Lash fairly burned up the track, taking command of the sit tion on the first lap, after which no competitor was able to draw up

close enough to challenge him. His time was 31.06.9, which is a new native American record, the old mark of 31.24 having been established by Thomas F. McDonough in 1932. Wudyka Takes Third
