

Herb McKenley of Jamaica, the ex-Illinois flash, set a new world record in the 400 meters when he won his initial heat in 45.9s., to break the former mark held jointly at 46s. flat by Rudolf Harbig of Germany and Grover Klemmer of California.

Lloyd LaBeach of Panama, former Wisconsin star who has been running out Los Angeles way this past season, equaled the American record for 200 meters around a curve when he won his heat in 20.9s. Jack Weiershauser of Stanford originally set the mark. Mel Patton ran the distance in 20.7s. at the NCAA Championships but he was aided by a breeze.

McKenley, who previously this year had set a new world mark of 46s. flat for 440 yards, won by close to 15 yards in his brilliant effort. Herb ran in the third lane and finished full of run. He came back to win a semifinal heat in the evening in 46.8s.

MILWAUKEE, July 2 — Twenty-one years after his own pop had won the National Junior AAU pole vault title, young Bob Smith, San Diego State freshman, won the selfsame championship here today.

In 1927 Ralph Smith, Bob's father, won the championship and in 1925 his Uncle Harry likewise won the same national junior gold medal.

Bob was competing in the colors of the Los Angeles AC here today, which was also the organization represented by his dad and uncle. His winning height was announced as 13ft. 9½in., which was only 1¼ inches shy of the meet record.

LaBeach also doubled up in the 100 meters and won his heat in 10.5s. The fastest time of the day which was also equaled by one other speedster, Harrison Dillard of Baldwin-Wallace, the star hurdler who also aspires to make the U.S. sprint relay team at London.

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LAAC, won his heat as did Clyde Scott of Arkansas and Bill Porter of Northwestern. Dixon's time was 14.3s.

Finals in all of the senior AAU events, with the exceptions of the 5000-meter run and the 3000-meter walk which were held tonight, are on tomorrow's program. Most of today's competition was devoted to the junior events in which Southland entries participated only sparingly.

For the most part Southland stars didn't make too great an impression. Don Anderson of California was second in his century heat. In the 200 meters Cliff Bourland and John Bradley—the Glendale Hoover prep flash—won first-round heats, while Anderson was again a runner-up. Bourland ran 21.6s. and Bradley 21.7s.

Cliff Qualifies

Bourland ran fourth in his 400 semifinal and won't be in tomorrow's finals. Cliff qualifies for the final Olympic tryouts at Evanston, however, because a number of collegians who previously had made good at Minneapolis are in the field here which left Bourland among the top sextet to qualify at this end.

Roy Cochran won his 400-meter hurdles semifinal heat, after having previously loafed a first-round heat in 52.4s. This assured the LAAC ace of a place in next week's field at Evanston no matter the result of tomorrow's AAU final race. The other semifinal heat was won in 52.5s. by Minnesota's Lee Holacre.

Johnny Fulton of the Mercuries won his 800-meters heat in 1m. 52.1s. leading all the way. The big surprise of this event was Herb Barten of Michigan, who won the first heat in 1m. 51.1s., with the favored Dave Bolen of Colorado running only third and Reg Pearman of NYU a lagging fourth. The third heat was won by Jack Diannetti of Michigan State in 1m. 52.3s., to complete a brilliant field.

The great Curtis Stone, the ex-Penn State leather-lunger, ran away from the NCAA champion, Texas' Jerry Thompson, in the senior 5000-meter run. Stone's time was 14m. 49.1s., the fastest of his career.
