

Seven Meet Records Bow in A. A. U. Junior Tests at Princeton

10,000 Metre, 800 Metre, 200 Metre and 400 Metre Hurdles, 3000 Metre Walk and Javelin Standards Bow; Eion Pentti and Stan Wudyka Trail Lash

PRINCETON, N. J., July 3.

CAPPED by the record-breaking performance of Don Lash, University of Indiana distance runner, in the final 10,000-metre Olympic tryout, seven new meet marks were established in the A. A. U. track and field championships held this afternoon and early evening within Palmer Stadium.

Lash fairly burned up the track, taking command of the situation on the first lap, after which no competitor was able to draw up close enough to challenge him. His time was 31.06.9, which is a new native American record, the old mark of 31.24 having been established by Thomas F. McDonough in 1932.

Wudyka Takes Third

The only other runner who kept anywhere near Lash was Eino Pentti, of the Millrose A. A., who finished a half lap behind and took second place. Third honors went to Stan Wudyka, formerly of Temple University, but now running unattached. Stan was almost a lap behind Lash when the latter snapped the tape.

These three—Lash, Pentti and Wudyka—became members of the American Olympic team by virtue of their performances, and now have only to await the time of departure for Berlin.

Lash's performance may be compared to the following records. He shattered all of these with the exception of the World's, Olympic and American marks:

World's record—30.06.2, Paavo Nurmi, Finland, 1924.

Olympic and American record—30.11.4, Janusz Kusocinski, Poland, 1932.

Native American record—31.24, Thomas F. McDonough, 1932.

Senior championship record—Jole W. Ray, Illinois A. C., 1928, 31.28.4.

Junior championship record—Thomas McDonough, Boston A. A., 1933, 33.18.8.

Lash Gets Away Fast

As a competition, the 10,000 metre grind was a flop, but as an exhibition of gritty endurance running in which the leader never had the inspiration of competition, it was brilliant. Tearing out like a sprinter, Lash led Pentti by 30 yards at the end of the first lap, and after spinning the first mile in 4.43.8, was out by himself to the finish. Here are his fractional times:

mark for this distance several weeks ago on the same track, establishes the Indiana runner as one of the best and a factor for other nations to reckon with at Berlin.

Although the cruel pace set by Lash discouraged his competitors and plunged them into the slough of despair, the 10,000 metre event produced another new record. It was not only a race within a race, but four races within one with four crowns at stake—places on the U. S. Olympic team, the National senior title, the combined junior and senior titles and the junior championship.

A. A. Zamparelli, of Northwestern University, won the junior title by covering the distance in 33.11, smashing the junior mark of 33.18.8, spun by Thomas McDonough, of Boston, three years ago.

2000 Attend Events

Only about 2000 spectators were present to see Lash dominate his event and the juniors shatter no less than 7 meet records. Last minute withdrawals cut down the

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fields in many events, making no semi-final heats necessary.

But the boys who stuck and did their stuff today wrote new added flaming letters to the record book in the following events—discus, 1000 metres, 400-metre hurdles, 200-metre (broken three times), 110-metre hurdles, 3000-metre walk and 800-metre run.

If the seniors do as well tomorrow, much track history will be written in the 1936 A. A. U. Track and Field Championships.

The 200 metres record was broken no less than three times, twice in the trials and again in the finals.

In the first trial beat Robert Rodenkirchen, of the New York A. C., went the distance in 21.2. A few moments later Bob Graham, Whitman, Los Angeles, duplicated Rodenkirchen's feat. Rodenkirchen then won the final in 21.2, hard pressed by Graham all the way. The old record of 21.6 was established in 1933 by James Johnson, Illinois State Normal College, and equalled by Roy Draper, Los Angeles, in 1934. Johnson made his record on a straightaway, while Draper went around one turn as did Rodenkirchen and Graham today.

In winning the opening heat of the 400 metres hurdles, Joseph Patterson, of the Navy, hung up a new record of 53 seconds flat and then won the final in 53.2, after hitting a number of hurdles. The old mark of 53.7 was held by Estel Johnson, of the Olympic Club.

The only field record to be broken was pulverized by Hugh S. Cannon, of Brigham Young University, a young giant, who outclassed his field by skimming the plate 157 feet, 2 1/2 inches. This was almost four feet better than the old mark held by Chester Cruickshank, Denver A. C., of 153 feet, 6 inches.

A sixth record went by the boards in the closing event of the junior meet the 800 metres run. Marmaduke Hobbs, University of Indiana, captured this feature in 1:52.8. The best previous performance contributed by Elton Brown, Pittsburgh (Kansas) in 1934.

With two-thirds of the events completed five marks had been shattered. Dan Caldemeyer, University of Indiana, went over the barriers in the finals of the 110-metre event in the record-breaking time of 14.5. This was 3-10 of a second better than the old mark of 14.8 spun by Al Moreau, of Louisiana State, several years ago. The second new record was hung up by Irving Horowitz, in the 3000-metre walk. Horowitz stepped the distance in the amazing time of 14 minutes, 14 seconds. Just how good this was is emphasized by the fact that the old record was 14:51.9 and was hung up by Harold Nyland, of the German-American A. C., N. Y.

The meet record for the 400-metre hurdles was cracked by Joseph Patterson, captain of the United States Naval Academy track team, in a trial heat. Patterson was clocked in 53 seconds flat, as compared with the former junior mark of 53.7 set by Estel Johnson, of the San Francisco Olympic Club, last year. The Navy star finished 20 yards ahead of Joe Worthington, of the Shore A. C., Ashbury Park, N. J.

scoring with 14 points, the Millrose A. A., New York, had eight points, the Shore A. C., of Ashbury Park, N. J., seven, and the Olympic Club, San Francisco, six.

Robert Rodenkirchen, of the New York A. C., the rangy Jersey City schoolboy star demonstrated his sprint prowess by lowering the junior meet record for the 200-metre dash, run on the straightaway, to 21.2 seconds in the trials. Rodenkirchen pulled up and was looking over his shoulder at the finish as he led Ted Ellison, former New York schoolboy champion, by six yards.

Bob Graham, of Whitman College, Washington, equaled Rodenkirchen's new record time in capturing the second heat from Billy Hopkins, of Virginia.

The former meet mark of 21.6 second was set by James Johnson, Illinois State Normal College Negro runner, in 1923. The world record is 20.6 on the books, but it was cut last year to 20.3 seconds by Ohio State's Jesse Owens.

A very creditable 1500-metre performance was turned in by Henry Frederickson, N. Y. A. C., who won the event in 4 minutes, 6-10 seconds. Frederickson took the lead at the start and held it until the end, turning back a determined challenge of Ernie Federoff, Millrose A. C., in the stretch, to win by a foot. Frederickson, who was 17 years of age, is a high school sophomore and is credited with recently having done the half in 1:58 and the mile in 4:29, on the same afternoon.

So few starters appeared for the 100-metres and the 100-metre hurdles that no semi-final heats were required. There were only three starters in the 3000-metre steeplechase event, which was won by Norman Gordon, of our own Shanhahn Club, who went the distance in 10 minutes, 7.3 seconds.
