

M. I. T. WITH 23 QUALIFIERS, HEADS N. E. INTERCOLLEGIATE FIRST-DAY SHOW

Brown Second in Trials at Track and Field Championship Meeting—Dandrow's Hammer Throw Outstanding Feature—Jake Driscoll's Running Impressive

FINISH OF FIRST HEAT OF 440-YARD RUN AT THE N. E. INTERCOLLEGIATE TRIALS.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology led all colleges in the number of qualifiers in the elimination trials of the New England intercollegiate track and field championship meeting, held yesterday afternoon at Tech Field, Cambridge.

Tech has all along been favored to win the meet, and as a result of the trials qualified 23 in the dozen events that made up the cutting-out process, in only one event failing to score, the running broad jump.

Brown was second to the 1926 champions with 12; Williams was third with 1, and Boston College, winner of the Eastern intercollegiate meet at Springfield, was next in order with 23. The others followed in this order: Bowdoin, 7; Holy Cross, 6; Maine, 5; Worcester, 5; Amherst, 4; Middlebury, 4; Worcester Polytechnic Institute, 3; Massachusetts Agricultural College, 2; Vermont, 2; Colby, 2; New Hampshire State, 2; Bates, 1.

Tech was an outstanding feature, aside from the hammer throw of 1924. It was made by George Dandrow of Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He was the most prominent athlete, qualifying in three events, the discus and shot, as well as the hammer. His throw of the discus-shaped weight was the best, and he was second in the shot with 201 ft. 2 in.

While the athletes were favored with the sun and a good track, a strong wind that blew against them in the sprints and hurdles prevented more noteworthy performances being achieved.

The making of Jake Driscoll of Boston College, last year's champion in the 440-yard run, when he was pulled up in 41-1/2, and in less than 20 minutes later qualified for the final of the 200-yard dash, was impressive.

Tom King of Holy Cross won his heat in the half-mile quite handily. R. C. Silberman of Worcester, who was expected to start in the half-mile, remained idle and will make his try in the mile this afternoon.

No Real Upsets on First Day

There were no real upsets yesterday, but the trials this afternoon are expected to develop some high-grade competition.

Brown was again without Cape Codderback, one of its good sprinters. He suffered a pulled tendon recently, and it was recalled that he did the same thing last year at the meet. However, Carter and Williams, the colored boys, came through for Brown in the 100-yard event, the best time in the qualifying heats being 16-3/8, made by Carter and Ted Spitz of Technology.

U. L. Harden of Technology, who has not been beaten this Spring in the quarter-mile, ran his best in the 440 in 1:01, pulling up over the last 20 yards. Last year's champion, Jake Driscoll of Boston College, won his heat in 1:14.8, having an easier time of it than the Tech man.

The best time in the half was made by "Tom" King of Holy Cross, last year's champion, when he won his heat in 1:11-3/8. The second heat was a baffling race, U. S. Richmond of Williams winning from G. Haden of Tech in 1:16, the former scoring heat over the last stage, while the Tech man was satisfied with qualifying.

Practically the same field qualified in the 200-yard dash as in the 100-yard event. G. H. Haden of Bowdoin making the fastest time, 22 seconds.

Bill Nolan of Boston College, who was the running broad jump at the Eastern intercollegiate meet at Springfield last week, led the qualifiers in the long jump with a jump of 21 feet 7 1/2 inches, while W. I. Bell of Brown, who has been picked to win the event, qualified with 21 feet 3 1/2 inches, tying with his college mate, J. Mayo Williams.

discus event last year, suffered a slight injury to his arm before the competition started, but was able to jump second in the running high jump at 57' 1/2 in. J. West of Brown and A. H. Chapin Jr. of Williams, who with M. E. Sheldon of Technology figured in the six-cornered tie last year, qualified in the pole vault, the first two named clearing the event.

One association record was shattered, two Tech track and field records were improved upon and one track record was equalled at the 35th annual championship meeting of the New England Intercollegiate A. A. at Tech Field yesterday afternoon. The athletes of M. I. T., competing on their home field, ran away with first place, aggregating 46 points, while Boston College, Tech's closest rival, rolled up 23 points—two more than Williams.

