

DRIZZLE HOLDS METCALFE TO :09.7 IN DASH

Pittsburg and Emporia Run Dead Heat in Mile Relay.

The annual revision of the Drake relay record book was started here Saturday night when the closing program of the big track classic saw seven more new records established in spite of a wet track, intermittent showers and an overcast sky.

Into the ledger of greatest performances gone are new university relay record, two new college relay marks, one new standard in the special events and three new records for Class A high schools. Nine meet records fell during the two day bombardment.

To the Blue.

To the University of Illinois goes the distinction of lowering the university 440-yard relay mark. Speed and fearless passing of the blues brought Carrell, Christiansen, Kunkelott and Hellmich of Illinois around the track in 41.6 seconds to better the former record of 41.7 set by another Illinois team in 1926.

Node Hildinger, heavy Indiana hammer thrower, let loose a throw of 151 feet, 4-9-10 inches to break the record with the 16-pound weight. Hildinger's mark was made in the last hammer throw event to be included in the relays, as the event will be discontinued in the future. He added nearly four feet to the former mark.

Spectacular Finish.

In one of the most spectacular finishes ever seen in the Drake games, the Kansas State Teachers college teams of Pittsburg and Emporia collaborated to establish a joint record in the college two-mile relay. After a grueling duel all the way, Smith of Pittsburg and Shover of Emporia smashed into the tape simultaneously to finish the dead heat in 7:52.6 and slash more than five seconds from the former meet record.

The Oklahoma Baptist university team of McClod, Perry, McMillen and Barton made a new record in the college sprint relay, burning up the wet track to finish in 2:25.8 and chip more than a second from the existing mark.

Main News Track.

The effect of the rain which fell before the final program opened and the intermittent showers of the afternoon was mirrored in the showing of all of the relay teams but was most noticeable in the high school events.

During the Class A preliminaries in the morning three new meet records were established. In each case the time made during the morning was noticeably better than in the final races and in one case the team that set a remarkably good mark in the morning failed to finish first in the afternoon.

High school records were established by Clinton High in the quarter and half-mile relays and by Greenville, Miss., in the mile.

Iowa athletes gathered their full share of the honors. Iowa State college, represented by Chisholm, Grant, Chapman and Leberow, won the two-mile university relay in 7:51.8. Grinnell outstepped a field of Big Ten conference favorites to win the university four-mile relay. McBrack, Pfeiffer, Warden and Filmore carried the colors for the Falcons.

Drake Has Winner.

Drake produced an unexpected winner in the individual event division when Paul Schaefer outdistanced the field in the hop, step and jump. The Bulldogs also won third place in the classic university mile relay, with the University of Iowa fourth.

Iowa took three places in the hammer throw, with Koehn, Corning and Barker in third, fourth and fifth positions at the finish. Hallman, Iowa Wesleyan college sprinter, finished fourth in the relay.

Dashing Race.

One of the most dashing individual performances of the meet featured the finish of the university mile relay. The Michigan team was 12 yards in front when James Wilverine Olympic runner, passed the baton to DeLaker for the final lap. Indiana was running second. Ira Piqua, Indiana's brilliant quarter miler and Olympic star was the anchor lap for the Hoosiers. Racing at breakneck speed behind the flying DeLaker of Michigan, Piqua narrowed the gap foot by foot. His 12-yard handicap was narrowed to three yards as they rounded into the stretch and a last heart-breaking sprint carried him across the finish line virtually abreast of the

water but an inch or two behind. Drake's time on the wet track was given unofficially as 41.4.

Ralph Metcalfe, Marquette's Olympic sprint star, won the 100-yard dash in 49.7—very creditable time on the soft, wet track. He led the race a yard ahead of Willie Reed, Michigan's great Negro high jumper and dash man.

Hoovey Runs

Hoovey in the university relay was easily dived. Illinois was the quarter-mile event and was leading in the half-mile relay when the third Illinois runner dropped he failed in attempting to pass it to Holbrook. Third place in the four-mile race also went to Illinois.

Marquette, largely because of an amazing finish by Metcalfe, won the half mile relay. Michigan took the mile, Iowa State the two-mile and Grinnell the four-mile. The 100-yard high hurdle double relay went to Minnesota. Indiana led won the university distance meeting on the Friday program.

No university or college succeeded in winning more than one first place in special events. Lathrop and Doherty of Illinois shared the top in the pole vault, each leading himself over the bar at 13 feet, 8 inches and each falling short in an attempt to break the record with the bar at 14 feet.

Ward Triumphs

Ward of Michigan cleared the bar at 8 feet, 10 inches to win the high jump but failed to negotiate 4 feet, 7 inches when he tried to establish a new meet record.

Brooks of Chicago won the broad jump for the second consecutive year, his best jump being 26 feet, 2 inches, made Friday in the preliminaries. Virtually all of the preliminary marks in the field events exceeded the performances in the finals, due to the rain and heavy runways and takeoffs.

Gene, University of Kansas, sophomore, pushed the 16-pound shot 48 feet, 10 inches to succeed Hugh Egan as champion. Another sophomore, Ray Stone of Boston, recorded a remarkable sport of the field: of two long miles he won the grand in 8:26.1, outperforming William of Indiana in the dash for the title.

A Repeats

Wolinger of Indiana took the hammer throw championship for the second consecutive year. Patricia Pugh of Illinois won, threw the javelin 105 1/2 feet to share that title with White, Kansas State Teachers of Pittsburg, retained the stone three years for another year by sailing the platter 241 1/2 feet.

Schellery of Minnesota won possession of the George Baling memorial trophy by taking the high hurdle final to 14 feet, a mark which he had equaled on a better track Friday. Schellery had finished second to Baling, the deceased Iowa star, in the 1933 trials.

Episcopal Champions

Episcopal Baptist university was major honors in the college relay division, with first in the half mile and mile races. The Atlanta, Tex., Christian took the college sprint meeting in record time and the two Kansas teachers colleges, Pittsburg and Emporia, shared the spotlight in their unseasoned record run to a dead halt in the two mile.

Oak Park High of Chicago had an edge in the Class A high school section with first in the quarter-mile and mile relays and second in the half-mile. The Oak Park triumph in the one-mile event was dashed slightly by the fact that the Greenville, Miss., team had won the preliminary test in faster time than the final and will get credit for the record. Greenville's mark of 2:28.4 in the preliminaries was nearly two minutes under the eight-year old Drake record and six-tenths of a second lower than Oak Park's time of 2:34.4 in the final. Greenville finished second to Oak Park in the final race.

Was Not Last Record

Another race won by Oak Park in which the Chicago boys will not get credit for the record was the 440-yard relay. Oak Park won the final race in 4:14 with Clifton, Ill., second but Clifton's remarkable time of 4:11 in the preliminaries will stand as the record. The old mark was 4:17.

Clifton High won the half-mile relay final in 1:21.1 but the mark of 1:16.4 made by the same runners, Gooding, Simmons, Brown and Nelson, in the preliminaries, will be recognized as the new record.

Cleveland, which lowered the Class B two-mile relay record to 8:14.8 Friday, found the new, wet track unsuited for its attempt to lower the Class A record Saturday. The Cleveland runners, Spitzer, Blacklock, Jones and Graves, won the Class A title in 8:14.5 but failed to match their own record of 8:11.4, set last year.
