

DARTMOUTH AND BOWDOIN LEAD

Tech and Maine Next in Track Trials.

New England Championships Opened at Cambridge.

Worthington of Hanover College Jumps 23ft 3in.

Harry Hillman's Dartmouth track team, which has won eight of the last nine championship track and field meetings of the New England Intercollegiate Association and three of the seven legs on the present trophy, came through in handsome style yesterday on Technology Field, Cambridge, in this year's trials.

Of the 97 men who qualified in the 12 events, competitions being held in all except the mile and two-mile runs, Dartmouth worked 24 of its athletes into the finals, half of them showing in the track events and 12 in the field events, in which today there will be only 36 contestants in the entire field for the 24 points in six events.

The Hanover total also was double that of any other team, Bowdoin ranking second with 12 qualifiers, Institute of Technology, 10; Maine and Colby, nine apiece; Williams, eight; Holy Cross, seven; Amherst, five; Brown and Wesleyan, four; Trinity, two, and Tufts, Middlebury and Massachusetts State, one each.

Well-Balanced Team.

Dartmouth's team showed a remarkable balance also, failing in no event to

score at least one man and having four men come through in the quarter-mile run and shotput, three each in the fifty-long and broad jump, and two in the 100-yard dash and pole vault. In each of the other six events the Hanover team qualified one man.

Bowdoin's showing was excellent, the Brunswick athletes getting into the finals in eight different events, four men counting in the hurdles and two men getting into the high jump finals as well as the discus throw.

University of Maine, handicapped because of the disability of its great sprinter, Rice, did well and looks for more points in today's distance runs, while Technology, putting men into six of the finals yesterday, promises to be well up with the leaders today.

As the result of the trials, Dartmouth must be considered as having improved its chances for another championship which, if won, will give it permanent possession of the intercollegiate trophy. Maine, in spite of ranking only fourth in the trials, continues as the favored contender for runner-up, although Bowdoin is now in a position to enter the real fight.

nearest jump to Worthington's was 22ft 5/16in. by Franch of Maine.

The high jumping was not forced above 5ft 8 1/2in, the last two qualifiers, I. C. White and W. W. Chapin of Brown, setting the better of Teeson of Tech in a jumpoff. Five pole vaulters cleared 1st 2in, but Emery of Dartmouth took some time to eliminate his team-mate, Hulbert, at a height of 10ft for sixth place.

Maine's strong man led the hammer and discus throwers, getting 155ft in the former event and 131ft 5in in the latter. Whitney of Dartmouth made the finals in the hammer and discus as well as leading the shotputters with 42ft, and having three other Hanover weight men come through with him. Qualifier of Maine was second to Bailey in the hammer, and Allen, also of Maine, ranked just below Whitney in the shot.

Fast Performances in View.

Maine's chances were hurt not a little when last year's high jump man, Palmer, failed to qualify, while Guething of Technology did not show in the middle distances.

Today's finals will begin at 3 o'clock and the outlook is for some splendid competition. For the events in which no competition was held yesterday, the mile and two-miles, there are excellent fields. Hill of Maine is expected to come through in the mile run and his performance, if the track is in good shape, should be one of the best of the meet.

DIVORCES NOTED ATHLETE.

Emily T. Gallatin Testifies Letter Signed "Mrs Hammond" Caused Her to Suspect Husband.

MIDDLEPORT, May 21—Emily T. Gallatin of Noroton, today obtained a divorce from Frederick Gallatin Jr of New York city, noted polo player and member of the Union League Club and other organizations, upon grounds of infidelity.

Mrs Gallatin testified that she was Emily C. Trowbridge before being married to the young athlete on April 24, 1922. They have two children.

William A. Keiser, a detective, swore he trailed Gallatin and a man to 45 West 69th st, where they were met by two women. The four went inside and stayed until after 1 a m, then went to 8 West 69th st, according to Keiser, who said the house had once been raided as disorderly.

