

# DUNN STARS IN DISCUS, TROJANS ANNEX HONORS

Truth is stranger than fiction.

Added proof of the old adage was given in the Long Beach Relays

yesterday. Clark Crane, Trojan sprinter, was awarded third place in the open four-man 880-yard event, taking home all four medals.

It happened thusly: Crane was lead-off man for S.C. He galloped his 220 yards and you can imagine his embarrassment when no

team-mate was on hand to carry on the baton.

Crane however, is a hardy soul. He continued to run and finally finished the half-mile distance way

back to the leaders, Arizona and the Trojan frosh. As these were the only other teams in the event, Crane was given third place. Of course, if you want to get technical you could say that he automatically disqualified himself when he passed the first stick-passing boundary. The officials, apparently, forgave him, for he has the medals.

## ANOTHER INCIDENT

Another peculiar incident happened in the open javelin. Malcolm Metcalfe, national champion in 1932, qualified with a toss of 185ft. 5½ in. Announcement of the medal winners left him out. The press rallied to the cause and at a late hour last night Long Beach officials announced that a special medal would be cast and awarded to Metcalfe.

The Trojans walked off with all the open relays with the exception of the event in which Crane did his stuff. S.C. lads also connected

## Slinger Sets New Meet Mark, Phil Levy Beats Carpenter for Second Place

on the field. Al Olson set a new meet broad jump record of 24ft. 6 7/8-in., while Earl Meadows vaulted 13ft. 9 7/16-in. for a new mark in that event.

### AZTECS, OXY BEST

San Diego and Occidental dominated the college division, while Los Angeles cleaned up in the Jaysee baton-passing events.

The Aztecs won two firsts and a third, while the Bengals took one first and two thirds in addition to placing both Rel and Teets third in the open and novice sprints, respectively.

Slinger Dunn, ex-Stanford weight king, was the hero of the meet. This was Dunn's third trip to Long Beach, and meet officials responded by acclaiming the Slinger the meet's outstanding athlete. This award carried with it a large cup. Dunn took the discus with a neat toss of 161ft. 8 1/2-in., a new meet record, and later added the shot-put medal to his growing trophy list with a heave of 48ft. 9-in.

### DUNN HAPPY

Dunn was very happy, for he brought Phil Levy with him and Phil cast gloom in the Trojan camp. Levy wears a Stanford uniform, being a transfer from San Mateo J. C. Kenny Carpenter, the gigantic Trojan discus tosser, has been hailed as the best on the Coast in pre-season reviews, and what did little Phillip do but beat Carpenter. Levy did 157ft. 2-in., to take second to Dunn, while Carpenter's best was 153ft. 7 1/2-in.

In addition, Leroy Kirkpatrick, the El Centro kid, who is at Montezuma, won the open high hurdles in 14 1/2. Kirkpatrick, who says he hopes to enroll at Stanford next year, beat Phil Cope, the Trojan sophomore, by inches.

So it was a great day for the Stanford roots.

### TALLEY COPS

Adrian Talley, Trobabe sprinter, nosed out Al Fitch, the long-legged varsity dashman and quarter-miler, in 9.8. Vincent Reel, the black-haired Oxy ace, led for seventy-five yards, but didn't have the finish.

Sacramento Jaysee sent down a powerful team. Humphreys won the novice hurdles in 15s. Fawcett took second in the "B" shot with a toss of 46ft. 4-in., while Claude McWilliams, colored boy, won the "B" broad jump after taking second to

Mark Robinson of Muir Tech in the novice hundred.

### BRUINS STAR

The Bruins of U.C.L.A. scattered glory here and there. Scott Massey tied Bill Sefton for second in the pole vault. An unknown sophomore, Chuck Carlin, won the "B" javelin with a fine toss of 183ft. 10-in. Woodrow Strode, ineligible Bruin, surprised the assembled multitude by winning the "B" shot with a remarkable toss of 47ft. 8 1/2-in.
