

Rutgers Wins Track Title; Haverford Man 880 Victor

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., May 17.—Rutgers University kept its team championship as expected today in the 35th annual Middle Atlantic Collegiate Track Association meet and Jim Grosholz, Haverford College star, supplied the unexpected.

Beaten in a 4:23.9 mile by the the host's Bill Thomas and handicapped by an achilles tendon pull in his right heel, Grosholz came back to retain his half-mile title in 1:56 to equal the meet record made in 1929 by Emil Zechiegner, Alfred.

Aware that his foot might not stand up if he had to kick, Lanky Jim ran a brainy race. He built up a comfortable lead with a 59.8 first quarter and stepped the pace slightly higher on the second lap to win by 20 yards over Thomas.

THOMAS VICTOR

Grosholz learned his lesson in the mile. After trailing Don Alderman, St. Joseph's, through a 2:12 half, he took the lead but was unable to create a comfortable advantage. Thomas, a CBI army air corps veteran now in his first year as a runner, was only 10 yards behind after a 3:24.1 three-quarters. Less than 30 yards from the tape, Thomas

caught the leader and won by better than a yard over the stretching Grosholz.

Thomas and Grosholz each supplied nine points to their teams' totals. However, Dick Cramer, who was first in the 100 and 220, contributed 13 to the total that made Rutgers champion for the 14th time. Scoring in all but three events, Rutgers, amassed 40%. Franklin and Marshall was second with 21%, largely due to Bill Iannicelli, Penn Relays javelin champion, who took his specialty at 191 feet, 2 inches and won the broad jump.

LAFAYETTE THIRD

Lafayette nipped Swarthmore for third with 18% to 16%, while Haverford, St. Joseph's and LaSalle shared fifth with 13. Muhlenberg was next with 10, followed by Johns Hopkins, 9%; Lehigh, 8%; Washington and Delaware, 8; Gettysburg, 6%; Dickinson, 6; Bucknell, 5%; Drexel and Albright, 3; Ursinus, 2%, and Alfred, 2. Juniata and PMC failed to score.

Aside from Rutgers, which won four, and F&M, which produced Iannicelli, LaSalle was the only other team to win more than one title. Jim Tuppeny topped the pole vaulters at 12 feet, 6 inches and Bill Fitzgerald won the dramatic low hurdles with a fast 24.8.

In this race, Tom Foley, St. Joseph's, led until the final hurdle. Here his luck failed. Catching his shoe, Tom slid face
