

For the fifth successive time Dartmouth won the annual championship track meet of the New England intercollegiate athletic association on Tech field, Brookline, yesterday afternoon in a driving rain. The Hanover team snatched the victory from Technology and Williams in the last field events, scoring 32½ points to 27 for the institute and 24 for Williams.

Bowdoin was fourth with 20½, Amherst 17, Brown 13, Wesleyan 9, Maine 6, Tufts 3, Vermont 2. Holy Cross and Trinity failed to place men in the finals.

This gives Dartmouth five legs on the new 15-year cup, competition for which started in 1902. Amherst won it a first three meets.

More than 500 college men and their friends braved the rain to see the finals. A raw wind from the east which blew over the hurdles and the pole vault standards, in a rain driving against the men in the dashes, made the meet a difficult one to manage and an uncomfortable one from the competitor's as well as the spectator's point of view. The track was so heavy that record times were impossible.

Sherman of Dartmouth Out.

Dartmouth was handicapped at the outset by the loss of "Nat" Sherman in the dashes, as he had pulled a tendon in his foot in making his winning broad jump during the Friday preliminaries. He started in the century dash but was obliged to stop at the 40-yard mark. His work on the previous afternoon seemed to indicate first places for him in both the 100-yard and 200-yard dashes.

Following the announcement of Sherman's condition the chances of the Hanover team seemed far from bright and it was only through the sterling work of "Jess" Hawley in the dashes that it was enabled to pull out in the final and make the best individual score of the day.

Capt Gilbert Horrax of Williams was next in individual honors, securing 12½ points for his team. He led Mayhew of Brown by several yards in the pole vault over the high barriers, tied with Palmer of Dartmouth for 11th honors in the high jump, took second in the broad jump and third in the pole vault. Kelley in the 100-yard dash, and Stevens in the longer dash, also did good work for Williams.

Howland in the half-mile and H. H. Howland's in the two-mile event helped greatly to put Tech safely into second place. These two races furnished the most exciting finishes of the day. The Tech winners nosing out ahead only after desperate sprints in the last 20 yards of the home stretch. Howland's time of 10m 21-5s in the long run was considered remarkably good for the track conditions.

Times in the Century Fast.

Although the trial times were necessarily slow, the finishes in the 100-yard dash, the first event of the program, proved exciting. The second heat, with Robson of Wesleyan and Hawley of Dartmouth coming through the last 20 yards abreast, was declared a dead heat. The final was a beautiful race, Hawley taking it from Robson at the tape by inches. Kelley of Williams and Holmes of Tech crossed the line almost together directly behind the leaders. Hawley's time of 10-2-5s was remarkably fast going on the wet track.

Colbath of Bowdoin, picked to win the mile, sprang at once into the lead in the first followed by Holmes of Dartmouth, Watkins of Tech, Merrifew of Vermont and Wells of Brown. At the turn of the first quarter Colbath was still leading strongly, and Watkins

had jumped into second place, with Holmes third. Colbath and Watkins had now opened up a safe lead on the finish on the third lap and romped in together, Colbath's time being 4m 35-4-5s.

Capt Horrax gave a neat performance in the 100-yard hurdle event, knocking only one hurdle and leading at the finish a yard or more. Mayhew and Marble of Brown, Smith of Maine crossed the line a poor fourth, limping from a sprained ankle.

The quarter-mile was a rush all the way. Bacon of Wesleyan leading began field. Swartz of Tufts was a good second, with Salisbury, Tech, at his side. Capt Gram of Technology, who had qualified in the fast, was on Friday afternoon and was picked by many to win, was sick in bed and therefore unable to come to the mark yesterday.

Fine Finish in the Half-Mile.

The finest finish seen on Tech field for some time was furnished by White of Technology and Fortier of Maine in the half mile. Fortier, Maine's star, went to the lead soon after the start and he looked like his race all the way. At the end of the first quarter he was followed by Freiberg and Baxter of Dartmouth, White of Tech and Lester of Williams.

At the turn before coming into the straight-away, Fortier was leading with Baxter second, but here White began to pull up and took the lead. Fortier was right after him, however, and started a break-neck sprint down the stretch. The Tech man, with Fortier battling at his heels, crossed the tape with nothing to spare.

Johnny Mayhew led in the low hurdle race for three-quarters of the distance. Over the last four hurdles, however, Edwards of Bowdoin gained a distinct advantage and captured the victory. Betty Stevens of Williams, and Knight of Maine, took third and fourth in slow times.

Two-Milers Have an Argument.

In the two-mile event Capt Walker of Dartmouth took the lead at top speed, but he was unable to hold it and at the first quarter Howland of Tech was leading, with Clark of Dartmouth, Greene and Taber of Brown following in the order given. At the third lap the two leaders were working close into second place and went out after Howland.

After leading for a mile and a half Howland appeared to lose strength and Greene walked into the lead. Colbath of Bowdoin had come into third position several yards back of the two leaders. Greene increased the lead to 55 yards in the last lap and looked like a winner.

Just before turning into the home stretch, however, Howland began to cut down rapidly on the lead. Both were sprinting desperately, and a yard or two from the tape Howland threw himself ahead, producing a finish quite as sensational as that in the half-mile run.

Kilbourn, Amherst's big weight man, did not have to better his performance of 40ft 2¼in of the day before to win, and his team-mate Kooymunjan, added to Amherst's score in the event. The hammer throw trials were not bettered yesterday. Warren's throw taking first honors for Bowdoin, Sherman's broad jump on Friday of 21ft 3¼in proved good enough to win.

Holdman of the Hanover team, by clearing 11ft 6in on the third trial in the pole vault, virtually captured the meet for Dartmouth, as this was the final event.

Harry A. Adams, Worcester, was referee, Dr W. J. Holland, Malden, starter, A. D. Peck marshal. The summary:
