

# Trojans Win Modesto Relays

MODESTO, June 3. (U.P.)—Dean Cromwell's University of Southern California Trojans, amassing a total of 85 points, won the open intercollegiate team championship at the Modesto Relays Track and Field Festival tonight, easily outpointing the second-place Olympic Club of San Francisco which finished with 51.

University of California was third with 38 points and Caltech placed fourth with 18 in the track and field events at the Modesto Junior College Stadium.

U.S.C. won the medley, 440-yard, 880-yard and mile relays to score most of its points, setting new stadium and relays records in the first two.

College of Pacific nosed out Modesto Junior College for the junior college-all civilian college title, scoring 54 points to 52½.

Fresno State was third with 38 and San Jose State trailed with 4.

The Trojans got off to an early lead in the relays when they won the opening distance medley relay in record time. The Trojans, aiming for their second relays crown after winning the Fresno West Coast relays crown two weeks ago, took the medley in 10m. 47-8s. to break both the relays and stadium records.

Relays and stadium records fell in the 440-yard relay, open intercollegiate Class B class, when S.C.'s team of Curry, Gray, Lawrence and Grosse turned the distance in 42.2s. California placed second and the Olympic Club was third.

Al Lawrence, S.C.'s "one-man track team," added points to the Trojan total in the high hurdles, winning in 15s. flat. Bob Krietz, sensational Inglewood High School student, en-

tered the open competition and placed second, nosing out Morris of California.

Ed Luce, Olympic Club, broke the Modesto Relays mark for the high jump with a leap of 6ft. 5½in. He was pressed by California's Earl Howe, who cleared 6ft. 4¼in. for second.

Relays officials caused consternation among spectators when they announced that the open intercollegiate mile race had been decided by rating the runners without the formality of going through the race. They awarded first place to Roland Sink of S.C., second to Gill, Caltech, and third to Wagoner, Caltech.

The arrangement was agreed upon on the basis of Sink's unquestioned superiority in the mile run and to permit Southern California teams to make
