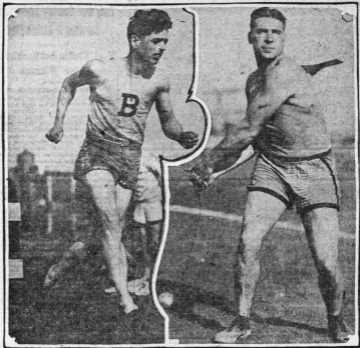


TOOTELL SMASHES HAMMER RECORD

Outstanding First-Day Performance of N. E. Intercollegiates—Tech Qualifies 15, Williams, Bowdoin 11 Each, Boston College 9

Fred D. Tootell of Bowdoin College, the Herculean hammer thrower from Methuen, Mass., contributed the only record, as was expected, in the New England intercollegiate track and field championships, the trials of which were held yesterday afternoon at Tech field, Cambridge.

Tootell threw the weight 166ft 1/2 in., breaking the old mark by more than four feet and doing better than had ever been done before on the Tech field.

The old record was held by H. F. Bally, University of Maine, 161ft 8 1/2 in., made at Soldiers Field in 1914. Tootell got 166ft 1/2 in on his first throw and his record breaking achievement on the second try. He fouled on his third.

John P. Sullivan of Boston College, although he did not better the New England intercollegiate mark in the 20-yard low hurdles, won his heat in 21-1/2, which was one-fifth of a second better than the record for the track made by W. A. Savage, Bowdoin, in 1918.

After the results of the trials had been tabulated, Massachusetts Institute of Technology led the field with 15 qualifiers, Williams and Bowdoin being tied with 11, Boston College had nine, Maine eight, Amherst seven, Bates, Holy Cross, Wesleyan five each, Massachusetts Agricultural College, New Hampshire state four each, Boston University, Brown three each, Middlebury and Norwich two each, Colby and Vermont one each. Seventeen colleges is all figured in the scoring.

There was a strong wind favoring the hurdlers and the dash men, but otherwise the conditions were fairly good. The track was fast and if the weather holds out good, the indications point to some worth-while contests this afternoon when the finals will be held, starting at 2 o'clock.

Javelin on Program for First Time

The best throw in the javelin, 146ft 3/4 in., by E. L. Fellman of Brown, established a record, the event being on the program for the first time. The competitors threw into the wind which accounted for the mediocre performance. Williams College showed strongly in the sprints, Miller and Dodge winning their heats comparatively easy, while Stowers in the quarter-mile showed a performance of 30 4-5s and was not all run out.

The men from the Berkshire Hills showed well, as expected; Technology fell down in two events, when Porter, spruener, and Greenough, high jumper, failed in win a place. Bowdoin, Boston College, fourth in the scoring.

met hard luck. Bob Merrick, hurdler, pulled a tendon after qualifying over the high barriers, and Joseph J. Sullivan, who qualified in the 20-yard dash, finished lame.

These accidents, with the failure to qualify men in the 20-yard dash, the quarter-mile and running broad jump, puts the task up to the men who are to complete this afternoon to do almost the work of aspermen, if the Maroon and Old Gold is to win.

Bowdoin College, which tied for second with Williams, is looking for big things from Tootell, if he should win the hammer, and the discus and score high in the shotput. Tootell was the shining performer yesterday, qualifying in three events.

There were several bits of good racing. Stowers' quarter-mile, the work of Miller and Dodge of Williams in the sprints in 21 1-2s and the achievements of the same two and T. K. Seiberling, Wesleyan in the 20-yard dash. Tom Cavanaugh's excellent run, half-mile in 2m 1-2s, and the dash of R. J. Foster of Bowdoin in the second heat of the same event, enabling him to win from Pat Mahoney of Boston College, indicates that this race is going to be one of the features today. Outside of the performance of Tootell in the hammer, the work of the men in the field events was mediocre.

Sizing Up the Chances

Technology's success will depend on the ability of its representatives to hold their places and the distance runners to do their best. Williams appears to have the best of the sprinters, but is weak in the field competitions, having only qualified one man in the pole vault.

Bowdoin looks like the best team to dispute Tech's claim to supremacy, as its field athletes lived up to expectations and may do better today.

The failure of W. Irving Reid of Brown, who won the running broad jump last year, to qualify, was the biggest upset of the meet.

This afternoon, Tom Cavanaugh and Pat Mahoney of Boston College will be asked to do double duty, running the mile as well as the half, the first-named event being the first of the track finals to be decided.

Honnie of Technology, who has been ill and who is just out of bed, was on the track after the meet. He looked weak. He was counted a sure winter in the two-mile race.
