Graceland college of Iowa won the javelin with a hurl of 128 feet, two feet further than Hartman of Allen. The pole vault resulted in a four way tie among Barnes of Illinois, Glaser of Marquette, Ross of Minnesota, and Dreyer of Northwestern. All cleared 22 feet 10 inches. Kets of Michigan tossed the hammer 114.2 feet to win the event.

Dart of Northwestern and O'Neil of Ohio State tied for second place with marks of 112 feet 8 inches.

Before the first event, Marjorie East of Simpson college was crowned queen of the relay carnival and Minnie Hanson of Nevada, princess. This morning a parade was held through the down state district and nearly fifty bands, floats and marching delegations from all parts of Iowa took part.
