Johnson Beats Owens for Junior A. A. U. Sprint Title

Jimmy Johnson, Negro sprinter from Illinois State Normal, an alternate on the United States Olympic team last year, yesterday broke up the schedule for the 100 meter dash of the century which the officials of the Amateur Athletic union planned to hold tonight.

The greatest track and field performers in America and several from Europe are entered tonight in the most important meet of the American schedule. All the stars of last week's intercollegiate carnival are on hand and they will be augmented by Olympic, national, and world champions who have no college affiliation. It was this meet which the dash of the century was to feature.

But Johnson defeated Jesse Owens, Negro schoolboy from East Tech High, Cleveland, in the national A. A. U. junior dash, and Ralph Metcalfe, Marquette's national collegiate champion, must face a new menace tonight.

Owens won the interscholastic 100 yard race in 9 4-10 seconds at Soldiers' field two weeks ago, tying the world's record. That same day Metcalfe also tied the world record in winning the national collegiate title for the second year in succession. The battle between these athletes in the 100 meters tonight was planned as one of the features of the meet. The race still holds interest, but it will

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be Johnson instead of Owens that Metcalfe must watch.

Johnson Double Winner.

Johnson was timed in 104-10 seconds for the 100 meters yesterday, one-tenth of a second slower than the accepted world mark. Metcalfe won the N. C. A. A. in 1932 in 102-10 seconds, but his time has not been accepted.

There was no doubt yesterday about Johnson's superiority over Owens. He came back to win a second individual championship in the 200 meter dash. Owens did not compete, but Johnson had the satisfaction of whipping Don Bennett, who in 1932 won both sprints in the western conference meet. Bennett competed for Ohio State then, but he was ineligible this season. He

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ran vesterday under the colors of the Cincinnati alub Owens withdrew from the longer unrint to save himself for the chem pionships tonight, but he continued in the broad jump, winning the junior

title with a lean of 24 feet 214 inches. Five Records Fall Five junior records were broken

all in the field events. That none were surpassed on the track was due to change from English to the metric system of measurement. Even so, the runners and hurdlers were handicaned by the strong wind which twice sent

flurries of rain sweeping across the floor of the stadium and chased the few hundred spectators to the shelter of the promenades Records were established in the shot put, high jump, hammer throw, disand javelin throw. The Texas Neighborhood Athletic

association, composed of athletes from all parts of the Lone Star state, won the Junior A. A. U. team championship with a total of 27% points. Michigan Normal college was second State Normal and Louisiana State which tied for third with 13 points.

Tie for Jump Record.

Cornell Cooper of Pittsburgh and Albert King of Detroit share the new high jump record. They cleared 6 feet 5 inches, % of an inch better than Bert Nelson of Butler had done four years ago. Nelson will compete in the senior championships tonight The shotput went to Gordon Dunn of the Olympic club, San Francisco, with a throw of 50 feet 1% inches.

The hammer champion, who estab-lished a new record, was Charles Modzilewski of the Shore Athletic club, As-bury Park, N. Y. He threw the weight 168 feet 4 inches. J. C. Petty Jr of the Texas Neighborhood A. A. set the new record in the discus with a mark of 148 feet 21/4

inches. The javelin record now is 204 feet 414 inches and belongs to Nathan Blair of Louisiana State university, a member of the team which captured the N. C. A. A. two weeks ago. Women Compete Today. John Simmons of Abilene Christian

college was the only athlete other than Johnson to win two championships. It was around his ability that

the Texas Neighborhood A. A. manufactured its team title. Simmons won the 800 meter race in 1:56.1 after having captured the 1,500 meter earlier in the afternoon in 3:58.6. The women's national champion-

ships will be held at Soldiers' field this afternoon at 2 o'clock. All is

preliminary to the 46th American championships which start at 8 o'clock tonight and in which more than thirty Olympic athletes will com-
