

STANFORD ACE RUINS CHANCE AT LONG BEACH

Johnson Shines in High Jump

They "Dunn him wrong yesterday at the Long Beach Relays, or maybe we should say that Stanford's mighty Slinger Dunn "dunn" himself wrong.

It all happened in the discus. The enormous Mr. Dunn strode into the discus ring for his first official toss. It went about 200 ft., which is considered absolutely nothing for the bulky Indian. Dunn looked at the effort with much disgust and told the officials not to measure the toss.

They took him at his word and didn't. Then Slinger fouled his next two heaves and was out of the event. Naturally there was a bit of moaning on the part of several rabid Stanford rooters. But it was Dunn's fault and the officials are blameless, providing you don't look at it through red glasses.

That was but one of the many high lights of the annual Long Beach classic which brought together in Southern California the largest assortment of track and field athletes since the Olympic Games. Approximately 500 competed in the affair.

Dunn gained a slight measure of revenge by winning the shot with a 500. 4 3-16s heave. Houston Harper, Trojan weightman, made his first appearance of the season, taking second with 400. 9 3-8s.

Stanford fans were slightly appeased when Bobby Jones, a graduate now working in local oil fields, won the discus at 267 ft.

MOTTRAM WINS JAVELIN

Also Johnny Mottram's 2300. 4-16s javelin toss warmed the hearts of Indian rooters. Mottram led the javelin field by almost 14 ft. as Jim Darreri, Santa Ana ineligible, did 201 ft. 4 in. for second. Darreri's gigantic effort ousted the defending champion, Malcolm Metcalfe, whose best toss was 200 ft. 3 in.

Bill Greber didn't show up for the pole vault. Late reports have it that the former S.C. ace is in Indiana visiting friends.

The outstanding individual effort of the afternoon was turned in by Lerney Johnson, Amber-egged Compton Junior Negro boy. Lerney apparently had the high jump won at 6 ft. 6 in. and left the event to run another lap for the Tartar four-man 200 yard.

He lost by inches to little Bluffy Felock, who won the event for Riverside Junior. Johnson left the track looking as if he hadn't enough strength left to clear his throat.

While he was running, Delos Thurber, slender Glendale High boy, cleared 6 ft. 6 in. to tie Johnson. It was Thurber's best effort in his young life. He was merely another high jumper last year, but seemed to find himself a few weeks back, winning the high jump at the Orange Show Relays with a 6 ft. 47-8 in. leap.

CLEARS 6 FEET 7 INCHES

Johnson asked for a ten-minute rest and somehow regained his strength, for on his fourth trial Lerney cleared 6 ft. 7 in. Thurber made gallant attempts but he had shot his wad at the 6 ft. 6 in. level.

Bill Setton, ineligible Trojan freshman, served notice that he will probably shatter all pole-vault records before he graduates by clearing 131 ft. 6 in. to win the event. He then went over 131. 10 in. but for some reason it wasn't recognized as a new meet record.

Earl Meadows, another S.C. freshman, took second, with a 131. 3 in. effort, while Dick Lindsey of the Trojan varsity, and Jack Hallet, Oxy captain, tied for third. Hallett won the jump-off for third place but had to clear 131. 6 in. to get the medal. Lindsey did 131. 3 in.

The Trojans dominated the open division, winning three races, the four-man 440, 880 and mile, in addition to having Phil Cope of the fresh capture the novice high hurdles in 15.

S.C. was well on its way to victory in the four-man two-mile until Ferns Webster, who was running anchor, gave up the ghost and finished in a dog trot to get third place. Ferns says he isn't in the best of shape but will establish a world's record for the half-mile six weeks from yesterday. That will be April 15. Fresno State will come

... for a dual meet on that date.

Coccardal led the parade in the college section, winning the four-man 400 and the freshmen middle. Parkhurst won the Class B discus at 130ft. 6in. to further raise the Bengal stock. Hallett's pole vault performance was also commendable.

Riverside and Compton Junior colleges shared honors in the Jaycees division. The Tartans won the medley and open high jump, while Riverside athletes won the four-man half-mile and four-man quarter. Mastey Pollock added the Tiger cause by taking second in the senior 100, which was won by Adrian Talley, husky South Gate youth. Talley already leads South Gate High, but isn't eligible for prep competition this season.

POLY HONOR HONORS

Eddie Leahy's L.A. Poly team took most of the honors in the prep section. Rodriguez won the Class B pole vault at 11ft. 6in. Al Chinn took the Class B high jump at 6ft., while relay runners placed second in two events, the four-man mile and eight-man mile. Poly was second also in the four-man quarter, but was disqualified.

Tom records were shattered throughout the long afternoon, with Jim Donaldson, Hollywood High shot putter, cracking the only field event mark. Donaldson buried the twelve-pound ball 37ft. 3 1/2-in. He later placed second in the Class B sixteen-pound shot with a toss of 41ft. 3 1/2-in.

Phil Cope started the records-breaking program in the first event of the afternoon, winning the open javelin high stroke in 134.

Then Jefferson Junior High of Long Beach continued the good work by fracturing the eight-man half-mile mark. Hollywood High runners broke the record in the four-man mile.

Day's quartet of Shell, Bunker, Mayden and Beel won the four-man quarter in 43.6, for a new mark. The Tiger frosh, not to be outdone, shattered the medley event record, covering the distance in 1m. 21.6. Young Dick Johnson, son of Fred Johnson, old-time Tiger athlete and now Garfield High headman, ran the last lap and was the old man pleased.

Caltech broke Day's record of 8m. 24.6 in the four-man two mile, the Engineer quartet doing the distance in 8m. 24.

Riverside Jaycees cracked the four-man 800 standard, in addition to the four-man quarter mark for the only junior college records in 141.

ONE OPEN MARK FALLS

As predicted the open event records were too hard to budge, but one falling during the long program. An unattached team of Felix Skoug, Frank Lohr, Ward Hardeman and Don Johnson lashed the two-mile in 1m. 57.6, to shatter S.C.'s mark of 1m. 58.6.

Had Webster been in shape S.C. would have probably won this race as Ferris had about a six-yard lead on the field when he took the baton.