Capt Jake Driscoll of Boston College was easily the star of the meet, racing through the quarter-mile run to a new association record of 49 1-5s, and 25 minutes later disposing of Carter, the swift colored sprinter from Brown, for top honors in the furlong dash. Driscoll was ably supported in the battle of points by J. J. Sullivan, the hurdler, and by Nolan, the broad jumper. Sullivan equalled the track record of 25 2-5s in winning the low hurdles, but his defeat by Weise of Colby over the high sticks was a genuine sur-

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prices. Miles captured the running broad jump by a half-inch margin.

Williams Gets Third Place

Williams College was third place by securing 21 points, all second and third places, and Holy Cross, by winning one first, a second, third and fourth place, finished fourth with 11 points. Bates and Brown tied for fifth honors with 10 points each. Amherst finished seventh with 8 points, and then followed Colby with 6, Wheaton with 5, Bowdoin and Vermont with 4 each and State with a solitary point.

The brilliant morning of John Delapoll was the outstanding feature of the meet, especially his remarkable "88" in which he tore through the field that moment it emerged from the chute and then raced all the way round the track. Finally he led G. L. Jordan of M. I. T. by nine yards at the finish. His mile slipped fourth of second from the 16-year-old figure of J. D. Loring of Williams, established at Springfield in 1914, and equaled the Tenth First track record of Tom Hahn of the R. A. A., made five years ago.

The performances of the Baker twins of Mass. College in the one and two mile runs were fine. Richard A. Baker, a senior, first won the mile, about as he pleased, in an 8:14, taking entire command of the race after he had passed the halfway point and holding it tight to front of Crofts and Cook of Williams, who were separated by a yard for second and third places.

Great Race by Ray Baker

Even more sensational and impressive was Raymond B. Baker's win of the two-mile run. He was up near the front from the start, but for a few strides on the half-mile, but was content to trail MacMahon of M. I. T. and Leach of New Hampshire State until he had only a half-mile to go. Then, running well within himself, he carried his field at a 13:30 after pace sets with only one lap to go he shot out as though the others were standing still. He finished at yards in front of MacMahon, who in turn had a mile lead over Leach. Baker's time for the last quarter was 3:18.

Conditions for the meet, and for good performances, were ideal, a cross wind greatly sweeping the field. In the 100-yard dash, after two excellent heats, Miller and MacWhorter of Williams, Bennett and Spina of Tech, Barker of Bowdoin and Carter, the record four cross runners, were the finalists. Carter ran away with half-way down the track, when he crossed to the fence and was by two yards from MacWhorter. Bennett was third and Spina fourth.

The lead of the "88" was a tight race between Colby and Vermont. The tall G. O. leader was under way long before his dusky rival, but Carter kept creeping up and by yards from the finish made his bid. But Vermont possessed greater power sufficient to swing the crown man's path and win by inches.

Sullivan Gets Eight Points

The defeat of Sullivan of Boston College in the high hurdles was a surprise. The Boston College runner topped with the event a year ago and was generally considered victory susceptible, but he was slow to getting out of his holes in his second heat, finishing second, and was down in the final heat, as they ran in a straight line between State of Colby and Williams at the finish. However, Sullivan made short in starting in the lead of the second low hurdles, managed to get under half way through the race and was from Cambridge of Vermont in a blistering finish. Sullivan was forced to cede the lead momentarily to U. S. made by W. A. Savage at 1:00, to win.

The 90-yard run was probably the best race of the day. Tech King of Holy Cross and Jordan of Tech started in the front at the line, with Richmond of Williams and Morgan of Vermont leading the pack. King was leader at the center in 15:15, with Jordan second and State of Bates third. State Richmond and Morgan slipped just as Tech was on the high ground, but never allowed any of his rivals to get very far away, and as the upper turn he closed up, passing them fourth by second place. Strathmeyer was at the head of the stretch, he was after King with a remarkable show of speed, and he came down the field passed the leading Holy Cross runner, who finished second, with Richmond third and

Stephen North. Sawyer's 100 lbs. established new records for the track, representing Joe Hubert in 15:48 of 1915.

Dignan Takes Shotput

The field events were well contested. Tom Dignan of Holy Cross winning the shot with a put of 237 ft. 10 in.; that of M. I. T. holding the hammer shot. He got a new shot record; shotput of Tech being 217 ft. 10 in. with the gold shot. Captain of Tech throwing the javelin 207 ft. 10 in. Clark of Amherst won the 45 lb. shot in the high jump, and Holy Cross of Boston finished jumping 120 ft. 10 in. in the broad jump. Field of Brown, who ultimately was fourth place with 315 ft. 10 in. being led on a jump of 215 ft. and 262 ft. The summary:
