Williams College, from the Berkshire Hills, of which Little has been said in the pre-most prognostications led the 18 colleges which qualified athletes yesterday in the trials of the annual New England intercollegiate track and field championships, at Tech Field, Cambridge.

Williams qualified 15 athletes.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology was second with 14. Boston College, the favorite, and Bowdoin, winner of the title a year ago, qualified 11 each, as many as the wearers of the old gold and maroon had looked for, and the same number as Bowdoin qualified in the trials in 1923.

The showing of Charlie Beckley's youngsters came as a surprise, and the meet which saw one record broken and a new record for Tech made, is expected to develop a real struggle for supremacy this afternoon, when the first event will start at 2 o'clock. The new record was made by C. C. Brooks of Northeastern, who tossed the javelin 161 feet 8 1/2 inches, the old mark having been 155 feet 2 inches made last year, when the event was added to the program, by E. O. King of Wesleyan. The second man, Hiday of Wesleyan, also beat the old mark. The winner's record also made a new record for Tech Field, as did the discus throw of W. Charles of Bowdoin when the latter tossed the saucer-shaped weight 122 feet 8 inches.

There were several disappointments yesterday, the failure of Joe Tierney of Holy Cross to qualify in the quarter-mile run, being the greatest. Tierney hurt one leg, trying the running broad jump in the dual games with Boston College last week, and after leading in his heat half way down the stretch had nothing with which to fight and finished back in the rack.

B. C. Loses Murphy

Both Boston College and Holy Cross lost the services of men who were expected to score, as Boston College would not allow Owen Murphy to compete in the shot put, he being a transfer from St. Michael's College, and "Jasper" Larri-ves was withdrawn by Coach Hart Sullivan of Holy Cross because he had been at Assumption College before going to the Worcester institution. These losses will be felt, especially the one affecting Boston College, whose task is anything but easy, with the unlooked for strength shown by Williams.

Williams showed a fine trio of sprinters in Creighton S. Miller, who won the 55-yard dash last year, Lindsey V. Dodge and James A. Taylor. All three qualified in the two dashes, and easily showed up stronger than the other dash men. Joe Sullivan of Boston College only qualified in the short dash, being kept out of the furlong because of a troublesome leg. G. Mittelendorf of Colby, credited with "evens" for the 100 in Maine last week is another man the Berkshire Hills will have to beat. Otherwise, the other sprinters did not look good yesterday and these included Douglas P. Jorpe of Technology in the 20-yard dash.

Boston College's hurdlers, Bob Merrick and John P. Sullivan, with the half-milers, miler and two-mile runners, will have to come through today to beat the Williams sprinters. Merrick and Sullivan were easily the class of the timber toppers in the trials, Merrick skimming over the high barriers in 23 1/2-sec. and Sullivan winning his heat in the 20-yard low obstacle race quite handily in 23 1/2-sec.

The Boston College half-milers who were looked upon to have things easy did not look good yesterday. Only Kirley was able to maintain his best pace, while Welch and Pat Mahoney had to struggle to get in. Of the half-milers, R. J. Foster of Bowdoin performed in the most satisfactory manner, even if he did not run as fast as did Kirley.

Flahive Picked in Jump

Williams also qualified more men than Boston College in the field events, in which Boston College is weak, having only Flahive, who is almost sure to win the running high jump in addition to making a new record, and E. P. Gal-

lagher in the javelin throw to pick up points.

The outstanding individual was Curtis C. Brooks of Northeastern. Besides breaking the record in the javelin, he was leading in the shotput and second in the discus throw.

Eighteen colleges qualified men. Following the leading four came Amherst, with George E. Gilmer and Charles R. Drew prominent, and Brown, each with seven. Holy Cross had six, Boston University and Colby, five; Bates and Maine, four each; Northeastern and Wesleyan, three; Massachusetts Aggies and University of New Hampshire, two, and Rhode Island State and Vermont, one each.

The events will begin at 2 o'clock this afternoon, with good competition expected in all of the track events, as well as a struggle for points in the field competitions. The summary:

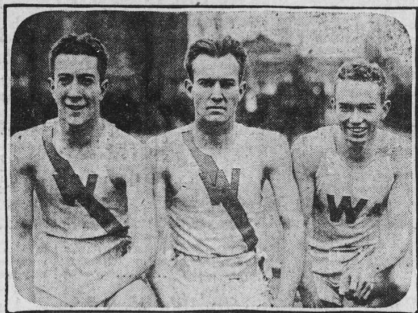

FINAL EVENT GIVES B. C. CHAMPIONSHIP

Merrick and Murphy Get Seven Points in 120-Yard Hurdles— Eagles' Margin 1 1-2 Points

Let the Eagle scream!

Boston College won the annual New England Intercollegiate track and field championship meet yesterday afternoon at Tech Field, Cambridge, but not until the Eagles had been forced to fight hard to trim Bowdoin, winner last year and Williams.

It was not until the last event, the 120 yards high hurdles—ordinarily

the first track contest on the N. E. I. C. A. program—was run that the Eagles rose to the heights no other Boston College team had ever attained, when Bob Merrick won the event as expected, and John P. Murphy, a sophomore, after showing rather ragged form in the semi-finals, fought his way into third place, gaining two points, which enabled Jack Ryder's proteges to win

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the championship by one and one-half points over Bowdoin and Williams, with these two latter each having a finalist.

