

Giddy Dartmouth Wins the Pennant.

Five New Records in College Games at Worcester.

National Fly Casting, Canoe Races, and Other Sports.

WORCESTER, May 23.—The exercises of the third annual field day of the New England Intercollegiate Athletic Association took place on the Driving park in this city today, and were witnessed by more than 1500 persons, including 300 students. The events and winners were as follows:

One hundred yards dash, final heat—E. Williams of Dartmouth first, 10 3-5 seconds; Mills of Worcester second.

Tug-of-war between Williams and Worcester Polytechnic Institute—Won by Williams by 2 1/2 inches.

Half-mile run—C. Potter of Amherst first, 7 minutes 6 2-5 seconds; E. R. Lampsou of Trinity second.

One hundred and twenty yards hurdle race—R. B. Ludington of Amherst first, 19 seconds; Scruton of Dartmouth second.

Pole vault—A. T. Marshall of Worcester first, 8 feet 8 inches; Wentworth of Williams second.

Two hundred and twenty yards dash, final heat—E. Williams of Dartmouth first, 23 2-5 seconds; Mills of Worcester second. This apparently broke the record, which was 23 3/4 seconds, but when the course was measured again it was found to be 33 feet 6 inches short, so that the record will not stand.

Running high jump—A. M. Amidon of Williams first, 5 feet 6 inches, raising the record 1 1/2 inches; Peters of Williams second.

One mile run—C. O. Wells of Amherst first, 4:44 2-5; H. S. Lee of Williams second.

Throwing 16 pound hammer—N. T. Abbott of Dartmouth first, 80 feet 7 inches; F. Randolph of Dartmouth second.

Quarter-mile run—F. E. Rowe of Dartmouth first, 52 1-5 seconds; Mills of Worcester second. Record lowered by four-fifths of a second.

Standing high jump—S. Crook of Williams, 4 feet 10 inches, W. B. Eaton of Wesleyan second.

Tug-of-war between Dartmouth and Brown—Dartmouth won by 3 inches.

Two hundred and twenty yard hurdle race—C. S. Humphreys of Dartmouth, first; J. O. Nichols of Williams, second.

Two-mile bicycle race—F. A. Delabarre of Amherst, 7 minutes 33 3-5 seconds; Harriman of Worcester second.

Putting 16-pound shot—M. H. Houghton of Amherst, first; J. R. Perkins of Dartmouth, second. Both broke the record. Houghton threw 35 feet 3 inches and Perkins, 33 feet 2 1/2 inches. The record was 33 feet 1 inch.

Standing broad jump—S. Crook of Williams, first, 10 feet 1 1/2 inches; Amidon of Williams, second.

Running broad jump—C. S. Humphreys of Dartmouth, first, 20 feet 3 inches; A. K. Davies of Williams, second. Record raised by three-quarters of an inch.

Two-mile run—B. F. Ellis of Dartmouth, first, 10:36 4-5; J. O. Nicholas of Williams, second.

Tug of war between Dartmouth and Williams; won by Dartmouth by one inch.

One-mile walk—T. E. Bradford of Worcester, first, 8:10 3-5; W. A. Henderson of Amherst, second. Bradford lowered the record, which was also his, by 3 2-5 seconds.

Two hundred and twenty yards hurdle—C. S. Humphreys of Dartmouth, first; F. R. Hoisington of Trinity, second. This was the first time this event was included in the programme. Time, 26 1/2 seconds.

The Dartmouths were awarded the championship pennant, having won eight first prizes, Amherst won five, Williams came next with three, and Worcester with two.

There was great excitement during the sport, particularly when the Dartmouths sang the refrain:

Froudly the pennant waves
Out of reach of the Williams braves;
If Amherst wishes to win the race,
Surely she must change her pace,
For Dartmouth is a hustler.

The referee was C. C. Hughes of the Manhattan Athletic Club. The judges were: A. C. Palmer, M. A. C.; G. M. L. Sachs, M. A. C.; Walton Storm, M. A. C.; timekeepers, G. A. Avery, second vice president of the M. A. C.; C. C. Hughes, secretary of the Manhattan, and S. J. Cornell. H. P. Pike of the same club was the starter. F. J. Fox of Williams acted as grand marshal, with one from each college as assistants.
