

AMHERST AT THE FRONT.

Her Third Consecutive Athletic Championship Won.

DARTMOUTH SECOND AND TRINITY DISTANCED.

Field and Track Athletic Records Smashed to Bits—H. C. Ide's Remarkable Performance—A Wonderful Pole Vault.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 25.—About 3,000 people, including fully 500 undergraduates, witnessed the sixth annual meeting of the New England Intercollegiate Association on Hampden Park to-day and saw Amherst win the pennant for the third consecutive time, with Dartmouth a close second.

The track was in fine condition, but the wind was sufficiently high to prevent fast time, except in the short runs. All the colleges, except Amherst, presented better teams than last year and the competition was much keener, several events being decided by a very small margin.

In the final heat of the 100 yards dash, Weeks of Brown and Brooks of Amherst ran a dead heat, but Weeks won the run-off. The hammer throw was won by a quarter of an inch, and the standing broad jump by an eighth.

Despite the extensive record-breaking of last year, five of those records were beaten to-day, and also an association record made in 1888. The association record made in the 100 yards dash was equalled three times in trial and final heats, and in the pole vault, the intercollegiate record of 10 feet 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches was beaten 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches by H. L. Towne of Williams.

The Keating bicycle awarded for the best individual performance went to H. C. Ide of Dartmouth, who won both the 200-yard hurdle and the 200-yard flat races in beautiful form, breaking the association records in both instances. The score by colleges was as follows:—

Amherst, seven firsts, four seconds; Dartmouth, four firsts, eighth seconds; Brown, two firsts, three seconds; Worcester Polytechnic, two first, one second; Williams, two firsts; Wesleyan, one first, two seconds.

The general arrangements for the meet were in the hands of the Springfield Bicycle Club and the officers of the day were all of the Manhattan Athletic Club. The events, with winners and records, were as follows:

100 Yards Dash—E. H. Weeks of Brown, 10 2-3 seconds, equalling association record; G. B. Brooks of Amherst, second; E. E. Hall of Dartmouth, third.

Half-Mile Run—W. T. S. Jackson of Amherst, 2 minutes, 52-3 seconds; G. D. Price of Dartmouth, second; G. N. Richmond of Brown, third.

Pole Vault—H. L. Towne of Williams, 10 feet 7 inches, breaking intercollegiate record; A. A. Ewing of Amherst, second; J. A. Derby of Worcester, third.

Hope Pull—Won by Williams in one heat by six feet and six inches; Dartmouth refusing to pull again.

100 Yards Hurdle—C. C. Russell of Amherst, 11 2-3 seconds; B. B. Briggs of Wesleyan, second; E. C. Potter of Dartmouth, third.

Quarter Mile Run—G. B. Shattuck of Amherst, 20 $\frac{1}{2}$ seconds; F. W. Marvel of Brown second, W. A. Talcott of Amherst third.

Mile Run—J. G. Jarvis of Wesleyan, 4 minutes 22-3 seconds; A. G. Hughes of Dartmouth second, H. L. Pratt of Amherst third.
