

# Seven Relay Marks Top Nation

The California Relays produced seven of the best marks made in the major track and field carnivals last night.

The local times in the 440 yard relay and the two mile relay were superior to those of the longer established Penn, Drake and Texas events.

The Modesto competitors also were tops in the high hurdles, javelin, mile run, two mile run and, of course, the greatest anywhere in the broad jump.

The Modesto meet was second best in four events.

## Sizzling Anchor

Dyrol Burleson, the new American mile record holder ran a sizzling 4:01 in the anchor lap but the Oregon four mile relay team was unable to better the American record it set in the Fresno Relays two weeks ago. The Ducks were timed in 16:32.8, well ahead of the accepted American and national college mark of 16:53.6. Oregon ran 16:29.3 in Fresno.

The Cal Relays mark was well ahead of the new United States mark set earlier by Western Michigan.

The Southern Illinois Salukis, paced by three British millers, finished second in 16:33.7 while Western Michigan had 16:53.

## Swishes Ahead

Burleson opened up on the final turn and swished ahead of Mike Wiggs, who was running the gun lap for the Salukis. Dyrol sprinted to the tape.

The times of the Ducks were Vic Reeve 4:11.7, George Larson 4:13.4 and Keith Foreman 4:07.6. Neither Reeve nor Larson ran fast enough in the early laps to set a new record.

Burleson complained of a

sore throat and a dry nose before the race.

Last Wednesday in an all comers meet in Eugene, Burleson erased the American record of 3:58 flat set in the Cal Relays a year ago by Jim Beatty by going 3:57.6.

## Near Dead Heat

Texas Southern, a small Negro college in Houston and a late starter in the California Relays, was timed in 40.2 in the 440 yard relay. San Jose State finished in a near dead heat and was given the same time.

Running for Texas Southern, which was stepping up in class in Modesto, were Homer Jones, Barney Allen, Chuck Frazier and Les Milburn. They were surprised with the cool Modesto weather and were expecting a warm night. Oregon was third and Abilene Christian fourth. Both Oregon and ACC were given identical 40.5.

The Texans' winning time was the best in the nation this year.

Oregon State ran 3:18.4 in the sprint medley relay for a new Modesto mark. This took four tenths of a second off the old record by California

in 1958 when Jack Yerman, Monte Upshaw, Willie White and Don Bowden were running.

Texas Southern was the runnerup ahead of Oklahoma State and Arizona State.

## 1:23.6 In 880 Relay

Texas Southern turned in a 1:23.6 to beat out Abilene with the same clocking in the 880 yard relay. Oregon was third at 1:24 and Baylor moved into fourth as San Jose State was disqualified for passing outside of the lane. The time while one of the best of the year was a second off the Modesto mark and world record made by ACC.

Oregon State won the two mile relay as Norm Hoffman again ran a brilliant gun lap as he did in the sprint medley for a 7:27.3 and beat out L. G. Dupree of Southern Illinois and Ernie Cunliffe of the Youth Village.

Abilene Christian paced by Bud Clanton's third lap of 47.4 took the mile relay. A bad pass on the first exchange by Arizona State put Oxy into the lead but the Texans overcame this. On the final lap Mal Spence, who

ran an unofficial 46 flat gun lap, nearly overtook Earl Young, ACC's Olympic Games gold medal winner. The time was 3:09.3. Arizona State had 3:09.6.

## Beats Kerr

Jerry Siebert, the former California standout, beat out George Kerr, the former Illinois Olympic star for Jamaica, in the open 880 yard run. Siebert, representing the Santa Clara Valley Youth Village, was timed in 1:50.2 while Kerr had 1:50.5. Oregon's Sig Ohlman was a close third at 1:50.6.

Siebert has the best time of the nation of 1:48.5.

Hayes Jones, competing unattached, ran the high hurdles of the year as he sped to a 13.6 clocking to tie the Cal Relays record he shares with Trojan Jack Davis.

## Allowable Breeze

Jones' time was made with the allowable breeze of 3.8 miles per hour. Don Styron, Southern Illinois, and Fran Washington, Santa Clara VVY, both turned in the best efforts of their lives, 13.7, to finish second and third.

In the trials Jones ran 13.8 to win his heat while Jim Ball, Hamilton Air Force Base and Santa Clara VVY, took his heat in 14 flat.

## Johnson At 9.4

Dennis Johnson, the Jamaican at San Jose State, ran a disappointing 9.4, the same time given to Harry Jerome, the Canadian from Oregon, and Dave Styron, Southern Illinois, in the finals of the

100 yard dash. This was one tenth of a second off the Cal Relays' mark set by Roscoe Cook two years ago and the world's record held by a handful of sprinters.

Johnson started about a yard back as he got off the blocks slowly. The tall Jamaican, whose rolling start has been a topic of controversy, pulled a muscle in the Fresno Relays and did not compete last week in special meet at Sunnyvale.

Johnson also won his heat in 9.4 to best Bo Roberson of the army. Jerome and Styron both ran 9.4s to pace their heat.

Previous to the Modesto meet, Johnson had run a wind aided 9.2 in the Mt. San Antonio Relays and had five world record equaling efforts.

## Prep Victor

Schoolboy Ted Nelson, Andrews High School of Odessa, Texas, took the 440 yard run in 47 flat as he nosed out Olympic Games quarter miler Jack Yerman, formerly of California. The ex Bear now a soldier at the San Francisco Presidio was timed in 47.2.

This was Nelson's first race in a month. He and a delegation of Texas fans drove to Modesto for the meet after failing to make arrangements for a chartered flight.

A month ago, Nelson won the Texas prep 440 title in 48 flat, 16 minutes later took the 220 crown in 20.7 and 20 minutes later ran a 47.2 leg in a mile relay.

Jim Beatty, the 5-5 North Carolinian who saw his American mile record of 3:58 made in the Cal Relays go into the wastebasket Wednesday night, won the 5,280 at 3:58.8, one of the fastest of the year.

Beatty had laps of 58.3, 2:00.2 and 3:02.1.

Jim Grelle, a member of the Olympic team like Beatty, was second in 4:01.3.

Beatty said he was not tired at the finish and thought that he and Laszlo Tabari, his teammate, would run a 3:56. However, there was a foulup. Beatty thinks that Grelle, who lacks the kick, took advantage of the mixup.

## Two Mile Mark

Dale Story, the Oregon State sophomore, and two other runners beat the Cal Relays mark of 8:55.5 in the two mile run. Doug Kyle, the Canadian Olympian, was second at 8:50.3 while San Jose's Chuck Clark, who last Saturday night set a new American record, was third. Story's winning time was 8:46.9.

Story's lap times were 65.6, 2:12, 3:21.4, 4:29, 5:36.1, 6:42.4, and 7:47.

## Styron Wins

Don Styron, Southern Illinois, led most of the way as he successfully defended his Modesto title in the 220 yard low hurdles by once more doing 22.1. Roberson was second in 22.3, the fastest of his career.

Dave Styron prevailed in the 220 yard dash without much trouble in 20.7 beating out Lynn Eves, unattached, and Ted Nelson, the Texas prep.
