

PHILSON LEAPS 6 FT. 5 3/4 IN. TO TAKE EVENT

Cunningham Avenges Loss to Dawson; Hawks Win 440.

Four bronzed Texans, unmindful of the momentary furore attending the arrival of Kingfish Huey Long at the stadium, stole the show at the closing program of the Drake relays Saturday when they outran and defeated Iowa's sensational sprint relay team in a startling upset.

The senator from Louisiana had just paraded down the track, autograph seekers streaming in his wake, to a seat in the box occupied by Miss Nona Kenneaster, the relays queen. A discordant chorus of mingled jeers and cheers for the Kingfish echoed through the stadium as the trim Texas quartet took its place with Iowa and four other rivals in the half mile relay.

Big Surprise of Meet.

Fans were not prepared for the inspired opposition prepared for Iowa by the Longhorns. The team which had trailed Iowa by many yards in the Kansas relays last week, held its own with Iowa through three-quarters of the race and Chink Wallender, the Texas anchor man, crashed through the tape a foot in front of Carl Nelson, Iowa's last runner.

Iowa's defeat was the big surprise of the meet. Texas, timed in 1:26.1 at Kansas where a part of the race was run over a 220-yard straightaway, was clocked in 1:26.2 on the Drake oval. Iowa not only failed to approach its sensational record of 1:25.2 at Kansas, but was unable to equal the mark of 1:26 set in Friday's preliminaries. The record for the race will go to Iowa, however, because the time of the Hawkeyes in the preliminaries was faster than the Texas mark in the final. A poor start by Jimmy Owen on the first leg of the race and imperfect baton handling accounted for Iowa's defeat.

Two Marks Fall.

Although the field of contestants was conceded to be the greatest collection of stars ever assembled for the relays, not one of the major records fell during the final program. Two meet records were equaled and two new high school marks were established during the Saturday events, to add to the four meet records hung up on Friday.

Jesse Owens, the great Ohio State athlete who smashed the American record for the broad jump Friday, turned his attention to the track Saturday and flashed down the straightaway in :09.5 to equal the meet record for the 100-yard dash. Owens finished a good three yards in front of Milton Holt, the Fresno flyer, with Jimmy Owen of Iowa finishing third and Bob Grieve of Illinois fourth.

Allen Equals Record.

Sam Allen, Oklahoma Baptist hurdling ace, was the class of the field in the high hurdle final. Four yards in front of the pack at the tape, his time of :14.4 equaled the Drake record, held jointly by him-

with and the late George Helwig, Iowa's Olympic champion. Lee of DePue, Callender of Indiana and Nelson of Oklahoma finished in order behind Allen.

Iowa fulfilled expectations in the out-yard university relay, although the Hawkeyes failed to better the meet record. They were clocked in 1:17, the same time credited to them in Friday's prelims. At the tape Iowa was three yards in front of the fighting Texas team which returned to the track later in the day to hand the Hawkeyes a startling defeat. Rockford, Edwards, Grossman and Wallender ran for Texas.

I.C.L.A. Reports.

University of California at Los Angeles retained the one mile relay championship for another year when the Bruins came from behind to conquer Texas on the gold lap. Clark Wallender, anchoring for Texas, held the lead until they hit the curve on the back stretch, with U.C.L.A.'s famous Jimmy Luffala at his heels.

Luffala, former I.C.A.A. national champion, turned on the steam at the back and Wallender, running his eighth grueling race in ten days, was unable to fight off the challenge. The Californians were timed in 2:14.4. Barnes, Gravelle's fourth runner, raced through a spectacular quarter to put the Bruins in third place at the back, ahead of Northwestern, Indiana, and Wisconsin. Clark, Bentley and Anderson were the other Gravelle runners.

Kansas Aggies Win.

The Kansas Aggies outwitted the most evenly matched field ever assembled here to win the two-mile relay championship, with Duke Drake and Northwestern setting a scolding pace in the earlier stages and Oklahoma and Arizona taking up the challenge as the race progressed. The Aggies reached home in front to win in 7:14.

Drake's partners looked at the performance of the Helwig four-mile relay team through the greater part of that lengthy struggle, only to be let down at the back. Taking the lead on the second mile, Drake and the pace until the final lap was more than half run. Ray Mahanah saved the bacon for Drake, with Don Lash, Indiana's national four mile country champion, in second place.

