

Disputed 100 Yard Dash Is California Relays Feature

In the greatest robbery in history since the Brinks hold-up, Oregon's Harry Jerome was declared the winner of the 100 yard dash, one of California Relay's featured attractions, over favorite Robert Hayes, Florida A&M.

Most everybody in the pressbox last night as well as those seated in the stands along the finish line had declared Hayes, who has run a world equalling 9.2 seconds, the winner.

The official announcement of Jerome, the Canadian sprinter, as the winner stunned the crowd.

Jerome got off to a terrific start and appeared to be a step ahead of Hayes. However at the 80 yards mark it appeared that Hayes, the 183 pound football player, pulled ahead. It was neck and neck all the way and at the finish lines it looked like Hayes was the winner by a nose.

Rhubarb in '50

This was the only controversial race in the Modesto meet when there was a blanket finish in the 100 back in the early 1950s.

There was an excuse that year since the top finishers were all Negroes and were wearing suits of similar colors.

There should not have been any case of color blindness this time as Hayes was in white and Jerome was yellow.

Two first place judges got Jerome as the winner. But if

this was the deal the time should have been the same.

It could have been the four hometowners on the finish line were confused but Hal Brillhart, San Francisco, who was picking second figured Hayes that way.

Hayes won his heat in 9.3 the same as Jerome did in the finals. This equaled the meet record of Oregon's Roscoe Cook in 1959.

Jerome was second in his heat behind Arizona State's Harry Carr.

The man who should know Jerome but then what else Hays says the winner was could he say. But to add to the confusion, Hayes told his coach that he thought he had won.

The wind was an allowable 3.45 miles per hour.

Jones Wins

Hayes Jones, the greatest hurdler in the world, won the highs in what could have been termed an upset over Jerry Tarr, the Oregon Duck who last week equalled the national collegiate mark.

Jones, a Detroit school teacher, won his heat easily but got the victory over Tarr when Jerry stumbled and lost his stride.

Jones' time was 13.5, a new California Relays record. This tied the fastest time in Jones' colorful career. Jones, the defending champ, shared the old Modesto mark of 13.6.

Tarr had been ahead from the start.

Tarr was timed in 13.6 in his heat while Jones had 14.1.

Ulis Williams, Arizona

State, came from behind to win the 440 yard run from California's Dave Archibald in a race featuring the country's outstanding freshmen quarter millers.

The Californian led for three quarters of the way and then Williams made his bid and won by three yards.

Williams' time was 46.4. Ulis twice has run 46 flat.

Jack Yerman, the former California Bear and Olympic Games competitor, took the 440 yard dash in 1:49.1. He won by three yards over Oregon Stater Norm Hoffman, who has been battling injuries all year long. Third was George Kerr, the Jamaican who was competing unattached. Yerman took the lead at the half way.

Third Fastest

Keith Forman, a junior at the University of Oregon ran the third fastest mile in history by an American as he won the event in 3:58.3.

Only his Oregon teammate Dyrrol Burleson and the Los Angeles Track Club's Jim Beatty have legged it faster over the distance.

Forman was a last minute entrant in the event. Burleson and Beatty, who has a leg brace, did not compete.

Weisiger Second

Second place went to Gary Weisiger, formerly of Maryland but now of the Quantico Marines, who ran 3:59.3 to become the sixth fastest American in track annals. Weisiger is a lieutenant.

The mile which lost much of its luster with the absence

of New Zealander Peter Snee and Beatty nevertheless was a corker.

Forman is 20. Another youngster followed Forman with a sizzling performance in the two mile.

By 40 Yards

Bruce Kidd, 19, a freshman at the University of Toronto, won by 40 yards in the eighth lapper over Oregon's Vi Reeves in 8:41.9. This is a new meet record breaking the 8:46.9 by Dale Story, the barefooted Oregon Stater who dropped out of the race. Kidd ran his last two laps in 2:02.

Story set his Modesto mark last year.

Kidd's time was the second best ever on American soil and the better than anything ever done by an American. Kidd represents the East York Track Club. Reeve also is Canadian.

Only New Zealander Murray Halberg has run faster in the United States. Halberg wanted to come to Modesto but was passed up by officials.

Charley Frazier, a one time East Texas athlete, won the 220 as an unattached competitor in 21.1. Ted Woods, Colorado, was second in 21.1. Woods may have pulled a muscle. He had been in the lead.

The 220 low hurdles went to Franch Marsin, Oregon State, in 23.3. The event was just another one on the program. It lacked name performers. The time equaled the jaysee effort.

Faust's 7-1 High Jump Paces Field Events In Local Classic

Joe Faust, the Mt. San Antonio national junior college record holder, was a two time winner in the high jump in the California Relays here last night.

He set a new meet record of 7 feet, 1 inch in the open class to throw Charley Dumas' meet standard of 6-9 $\frac{3}{4}$ made in 1956 into the trash heap.

He missed an attempt of 7-2.

Fourth Time

This was the fourth time that Faust has cleared 7 feet in his career which saw him compete for Occidental and then attend UCLA before checking in at Mt. Sac.

Only two men have jumped higher than Faust. They are Russia's Valery Brumel and America's John Thomas. The Soviet satellite holds the world record.

By coincidence Faust first broke Dumas' national jaysee mark made while Charley was at Compton. Dumas

competed for USC when he set his open mark.

Faust said he was hampered by a slippery approach and that he slipped on all three tries at 7-2, in addition to his successful effort at 7-1.

Following the event the young leaper set 8-1 as his ultimate goal. Faust, a real student of the event, says he has done "lots of research on it."

Mahoney Samuels, Foot-hills JC, duplicated his Fresno Relays hop, step and jump effort by doing 51 feet, 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches here.

Al Oerter, the world's new discus record holder, set a California Relays record here last night to lead off the meet's field competition.

The burly New York Athletic Club performer spun the discus out 195 feet, more than five feet off his pending mark, but it was good enough for a new Modesto mark.

Jay Silvester, the man

whose record Oerter broke, was second at 192-8 $\frac{1}{2}$, which also shattered the unattached soldier's Modesto best of last year. The old mark was 189-5 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Rink Babka, former Olympic Games Champion, and Parry O'Brien, the Beverly Hills bank executive, failed to qualify for the finals.

Hal Connolly, the West Los Angeles school teacher, won his event at a disappointing 210-7. The mark was good enough to win a watch and that seemed all Connolly was interested in.

Second Time

Last night was the second straight time that Oerter, the former Kansas star, defeated Silvester, the former Utah Stater who doubles in the shot. They finished one and two in the Los Angeles Coliseum Relays.

Dave Davis, now a Camp Pendleton Marine, was the winner in the shot put at

59-11, a ho hum performance in the day of 60 feet plus efforts. Silvester was second at 59-6 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Oregon's Dave Steen was third.

Davis broke Parry O'Brien's five year reign as champ. This was the second time since 1951 that O'Brien has not taken home a watch in the event.

Davis' mark was the first time in five years the winning mark was below 60 feet.

Boston At 26-0

Ralph Boston, the Tennessee State biochemistry student, did not produce a world record in the broad jump this time.

However, his 26 foot effort was the best in the world this season. And that is not bad when you consider this was only Ralph's third meet of the season.

Tied for second place at 26-6 $\frac{1}{2}$ were the Air Force's Darrell Horn and Oklahoma's Tony Watson.
