In the first 36 years of the Foothill League between 1930-65, sprinters from the league won 16 CIF 220-yard dash titles (44 percent) and 10 State championships. From 1960 through 1965, Foothill League sprinters won all 6 CIF titles and 3 State 220-yard dashes. Pasadena's Bob Poynter, who won the 1956 CIF and State titles, also won both in 1955 but PHS did not compete in the Foothill League that year.

Hoover athletes won the 220-yard dash 14 times followed by Muir with 13. Muir won six in a row 1963 through 1968.

Hoover's Roland Trede (1938-40) and John Bradley (1946-48) were the only three time league champions. Five athletes were two-time champions – George Anderson, Muir (1932-33), Brainard Worrill, Muir (1934-35), Forrest Beaty, Hoover (1960, 1962), Harold Busby, Muir (1964-65), and Dwaine Ball, Blair (1975-76). Beaty missed a chance at being the Tornadoes third three-time winner when he was upset by Burroughs' Ralph Turner in 1961 but was the only Foothill Leaguer to win three straight CIF 220 titles.









Hoover's **Forrest Beaty** is a Southern California legend who broke on to the track scene as a sophomore winning the Foothill League 100 and 220 and adding the CIF 220 in 1960. As a junior, he was upset by Burroughs' Ralph Turner in both sprints at Foothill League meet but in the CIF finals he gained a measure of revenge and then some. After winning the CIF 100 in 9.6, Beaty shattered the national record in the 220 with a 20.2 timing (breaking the old mark of 20.6 set by Muir's Mel Clipper in 1958). He followed that up with a double at the state meet. As a senior he equaled the national 100-yard mark of 9.4, which was first set by Jesse Owens (East Tech HS, Cleveland, OH) in 1933. Beaty repeated as CIF 100 and 220 champion, this time winning the 220 in 20.4 (the second fastest time of all-time). In the 880 relay (4x220), a reporter from the San Bernardino Sun timed his leg in 19.4! But it wasn't good enough to catch San Bernardino as the Tornadoes finished second -- 1:26.2 to 1:26.9. The state meet was next and Beaty won the 100 in 9.5. In the 220, he pulled a hamstring while leading by a wide margin at the halfway point. Besides national best marks of 9.4 and 20.4 as a senior in 1962, he also ran a 47.3 440, third best in the country.

Track & Field News named him the national prep's athlete of the year in 1962. He was two-time winner of the CIF's Athlete of the Year in 1961 and 1962 and was recently named to the CIF's 100th anniversary All-Century team for spring sport athletes.

After Hoover, Beaty ran at California and is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. He was a two-time track and field All-American for his exploits in the 440 and mile relay. Cal won two NCAA mile relay titles with Beaty in the foursome. In 1965, he won four events at the AAWU meet (now Pac-12) – 220, 440 and running legs on 440 relay (4x110) and mile relay (4x440) teams. He also finished second in the NCAA 440 that season.

Beaty received a medical degree from the University of California San Francisco School of Medicine and did his residency at United States Naval Medical Center. He has served as a physician for nearly 50 years in Northern California.

1966 California

Hoover's John Bradley was a triple Foothill League 220 winner from 1946 through 1948. He also was a two-time state 220 winner and won CIF and State titles in 1947. After high school he competed at USC and picked up a fourth place finish in the 1951 NCAA 440.



Muir's Brainerd Worrill captured Foothill League, CIF and State 220 titles in 1934. After high school in ran at Pasadena City College and Fresno State.



Muir's Mel Clipper was national 220 record holder until Forrest Beaty broke his mark. He won CIF and State 220 and CIF 100.



Pasadena's Bob Poynter was 1956 CIF and State 100 and 220 winner. He went on to run for San Jose State with career bests of 9.4 and 20.4.



Muir's Harold Busby won 4 CIF sprint titles and 3 state championships before moving on to UCLA, where he played football along with competing on track team.