Mrs Gallatin swore she began to suspect her husband last year. She had opened a letter by mistake. It was addressed to her husband and was signed "Mrs Hammond." It asked why Gallatin had not paid \$25 to Miss Morgan as he had promised. It concluded: "Be a dear and send me a check for \$200 which will cover everything."

The weather did not favor the track events, a strong wind blowing almost into the faces of the contestants in the dashes and the hurdles, and the track was none too springy. The wind, however, while it hurt the performances on the eastern side of the field, did not interfere with the quarter and half-mile runs, as the runners drove with the wind from the start and when going along the back stretches were well protected by the stands. There were no exceptional performances on the track, however, the half-miles being slow and the quarters never faster than 9:25.

In the sprints all three heats of the 300 were run in 1:52-54 and by two Tech runners, Loomis and Deou, with Kelley of Holy Cross. O'Hara of Tech and Driscoll of Williams also qualified in the center, as did Howe of Colby. Hayes of Williams, Boland of Holy Cross, Whitney of Wesleyan and Llewellyn and Coakley of Dartmouth.

Of these, Loomis, O'Hara, Llewellyn, Kelley, Coakley, Driscoll, Howe and Hayes also went into the furlong finals, and with them survived Austin of Williams, Lee of Holy Cross, Allison of Dartmouth and Purnival of Trinity. In the 200 Lee and Howe looked particularly strong.

Lee and Riley Matched.

Lee of Holy Cross and Riley of Dartmouth won the quarter-mile heats and their form suggested that the real racing this afternoon will be between them. Dartmouth put three other men, however, into the final, while Merrill of Colby, who is rated high, came through easily as the fourth man in the slower of the two heats.

Higgins and Granger were the winners of the two heats in the 300, each winning with little trouble, although Granger, when 10 yards ahead of his field, sprinted at the tape to take first place away from Potter of Wesleyan.

In the hurdles, Braun of Dartmouth, Savage and Webber of Bowdoin, Williams of Wesleyan, Ames of Amherst and Royal of Colby, qualified. Savage looked particularly good, as did Royal, Braun not having last year's steam, which hardly was to be expected. Savage won the fastest heat in the low hurdles in 25 3/5 and Braun the fastest high hurdle heat in 15 1/2.

Good Broad Jump.

The field event performances were ordinary with the exception of Worthington's broad jump of 22ft 5/16. Dartmouth also scored Frederick and Nordell. The

Worthington will have to do nearly four inches better than yesterday to break a record in the broad jump, but there is more than an even chance that Whitney will set a mark better than his 42ft 5in for the shotput and that Bailey will approach, if he does not exceed, his record of 145ft 7in in the hammer. Dartmouth Freshman Track Team Defeated—Six New Dual Records Made at Worcester.

WORCESTER, May 22—Worcester Academy won its final track meet of this season today on the Dartmouth freshmen, 56 to 52, on Gaskill Field. Six dual records went by the board and one was equaled. Chamberlain ran the half in 52 2/2-s; Warfield equalled the high hurdle record; Shea set up a new mark of 23 1/2-s in the low hurdles; Murphy threw the hammer 146ft 9in, a new record; Dusossoit put the shot 47ft 8in, breaking the old record by 5ft; Johnson added 10 inches to the pole vault record, doing 11ft 4in.

could have cut a few fifths of a second from his record. The excitement in the race was provided by Shriver of Williams and Coop of Brown, who at the finish were closely punched with Richards of Massachusetts State.

Savage of Bowdoin did all that was expected of him in the hurdles, after his classy showing in the Friday trials. He won his high hurdle trial in 16 2/2-s, taking the final in 16 1/2-s and in the low event he won his trial in 26 3/2-s and the final in 25 3/2-s.

In neither race was he dangerously challenged, either by French of Maine, who ran a splendid race over the high flights, or by Braun of Dartmouth, who was second to the Bowdoin star in the low obstacle race.
Whitney had everything his own way in the shot, Bailey was unapproachable in the hammer, and Worthington, as a broad-jumper, was in a class by himself. In the hammer, Leadbetter of Bowdoin beat Gulliver of Dartmouth by only two inches for second place, and in the broad jump Frederick of Dartmouth
