

PURPLE STAR FAILS TO SET WORLD MARK

Seven More Drake Re- lay Records Are Shattered.

Renewing the sensational assault which sent seven meet records toppling into the discard Friday in the opening day of competition, a brilliant array of athletes added seven more new marks to their achievements here Saturday and sent the twenty-first annual Drake relays winging into history with a total of fourteen new meet records to be entered in the books.

Of all the tense moments in the program of thrills, the most breath taking of all was provided by Tom Warne of Northwestern university, who grazed the sky to raise the pole vault record to 13 feet 11 inches. Then, after that sensational accomplishment, Warne had the bar raised to 14 feet 2 inches in an effort to better the world's record for the vault.

Adds Six Inches to Mark.

Thirteen thousand hearts stood still while Warne came thundering down the runway on the last of his three attempts to clear the crossbar at the unprecedented height. Thirteen thousand spectators were breathless when Warne jammed his pole into the box and left the ground on his climb into the ozone. Then, from 13,000 throats broke a cheer which turned immediately into a groan when Warne, his body well over the bar at 14 feet, 2 inches, knocked the crossbar from its mooring with one arm in his descent and failed in his effort to break the world's record.

Warne bettered by nearly six inches the former Drake relay record for the pole vault. His

Wilkinson Sets New Record in Eastern Boat Race

NEW YORK (AP)—The broncho busters of the waves, gleefully clinging to their wooden cockleshells at 49 miles an hour speeds, staged their third annual outboard motor dash from Albany to New York Saturday and for the third time turned up a new champion and a new record for the 13 1/2 mile course.

J. E. Wilkinson, 22-year-old professional from Boston, roared down the river under nearly perfect conditions in his Orange "Flash" to win first place by a comfortable margin over Frank James Toronto amateur, who finished second. Wilkinson bounced over the distance in 2 hours 28 minutes 32 seconds after the start where a balky motor delayed him thirty minutes.

All of the first three finishers broke the record of 3 hours 38 minutes 40 seconds set by Jacob Donnell of Philadelphia, in last year's run. James was clocked in 3 hours 29 minutes 28 seconds and Harry Johnson, New Haven, Conn., professional, took third place in 3 hours 24 minutes 28 seconds.

Bill Tilden to Invade Italy Today With Medals

MONTE CARLO (AP)—Bill Tilden is leaving for Italy Sunday with a bagful of prizes such as no other player, not even Suzanne Lenglen or Helen Wills, ever collected in a single season's play. The American champion has won thirteen tournaments, lost one and divided one. In addition he has won eleven in doubles paired with his countryman, Wilbur F. Cox, Jr. and won two and lost two paired with C. H. Kingsley of England, and won nine in mixed doubles with various partners.
