By piling up 291 points in the Time, 23 2-5 seconds. Kansas Conference track and field meet on the College of Emporia first; Sweatt, Pittsburg. second; Cefield last Saturday, Ottawa University was able to take second place. Bethel, fourth. Time, 52 3-5 seconds. Southwestern College, Winfield, was Half mile—Welburn, Baker, first; first with 41 points. Dewey Wolgast Ottawa's speedy sprinter and pole vaulter with fourteen points to his credit was high point man of the onds. meet. Caster of Southwestern was. second with 12 points.

The day was good but the track was not in condition for the breaking of records. However, Rodgers of Washburn, clipped a second from the mile, making it in 4:32 2-5. Alyeea of Pittsburg stepped the 120yard hurdles in 15 3-4 second, lowering the previous record. Wiley of Friends heaved the discus for the record breaking distance of 129 feet, 9 inches.

Mr. Jack Grover, who for the past ten years has been director and starter for the state meet presented to the Conference a beautiful trophy cup which goes to the school winning the 100 yard dash. The school who is successful in winning first place four times in succession will retain the cup permanently. The cup is a large one and is worth much to the school and runner who wins it. Dewey Wolgast has the honor of winning this cup for Ottawa University, Ottawa thus becoming its first temporary possessor. Wolgast has run the hundred in ten seconds flat nearly every meet this season, but the slow track cut the time to 10 1-5.

Dean Wilson accompanied the Baptist aggregation and was a judge of finish, picking second man. The Dean gave the opinion that this was The the best meet that has ever been held in the state. He added that there was a strong array of athletes who were well representative of the schools in the Conference. The tone of the meet was excellent, there being only one or two minor questions arising during the entire meet.

Along with Dean Wilson, acting as judges of finish were Dr. Weed, Prof. Parmenter and Coach Hoover.

Captain Rodgers performance in the mile and two mile races deserves mention. The captain was a good second in the mile. In the two mile Rodgers led the field up until near the end when Storm of Baker sprinted ahead and won the race by a margin of inches.

Charles Ott performed in great style and won third place in the 100 and 220 dashes. He was unable to enter the broad jump on account of an injured ligament.

Davis and Dunning ran hard races in the hurdles and did well in the high jump.

Blickenstaff and Casement, Ottawa's long distance runners won first and second, respectively, in the four mile cross country classic. Blickenstaff sets a record of 23 minutes and 3 seconds in this event.
