

California Dominates In Junior Title Events

Boston Runner Successfully Defends Crown by Running Distance in 3:50 as Dartmouth's Don Burnham Finishes Last

New York, June 19.—(AP.)—By way of warming up the Randall's Island cinder path for Gunder Hagg's Swedish sizzling tomorrow, Gil Dodds of Boston, danced in with the National AAU 1500-meter championship today and California's contenders dominated the junior title competitions.

Proving that there actually were some other fireworks to be set off in this two-day National AAU meet besides the American debut of the swift Swede, Dodds turned in a snappy metric mile of 3:50 and successfully defended his crown by 30 yards.

Helping him along in demonstrating that Gunder's thunder in tomorrow's 5000-meter duel with Greg Rice wasn't the only noise in this party, two of the juniors gave the record books a going over for the entertainment of the 1000 or so fans in the Municipal Stadium on this East River island.

One of these was the junior pole vault standard, which was raised to 13 feet, 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches by Irv Moore of the San Francisco Olympic Club, as he brought home one of the six championships Californians captured during the day. The other was a 20.9 second dash for the 200-meter sprint, posted by George Guida, Villanova College's crack speedster, and which lopped one-tenth of a second off the old mark.

Along with these developments there was more than a bit of interest in an order preventing buses on regular routes to Randall's Island from stopping near the stadium, although they pass by it. The order, along with one preventing taxicabs from making the trip, came from Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia, who had top billing on the meet program as honorary chairman of the games, which are held this year for the benefit of the Army Air Force Aid Society.

In addition to their half-dozen championships, three on the track and three afield, the invading Californians also hit for six second places.

However, the icing on the cake today was the 1500 meters, and in this one Dodds was the whole show, especially when his expected tussle with Don Burnham failed to materialize. Dartmouth Don, who has been working out with Hagg in the New Hampshire hills, wound up a well-walloped last.

Dodds took command just after the half-mile mark and from there to the finish it was strictly a waltz. The Metropolitan AAU champion, Bill Hulse, and the ex-Big Ten boss, Fred Wilt, formerly of Indiana, put on a stretch drive for second place, with Hulse finishing in front.

In addition to the 1500 meters, two other senior championships were decided. In the 10,000-meter run, Lieutenant Lou Gregory, a New Yorker now stationed at the Iowa Navy Pre-Flight School, plodded home with the crown for the seventh time in his career. Jimmy Wilson of New York grabbed the senior 3000-meter walk title.

Headed by Moore's record-wrecking vault, the California championship contingent included Roland Sink, 16-year-old Pasadena High schooler, in the junior 1500; Al Lawrence, Glendale high schooler, in the 200 high hurdles; Bruce Miller of Southern California in the 400-meter timber-topping; Edsel Curry in the broad jump and Jim Delaney of the San Francisco Olympic Club, who was awarded top spot in the shot put when Earl Audet of Los Angeles, who finished first, was disqualified because it was discovered he won the indoor junior crown three years ago and therefore was ineligible for anything but senior competition.
