

Dartmouth's track athletes, despite the loss of "Pat" Sherman, came up the line in fine shape in the preliminary events of the 24th annual New England intercollegiate meet, held on Tech field, Brookline, yesterday afternoon, qualifying for the finals today nearly twice as many men as any other college.

Contrary to predictions, the Hanover team apparently had no difficulty in keeping in the lead, and it seems probable now that the Green will take another leg in the 14-year cup competition, in which it has already won five.

Dartmouth qualified 17 men, failing only in the high hurdles. The other colleges scored as follows: Williams 8, Wesleyan 8, Bowdoin 7, Technology 6, Amherst 5, Brown 4, University of Maine 3, Colby 3, University of Vermont 2, Worcester Polytechnic 2, Holy Cross 2, Tufts 1, Trinity 1.

Williams had a well-balanced team and was helped out considerably by its track in the quarter-mile. In that event three Williams men were placed, J. D. Lester, E. J. Angovine and H. G. Barrett.

Bowdoin figured well in the field events and surprised everybody in the hammer throw by getting the best two marks.

The work of the Tech aggregation was a disappointment to the followers of the Back Bay institution. Allen, who holds the institute pole vault record, failed to qualify at 11 feet, and Lallyngle 4 ft 6 in high and Gray in the hammer throw also failed to qualify.

The new members of the association, Colby and Worcester Polytechnic, did promising work. Though of Worcester put the shot 20 ft 10 in, the best mark of the day, and his teammate, Power, qualified in the hammer throw. Colby scored in the low hurdles, the high jump and pole vault.

### **Is a Class by Himself.**

The work of Gutterosa of Vermont was praised on all sides. He was the star performer of the afternoon. In the high jump he was 22 feet 1 inch, close to the New England record, and surpassing all other competitors. He was the fastest heat in the 22-yard hurdles and hot out to Marble of Brown in the heat for second men in the race over the high barriers only by inches.

Robson of Wesleyan, picked to win both dashes, took his heat in the furlong easily from Hartman of Brown. With Sherman now out of the running he is looked upon as the logical choice for first in the hundred today.

Sherman was kept out at the broad jump or was 14 ft 11 in. He started in the 22-yard dash, but his ankle failed him when half way up the stretch and he was unable to place.

This afternoon the final events will be started at Tech field at 2:30. The 100-yard dash, 400, 800, trial and final heats, and the mile and two-mile runs have been added as features for the second day.

Although the men from Hanover seem to have the best on ice the colleges are second third and fourth in line will probably shift in position as the result of the race today. With Sherman out of the century dash it seems doubtful if Dartmouth will place in that event. Robson of Wesleyan, Baldwin and Roberts of Amherst, Kelley of Williams, Hartman of Brown and Pond of Maine are the strongest possibilities.

At the longer distances Bowdoin hopes to get several points to at least get a second place. H. J. Colbath, who ran the mile in 26:25 in the Maine state meet, has been practically conceded this event, while "General" Stocum is counted upon by the Bowdoin men to do things in the two-mile.

Tech is also looking to these runs to bring up its score. The institute has two sterling long-distance men in H. G. Watkins, two-miler, and L. O. Mills, who is entered in the shorter run. Dartmouth may get points in either event through the work of J. W. Noyes.

### **Baldwin Ran the Fastest Heat.**

In the 200-yard dash yesterday Baldwin of Amherst ran the fastest heat in 2:40. He will probably battle at the finish this afternoon with Robson of

Wesleyan. Salisbury of Tech got his best comfortably from classes of Dartmouth and should make a third place.

Young of Amherst did the fastest time in the quarter-mile, taking his heat in 1:43. Wood of Wesleyan was a close second. Holy Cross secured its only chance in this event with McKenna taking a pretty heat from Augustine of Williams. Another fast heat was that which Lester of Dartmouth won from the Tech sprinter Salisbury. Salisbury was in the lead three-quarters of the way and down the home stretch raced along neck-and-neck with Lester.

In the trial heats for the half-mile the field was bunched nearly all the way in both heats and the judges had more difficulty in picking the winners than in the quarter-mile.

"Fate" White of Tech, suffering with an injured ankle, won in a rough and tumble clash from Baxter of Dartmouth. Gates of Colby took the other heat, with Holmes of Dartmouth almost even with him at the tape. The university of Maine placed all three of her entries in this event. E. T. Walker, F. E. Porter and P. Harmon.

Wendell of Wesleyan did the fastest time over the high hurdles, winning his heat, in which Grant of Tech was a poor second, in 1:52. Ford, Tech's diminutive hurdler, took the first heat from Marble of Brown.

Gutterman of Vermont was the star in the longer hurdle race, Bacon of Wesleyan running second in his last heat of 26 seconds. Edwards of Bowdoin, who broke the record in the recent Maine meet, was placed second to the Amherst star, Roberts.

In the high jump six men qualified at 4 ft 5 in. Palmer of Dartmouth, who is picked to win; his teammate, Thomas, and Herrick of Colby, showing the best form.

Heldman and Jenks of Dartmouth came up to expectations in the pole vault, in which six qualified at 11 ft. Miles of Amherst was an unexpected qualifier.

#### Surprise in the Hammer Throw.

In the hammer throw was a surprise to the Dartmouth men. The Marden brothers, who did over 120 feet in the Harvard meet, not going above 120. Warren and Crosby of Bowdoin showed, the better of the two. The Mardens hope to turn the tables this afternoon.

J. H. Garrison, Wesleyan's star athlete, qualified with a throw of 115 feet in the circus event and took second to Clough of Worcester in the shotput. The summary:

## HARVARD NOW CHAMPION.

Gains Supremacy in Northern Intercollegiate Cricket League by Beating Cornell, 7 to 4.

By winning from Cornell in an extra period game on Soldiers field yesterday afternoon the Harvard lacrosse team secured the championship in the Northern intercollegiate league. The score was 7 to 4, three of Harvard's goals being scored in the extra period of 15 minutes.

In the game proper the playing was very close and Harvard won only on better endurance. At the end of the first period the score was tied at 2 to 2 and also at the end of the second period there was a tie at 4 to 4. Then in the extra time the Harvard players showed their better condition and the wearied Cornellians allowed three easy goals to be made.

In stickwork and in teamwork the Harvard team was superior. J. F. Morgan of Harvard made the opening tally of the game early in the first half, and was followed closely by Walbridge, who scored on a pass from Taylor. Walbridge immediately scored again on a pass from Fries. Harvard made another attempt to score in this period, but the shot went wild. In the scrimmage in front of the goal Carlton knocked the ball into his own net, thus giving Harvard an easy tally.

At the opening of the second half Walbridge scored his third goal on a pass from Taylor. Shaw then scored for Harvard on a very pretty bit of team work, in which J. P. Morgan shared. A few minutes later Carlton, in attempting to pass out from behind his own goal, sent the ball into Smith's hands, and a goal realized before the goal tender could return to his post. Fries made a difficult shot from the side, tying the score for Cornell.

In the extra period of play Blackett, Gustafson and Smith made scores unaided by team work, depending on their own speed to outrun the Cornellians.

For Harvard, Brighton played a splendid game at goal, and Capt Alexander, in midfield, was the strength of the attack. For Cornell, Walbridge and Taylor excelled. The summary:
