

# RARITAN CLAN TOPS LEHIGH TRACKSTERS

*Swarthmore Places in Eight Events to Win Third, Nosing Out Lafayette by 1-5 Point; Walker Defends Century Crown*

LANCASTER, May 12.—A well-balanced squad of track and field athletes from Rutgers University, New Brunswick, N. J., captured the 21st championship of the Middle Atlantic Collegiate Association here this afternoon, succeeding to the crown won last year by Manhattan College of New York.

The New Jersey athletes, who placed in 18 of the 14 events on the program, regained the association title for the first time since 1922. They finished ahead of 12 other contestants with a total of 41½ points.

Williamson Field, of Franklin and Marshall College, the host member, was slow from two days of rain, but good times were made in several of the running events. A fair-sized crowd, numbering about a thousand people, braved threatening weather to see the athletes perform.

Rutgers was the pre-meet favorite to win the annual event, but had a tight battle with Lehigh for the night. The Bethlehem entries compiled a total of 35 1-5 points in eight events, gaining most of their points in the high jump and pole vault. Swarthmore, who made an exceptionally fine showing in the qualifying events yesterday, crashed through with 29 1-5 points to get third place among the contestants.

The Little Quakers, with Johnny Walker, the star performer in the grunts, placed in eight of the fourteen events and made a surprising showing throughout the final day's tussle.

### Walker Repeats in Century

Walker, the defending champion of the century dash, was satisfied to look in his heat of the semi-finals at Sheridan, of Lafayette, but he opened up his guns in the final trial to win in 16.1. Hamil Reidy, of Lehigh acc, who has been a rival of Walker's all season in various competition, was second in the heat, but a good ten feet separated the two rivals at the finish.

Swarthmore and Lafayette staged a merry battle for third place, with the Quakers nosing out their Eastern competitors by one-fifth of a second, gained in the final event on the program. In this event, the pole vaulter, George Muller gained a tie for first place with four other vaulters, and his points enabled his college to select third place in the final tussle.

Lafayette made its best showing in the quarter-mile dash, in which it qualified four athletes, Fred Lake, the winner of the event, was content to keep behind Tom Lacy, of Swarthmore, until the last turn when the Easton flier used "the gas" to come home first in a close finish.

The time of 49.9 made by Clarke was the outstanding one of the day and came within one-tenth of the association record established by Lewis, of Union, in 1930.

Lafayette scored 11 points in the 40-yard event, taking all but second place. Their total for the meet was 29 points.

Other colleges competing in the meet finished in the following order: Dickinson 14 1-5; St. Joseph's & Philadelphia 13½; Johns Hopkins, 12; Franklin and Marshall, 1-4; Muhlenberg, 9; Drexel, 6; Delaware, 4 7-10; Gettysburg, 4½; Averford, 2.

### Dickinson Makes Good Showing

Dickinson made the best showing among the squads from Eastern collegiate conference circles, but the F. and M.-Muhlenberg battle for sixth position was almost as interesting as the Swarthmore-Lafayette duel. This struggle was also added in the pole vault, with Bob McDowell finishing in the tie-way tie for third place for the primary points.

F. and M., acting as host in the two-day classic finished in exactly the same position as last year and was in the position allotted by experts in pre-meet predictions.

Rutgers scored first place in the 100-yard hurdles, the broad jump and 200-yd. in addition to two places

in the shot put. The remainder of the New Brunswick team's total was picked up by seconds and thirds along the way.

Lehigh's star performer was Bob Jackson, former F. and M. Academy star athlete, who contributed five points to the Bethlehem institutions aggregate with a first place in the 220-yard low hurdles.

Bill Sterling, of Rutgers, picked to finish first in the 120-yard high hurdles, ran true to form. He made the best time yesterday in the qualifying heat and in the semi-finals today, later romping to victory over Davidson, of Dickinson, in the final event.

Franklin Miller, of Swarthmore, and Wen Welsh, of Muhlenberg, staged a two-man battle in the mile run, with the former taking the lead on the final lap to finish with a 50-yard lead. Welsh, who scored all of the Allentown's college's points, came back a few minutes to win the half mile.
