WORCESTER, May 25.—With the tide set hard against them in the preliminaries and facing a prospect of defeat, Dartmouth athletes again won the N. E. I. A. A. championship in track and field sports at Worcester this afternoon, scoring 47 out of a total of 154 points in the 14 events on the card. It was a close, uphill fight after the setback the New Hampshire men were given the opening day. Resolute hearts, favored to some extent by fortune, plied up the points until there was no such thing as beating them.

Dartmouth's strength was in her star performers, for they won no less than six firsts. Aided by Brown and M. I. T., who made big inroads on Amherst's big string of prospective place winners, the Hanoverians were all to the good.

The chief event that turned the tide of battle against Amherst was the defeat of Read, who had been booked for the 100, Sherman of Dartmouth was his conqueror. Gram of Tech, who had been rated as a rank outsider, plucked the 220-yard dash from the bunch of stars and had the mighty McCormick reading the number on his back long before the finish line was reached.

These defeats almost took the life out of Amherst, yet the glee club sang encouraging songs, the loyal rooters cheered, the college band played. Meanwhile Dartmouth went on piling up points.

Brown's Hopes Go.

Brown was as expected an all-important factor in the meet and shared the fate of Amherst by having his fondest hopes shattered in the two-mile run, which went to Udale of M. I. T., who created a new record for the association, covering the distance in 9m 52 4-5s. The best previous mark was that of O. N. Bean of Brown, 10m 23 5-8s, made in 1908.

Hubbard of Amherst was easily the individual star, winning first in the 220-yard hurdles, second in the 120-yard high hurdles and third in the 220-yard dash, making in all 10 points. Mayhew of Brown came next with a first in the running broad jump, third in the 220-yard hurdles and third in the 120-yard high hurdles, a total of 9 points.

Pevsar of Dartmouth made eight points for his team, first in the 16-pound hammer, third in the shot, and fourth in the discus.

Gram, M. I. T., scored seven points,

first in the 100-yard dash, and third in the 120-yard dash.

Sherman of Dartmouth, who captured the 100-yard sprint and fourth in the 220-yard run, made six points for his college.

A new record was made in the two-mile run and Gram of Tech in the 220 lowered the best previous association record of 23 1-5s, held jointly by N. N. Cloudman of Bowdoin and A. E. Curtiss of Amherst, to 22m flat. This was in one of the trial heats and he didn't beat the pistol.

Shaw Beats His Rival.

It was a little disappointing to many that Shaw of Dartmouth did not again touch the record of 15s flat he made yesterday in the 120-yard hurdles. He was again side by side with his rival, Hubbard, who was backed bravely to turn the tide on the Dartmouth man, but Hubbard was fairly beaten, the time being 15 2-5s, which equals the previous association record.

Harrox of Williams made a new association record in the running high jump, doing 5ft 11 1/2in, as against the previous record of D. Farrington, M. I. T., of 5ft 10 1/2in.
