> It was Keefer's fast time of the year, and is second in the CIF to only Decker Underwood's 4:13.8 run in the recent Southern Counties.

Garden Grove's Tony Krzyzosiak marked himself as one of Orange County's future stars. The sophomore speedster sped to a 35.0 in the novice 330 to break the meet record set by second attempt. He then moved Tustin's Gary Walker in 1958. longiump at 21-8.

White, who was gunning for the meet record of 9.7. looked like he had a new record when he cantured the century. He was awarded an "unofficial" 9.5 after beating Compton's Al vin Dashiell, but the official timers disagreed and gave White a 9.8.

The Santa Ana speedster returned in the 220 to post 27 "official" 21.3. He appeared to be struggling through the first 100 vards, but after passing the midway point he shifted into high gear and won easily.

Santa Ana's Monty Floyd tied the meet record in the novice 120 low hurdles with a 13.2. Teammate Dan Lindsay finished second. They traded places in the novice 70 yard high hurdles

La Habra's Ruben Mejia opened the meet with an easy win in the two-mile, cruising the eight laps in 9:28.8.

Santa Ana Valley had the dubious distinction of winning the same race twice in the trial heats during the morning. but failing to make the afternoon finals

In the 440 relay, the Falcons got overanxious and ran 43.5 in third heat. But they were entered in the fourth heat, not the third, so they had to run again. They won the second time, but were later disgualified for passing out of lane.

The oldest record in the Chaffey recordbooks was finally beaten when Santa Fe's Randy Fulkerson jumped 6-31/2 in the novice high jump to better the mark set by Santa Ana's Blas Mercurio in 1934.