Lash Finishes Ahead.

Mahanah's teammate, Roland Callaghan, Russell Stearns and Edward May, had given him a 10-yard lead at the start of the final mile. Lash gradually cut down the distance. At the end of the backstretch, Lash started his sprint and pulled around Mahanah. Instead of answering the challenge, the Drake runner apparently quit, being content to log the remaining distance. He was beaten by 40 yards, although Drake finished second. Indiana's winning time was 12:11. Ohio State and the Kansas Aggies were place winners.

Lash conquered the Drake runner in spite of the fact that Mahanah started the race fresh, while Lash, less than an hour before, had logged 11 home miles on the grueling two mile run.

Supremacy in the 440-yard high hurdle hurdle relay went to Oklahoma, after the Sooners had outlasted a field of seven rival teams in a battle featured by spectacular splits. At one stage Iowa was well in front but Todd, the last Iowa hurdler, collided with far too many hurdles and failed to place. Oklahoma's winning time was 1:11.4, with Wisconsin second, Iowa State third and Nebraska fourth.

Chasingham Sets Record.

Gene Chasingham, world's record holder in the mile, arranged his second defeat by Gene Dawson, former Oklahoma star, in a great exhibition over the three-quarter mile distance. Chasingham set a speedy pace all the way, being third in all at the quarter and 1:10.4 at the half. His time for the three quarters was 2:01.3, less than five seconds over the world's record, set July, 1926. Dawson's crack mile was not an added spur to the race, being to Chasingham's heels all the way but Dawson's finishing kick carried him into second place at the finish.

Lucy Plana, Iowa's star high jumper, remained undefeated in track relay competitions in the high jump when he cleared the bar at 4 feet, 1 1/2 inches to win the championship. He had shared the title last year. Follow's jump, just a quarter of an inch behind the 11-year-old Drake record, was nearly two inches better than the best Yale Murphy, the Notre Dame star, could do. Murphy cleared 4 feet, 4 inches but failed at higher levels.

Here Were Third Year.

Ray Lewis of Butler became the third athlete in the history of the meet to win an individual event for three straight years when he outwitted a large field to take the championship in the two mile run. His time was 8:12.2 and he finished 10 yards in front of Don Lash, Oklahoma's big Tex champion. Lash's rivals of Oklahoma and Illinois of the Sooners were place winners.

Jack Hand of the Oregan team, a

national collegiate champion, won the pole vault at 13 feet, 8¼ inches. Raising the bar to 14 feet, 1½ inches for an attempt at a new record, Rand failed on his three allotted tries.

Four vaulters cleared 13 feet, 2½ inches to earn a tie for second place. In the group were Wonso-witz of Ohio State, Seeley of Illinois, Weichert of Rice Institute, and Scharff of Wisconsin.

Panther Javelin King.

Mark Panther, Iowa's ace, bettered the Drake record in the javelin throw for the second time when he threw the spear 210.42 feet in Saturday's finals, but his winning throw was slightly behind his 210.74 feet on Friday, which will stand as the record. Ward Cuff of Marquette was second, Horne of Northwestern third and Van Meter of Illinois fourth.

Elwyn Dees, Kansas shotputter, added another inch to his best throw in Saturday's finals to win the championship with a mark of 50 feet, 1¾ inches. Jim Tichenor of Oklahoma A. & M., Christianson of Wisconsin and Francis of Nebraska took the other medals.

17,000 See Events.

Honors in the college divisions were divided. The Abilene Christians took the college 1 mile relay in 3:22.2 with DePauw, Monmouth and Coe placing in order. Supremacy in the college 2 mile went to the Kansas Teachers of Emporia, with a mark of 3:20. The Oklahoma Baptists were second, Pittsburg Teachers third and Yankton fourth.

Kansas Teachers of Pittsburg won the college two mile relay in 7:59.7. Emporia raced home in second place, with the North Texas Teachers third and Wichita university fourth.

Figures announced by relays officials placed the crowd at more than 17,000. A cool breeze from the northwest and remnants of Friday's dust storm were in evidence during the meet.
