

Lutz Sets Mark in Junior Champ 220

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Mark Lutz, beaten in the 100 - yard dash, was determined not to lose in the 220 of the National Junior Track and Field Championships Saturday at the University of Minnesota.

Lutz, a senior - to - be at Rochester Mayo High School, and Dave Holmes of Colorado Springs, Colo., were timed in 9.6 seconds but judges declared Holmes the winner.

In the 220, Lutz sprinted to a 21.1 first place clocking and was named the meet's outstanding athlete.

"I just ran as hard as I could," Lutz said. "I was very satisfied with my race in the

100. I can't quarrel with the judges' decision that he (Holmes) won, but it was very close and I felt I ran quite well.

"Of course, this 21.1 in the 220 is a particularly big thrill because it carried with it a victory," said Lutz. "I was determined not to get beat again..."

Some 500 athletes competed in the two-day meet for 17 and 18-year-olds.
