

# CROWLEY SETS MARK IN ONE-MILE TEST

## Manhattan Ace Takes Feature in 4.22 as Team Gains 59 1-2 Points; Walker Wins Century

ALLENTOWN, May 14.—A well-balanced Manhattan College track team turned the 20th annual Middle Atlantic States collegiate Athletic Association championships into a rout here today, as the Green-clad New Yorkers rolled point after point to make a runaway of the championship. The final tabulation tonight showed Manhattan had won the meet with a total of 59½ points, with Lehigh placing second with 23½ points and Rutgers, third, with 22.

All of the other thirteen colleges competing were scattered out in the wake of Manhattan. Fourth place went to Swarthmore, with 20, and the other scores were as follows: Muhlenberg, 17; Lafayette, 15; Haverford, 11; Franklin-Marshall, 7½; Gettysburg, 7½; Dickinson, 7; Johns Hopkins, 7; Delaware, 4½; St. Joseph's, 4; Bucknell, 3; Drexel, ½; and Ursinus, 0.

One new Middle Atlantic record was set up and it was a Manhattan performer who turned the trick. In winning the mile event Frank Crowley, former Allentown Prep School star, now enrolled at Manhattan, clipped one and one-fifth seconds from the mile record established by Getz, of Alfred in 1928, at Haverford, running the distance in 4.22.

Crowley just ran away from his field from the opening gun and crossed the finish line a good fifty yards in front of "Winnie" Welsh, of Muhlenberg, who came up strong to nose out McKenna, of Manhattan, who had held down the second position to within a few feet of the tape.

When the two-mile event got under way Crowley was a top-heavy favorite to win it, but the former Allentown Prep star got mixed up in a jam on the second turn and was accidentally spiked by McKenna, a team-mate, and was forced out of the meet for the rest of the day.

Another favorite also had tough sailing in this respect when Strandwitz, University of Delaware entry in the 120-yard high hurdles was leading his field in the finals, only to stumble after clearing the next to the last hurdle and fall right out of the race.

Elias Fischer, of Rutgers, was the only double winner of the meet, the Scarlet heavyweight taking first place honors in both the discus and shot put.

One of the surprises of the meet came in the defeat of George Majercik, Muhlenberg College ace, in the 100-yard dash, which was won by Walker of Swarthmore. Majercik, who won the same event in the Middle Atlantic last year, won his heat in good shape, but couldn't do better than second in the finals. However, Majercik did come back to win the 220-yard dash from a good field.

Crowley's mile performance, however, was the high spot of the af-
