

# RUNNING OF DRISCOLL AND KING FEATURES

## Letter Turns In Fast Half at N. E. College Meet

### Brown, With 15, Has the Most Qualifiers, Tech Second

The running of James W. Driscoll of Boston College and Thomas King of Holy Cross was the feature of the preliminary trials of the New England Intercollegiate track and field championships, held yesterday afternoon at Tech Field, Cambridge.

The former won his heat in the 40-yard run in 16, running without the least bit of exertion over the last 20 yards. He then qualified in the second heat of the half-mile run, in which King trotted to victory, turning in a 1m 14-1/2 performance, disproving all doubt as to his ability to run that fast.

Brown University led the list of qualifiers with 15, while Massachusetts Institute of Technology, picked to win, was second with 12. Boston College, Bowdoin, Williams and Wesleyan each had seven; Amherst, 5; New Hampshire State, 5; Holy Cross, 4; Tufts, 3; Trinity, Vermont and Massachusetts Agricultural, 2; Maine, Bates and Middlebury, 1.

Of the 12 competing colleges, only Colby and Worcester Polytechnic Institute failed to qualify a man for the finals, which will take place at 2 p. m. today.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology was without two of its best men, "Ted" Spitz, who won the quarter-mile event against Harvard, and F. W. Walton, the pole vaulter. The former had to take an examination yesterday afternoon and Walton suffered an injury to his leg on Thursday.

Brown and Technology each qualified men in eight of the 12 events, Brown failing in both hurdles, the 80-yard run and hammer throw.

G. C. Ames was the big man for the Providence college, qualifying in the pole vault, high jump and running broad jump.

Tech missed out in the 40 yards, both hurdles and broad jump.

The conditions were good, but the performances in the field events, especially in the two jumps, were mediocre.

### Stood Out Prominently

There were several athletes who stood out prominently in the afternoon, Joe Sullivan of Boston College displaying great form in winning his heats in the high and low hurdles, which, with the impressive way Jake Driscoll romped to victory in his heat in the 40 and then qualified in the 80, gives the Old Gold and Mason two men who are sure to score heavily in the finals today.

Capt Richard Howe of Bates, although not by any means a finished runner, won his heat in the half-mile in 2m 1-1/2. He was pocketed 20 yards from home, behind five men, only to turn out almost at right angles and race to victory.

King of Holy Cross College ran the fastest half-mile that has been traveled in New England this Spring when he stopped in 1m 14-1/2 in the second heat of the half-mile, in which Northwilde of New Hampshire State, H. C. Stinson, Wesleyan, and Driscoll were the qualifiers.

Students of sprinting watched the work of H. H. Clark of Amherst in the 60-yard dash, for which distance he was timed in 24-1/2 last Saturday. His form did not indicate any such speed. He won his heat in 22-1/2.

Brown qualified three men in the short sprint, Carter, Cuddeback and Williams, the former making the best time, 19-1/2. Cuddeback pulled up lame, but started in the 20-yard dash and finished in his heat.

H. H. McWhorter of Williams looked the best over the during route, winning the first heat in 22-1/2.

L. Moses, Bowdoin, who won the 120-yard hurdles in the Maine Intercollegiate meet last Saturday and who was looked upon as the stiffest opponent for Sullivan of Boston College, failed to qualify. He has been in the infirmary suffering from tonsillitis for four days and could not get up his usual speed.

Frank Wing, ex-Boston Latin schooler, wearing the colors of Amherst, made the best time in the 20-yard hurdles, winning his heat in 26.

Five men cleared 11 feet in the pole vault, A. H. Chapin Jr., New England Intercollegiate tennis champion from Williams, Ames and J. West of Brown, Chapin and S. M. Cook of Bowdoin, all tied at 11 feet. After M. F. Sheldon, D. H. Carter and A. H. Fletcher, all of Tech, had cleared the same height in the vault off for the other two places, Fletcher resigned in favor of his two teammates.

### Ames Led in the Running High

The running broad jump was only ordinary, Ames leading the qualifiers with a jump of 29 feet 9 1/2 inches. In the running high jump W. Nelson of Trinity, Howell of Brown, Clark of Amherst and P. L. Ash qualified, at 5 feet 9 1/2 inches.

After three others had failed, Ames of Brown and Kimball of Amherst became qualifiers, clearing 5 feet 7 inches.

Kellar tossed the discus 122 feet 1 1/2 inches on his last try. H. H. Nichols of Brown was second, the man who defeated Dartmouth in football last Fall, and was best in the shotput. C. G. Dandrow of Technology led the hammer throwers.

# TECH WINS IN DRIVING RAIN

Beats Brown 33 to 30, Final  
Event Deciding Meet

Remarkable Performances on Track  
Ankle Deep in Water

Massachusetts Institute of Technology's athletes won the championship of "field and stream," when they wallowed in the mud and water to victory in the 34th annual New England intercollegiate track and field championship on the water-covered track yesterday afternoon at Tech Field, Cambridge. The Engineers did not win until the last event, the discus throw, and as the performers were unable to better their records made in the trials of the day before Jack Kellar's big heave of 122 feet 1 $\frac{3}{4}$  inches enabled him to score first, ahead of R. H. Nichols of Brown, who did the best work under yesterday's treacherous conditions.

Technology scored 33 points and Brown totaled 30, with Williams next with 20 $\frac{1}{4}$  and the others scoring as follows: Boston College, 16; Bowdoin, 13 $\frac{1}{4}$ ; Wesleyan, 11; Holy Cross, 10; Amherst, 7; New Hampshire State, 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ; Tufts, 2, and Massachusetts Agricultural College, Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Vermont and Middlebury, one each.

## Conditions Are Terrible

No championship athletic meet was ever conducted under such deplorable conditions. The track was covered by five inches of water, and with a down-pour of rain falling throughout the achievements of the winners bordered on the miraculous. The conditions were so poor that Referee Frank H. Briggs decided to eliminate the danger of having the men compete in the running broad jump and pole vault. The performances made in the trials Friday stood. There was some controversy over the referee's decision regarding the pole vault, in which six men had qualified the first day. Four of the men cleared the bar at 11 feet in the preliminaries, within the customary three trials. Technology had three men who cleared the same height as the others, but each
