

# Oregon's Cook Ties 100 Mark With 9.3

Roscoe Cook, Oregon's long legged sprinter, joined the ranks of the world's record holders in the 100 yard dash by running 9.3 in the California Relays here last night.

The Pacific Coast Conference champion, who ran 9.6 last week in Seattle, broke into first place after about 50 yards. Ray Norton, the San Jose State star whose appearance in the meet was uncertain for a while, was second.

## Garten Third

Sid Garten the freshman from East Texas, was third and Bobby Poynter, Norton's teammate, fourth. Bobby Morrow, the three Olympic Games medal winner, pulled up about 10 yards short of the finish.

Cook's 9.3 was the first time the world record was tied in the Modesto meet. Cook was clocked by one timer at 9.2 and two others had him at 9.3. There was a 1.55 MPH wind at the time.

Officials measuring the distance found that Cook ran three yards more than the 100.

## Seven Share

Seven runners are officially listed as world record holders in the century. Norton, who yesterday got a leg cramp while rushing up a fraternity house stairway and then was stung by a bee on his trip to Modesto, ran a 9.3 in a heat race at Fresno.

The world record tying effort bested all the marks made in the major cinder carnivals.

Cook last year ran for San Diego JC and placed second in the state jaycee championships.

The Cal Relays record in the 100 was tied twice in the trials. Norton took the first heat in 9.4 and this time was equaled in the next heat by Cook.

## Beats Garten

Norton beat out Garten and Cook took Willie White, California. The third heat went to Poynter in 9.6.

Morrow, the defending champion, placed third in his heat with cook. Bill Woodhouse, who ran with Morrow last year on two world record setting relay teams for ACC, was behind Poynter.

## Jones Tremendous

Hayes Jones, the national AAU champion from Eastern Michigan, ran a tremendous race to take the high hurdles over defending champion Elias Gilbert from Winston-Salem. The time was 13.6 to equal the CR record with the wind at 1.55.

Jones won his qualifying heat in 14 flat, the same time as was posted by Gilbert in his trial.

Lee Calhoun, the North Carolina star, failed to show up. He notified relays officials that he missed original plane connections and was going to try to make it.

Jones' 13.6 was the best time this year in a relays.

The Striders' Bobby Soth ran the fastest race of his life in capturing the two mile run. He was clocked in 8:55.3, one of the best times in the world this year, in the

new Modesto Relays event. It was a close with freshman Al Lawrence, the Australian at Houston, and Miles Eisenman, the state jaycee champ last year now at Oklahoma State, third. Soth's previous best was 9:06.

Otis Davis, the basketballer who went out for track just for laughs, also ran the fastest time of his career in taking the 440 yard dash in 46.2. The easy going Oregon dashman from Los Angeles last week tied the Pacific Coast Conference record set years ago by Grover Klemmer.

Davis runs with a toothpick in his mouth to be more relaxed. He is nicknamed Toothpick like the Giants' pitcher Sad Sam Jones.

It was his seventh race.

Jones became a two time winner by taking the 220 yard hurdles in a good 22.5

## Calhoun Is Late Arrival

Lee Calhoun, North Carolina's great hurdler, arrived at the Modesto JC stadium last night just after the last running event had been completed. Calhoun missed connections.

He apologized to the more than 10,000 fans in the stands that he was unable to make it—on time.

to break the record set last year by Gilbert, who failed to defend the two titles he took in 1958.

## In Sections

This one was run in sections because of the abundance of good talent. Six took part in the first final with the best talent and the next five best in the second. Oxy's Mike Logan took the five man second race, strictly second rate, in 23.4 as leader Kent Herkanrath dropped out.

The same deal was done in the 220.

Morrow looked like the Bobby of old as he took the first section as he beat out Garten in a good race after leading most of the route. The time was 20.5, to tie Norton's Cal Relays mark. Bruce Munn, Trojan frosh, grabbed the second unit from Oxy's Dean Smith in 20.9.

## Some Consolation

Dyrrol Burleson, the Oregon frosh who Friday night saw his national prep mile record broken in Bakersfield, received some consolation in Modesto when he captured the 5,280 in 4:06.7. The freshman standout took the lead when Latio Tabori, the Hungarian refugee running for Santa Clara Youth Village, fell on the next to last turn. Second place went to Stanford freshman Evangelos Depastas, who was timed in 4:06.9, a new Greek record.

Josh Culbreath, the old timer from the east coast, won the 440 yard hurdles as expected in 52 flat. The race lost some of its color when Dickie Howard, New Mexico, who had the best time in the US, pulled out to devote more time to his studies.

Mike Peakes, Colorado's No. 2 man in the Big Eight Conference meet, was the winner in the half mile at 1:50.2.

## Three Top Hop, Step Jump Mark

In the greatest display of hop, step and jumping in history by Americans anywhere anytime, three great athletes broke the California Relays record and two bettered the American standard.

Southern California Striders Alvis Andrews and Herman Stokes did 52-5½ and 51-6½, respectively, to finally attain the goal for which they have been striving.

It was a culmination of long and hard work. They were aided by A. H. daSilva, the former world record holder from Brazil, who instructed them briefly during a clinic in Southern California.

Bob Lawson, another Strider, was third as he also bettered the CR standard.

## Event Criticized

This event was criticized by many as DaSilva was not competing. The Brazilian, a student at Lamar Tech in Texas appeared in some meets as a goodwill ambassador. When contacted by Modesto meet officials DaSilva advised that he was not the same A. H. as the HSJer. Modesto officials did not bother any more and perhaps it was just as well. Americans finally came into their own in an event in which they always have taken a back seat.