Williams had a lead of five and a half points over Boston College before the high hurdles were decided, a one-point margin over Bowdoin, and the latter four and a half points over the Eagles, which indicates the *is or die* spirit of Merrick and Murphy as they romped in with the points that gave the Maroon and Old Gold the victory with 32 points. Bowdoin captured fourth place in the hurdles, and when T. F. Coleman of Williams, who had trouble holding his stride between the third and fourth flights, failed to place the men from the Berkshire Hills were shut out, making a tie between Williams and Bowdoin for second place with 20½ points each.

The meet, in which more than 20 colleges competed, narrowed down to an early fight between Boston College and Williams, and it was not until the program was three-quarters finished that the 1932 champions began to take on an air of a championship contender, which made it a three-cornered affair. The other colleges were left in the rear.

Close Fight to Finish

The calculation of points at the finish showed Boston College with 32, Bowdoin and Williams 20½, Massachusetts Institute of Technology 12½, Brown 9, Colby 7, Maine 6, Amherst 6½, Bates and Holy Cross 4, Boston University, New Hampshire and Wesleyan 3, Massachusetts Agricultural College and Vermont 1.

The ill luck that has followed the New England intercollegiate track and field championships was in evidence. It was not rain, but it was a howling wind that kicked up the dirt, which stirred around the open space, necessitated having new sets of hurdles in place, and forced a rearrangement of the program. Record-breaking seemed out of the question because of the conditions, yet C. F. Flahive of Boston College was credited with 41 1/2 in the high jump.

Boston College won because men came through when those looked upon as sure winners failed. John P. Murphy, with lead in the high hurdles, gave the University Heights team its triumph, and was the day's hero. He is a sophomore, a recent development, and fighting with undaunted courage he came through to glory in five stages.

The sprints were run with the wind, while the hurdles were forced to face the gale. Thus the remarkable times in the dashes of 9 1/4 seconds in the 100 and 21 seconds in the 220 may be accounted for, while the running of the high hurdles in 16 3/4 seconds and 26 1/2 seconds over the low obstacles was remarkable.

Early in the program, indications pointed to a matching of the Williams sprinters, Creighton B. Miller, Lindsay V. Dodge and James A. Taylor, against the middle and distance runners of Boston College as regards scoring. The Berkshire Hills trio pulled up 18 points, while Tom Javanough, H. F. McCloskey, in the mile run, George F. Leonard in the two miles, and Arthur F. Kirby, Pat Stabney and Louis Welch in the half-mile, gave the Eagles 12 points.

B. C. Hurdlers Good

Boston College had the better of the hurdles with eight against three for Williams, even if John P. Sullivan, the Boston College man who was expected to win the low hurdle race, failed to get more than one point, being unable to repeat against the howling wind.

Boston College scored three firsts and tied for another in the seven events in which it scored. The running high jump was expected to be easy for Clarence T. Flahive, but the best he could do was to tie Philip Sheenway of Williams at 47 1/2 in. Flahive continued jumping after he had failed three times, and cleared 47 1/2 in., which, however, was allowed as a new record by Referee Briggs. This performance knocked the props from under the old mark, 47 1/2 in., made by E. H. Clark of Amherst at Worcester two years ago. Flahive's four points were the only ones Boston College gained in the field events.

Bowdoin scored in more events, also, getting five first places, while Williams' firsts numbered three, in the 100 yards, 200 yards dash and quarter-mile run, the scoring being confined to six events.

The best individual athlete was Curtis C. Brooks of Northeastern College, who scored 10 points, all that his team made, by winning the javelin throw, and second places in the shot-put and discus throw. He threw the javelin 127 1/2 ft., which was better than the record of 121 ft. 11 1/4 in. made Friday, but the record was not allowed because of the strong wind.

The 100 yards dash had C. B. Miller, L. V. Dodge and James Taylor of Williams, Joseph J. Sullivan of Boston College, Maurice Finn of Boston University and G. L. Mittendorf of Colby in the final. The race narrowed down to a duel between Miller and Dodge, which the former won, with Mittendorf third. Joe Sullivan, competing with a bad leg, had enough to beat out Taylor, which was another instance of the fighting spirit of the Boston College team. The time of the winner was 9 1/4, the same

Bill Miller made in the scuffed and the strong wind at the runner's back.

In the 100-yard dash Miller, Taylor and Dodge of Williams carried off the first three places with Dodge the winner, Miller second and Taylor third, while fourth place was picked up by J. Turbell of Bowdoin. D. F. Jeppe of Technology, who was expected to have much to say regarding the points, failed to score. The winner's time was 2 seconds, aided by a breeze blowing at a greater pace than earlier in the day. Jeppe had previously run in the quarter mile, which showed he could not repeat.

In the 150-yard run, Jeppe raced away in front and held the lead until half way down the home stretch where he was challenged by Walter McWhiff of Holy Cross. There was a strong head wind at the time, and from out of the run George F. Perkins of Williams rushed, beating the other two in the race, while Jeppe had just enough to stall off McWhiff for the place and C. Hamilton of Bowdoin grabbed fourth away from Clarence Archibald of Bates, the Maine Intercollegiate champion, in 2:24 seconds.

Robert J. Foster of Bowdoin, one of the three of last year's champions to retain his title, ran an excellent race in the 200-yard run. Foster took the lead on the backstretch of the last lap. Behind him were Art Kirley of Boston College, and the others. Kirley challenged the Maine flyer down the home stretch, but could not hold on and Foster continued to a brilliant victory in 2 minutes 12 seconds. Kirley was second with Pat Mahoney and Welch, also of Boston College, the latter coming from out of the pack with a rush, finishing in that order.

Tom Cavanaugh, the Boston College runner, ran a race as a champion should. He took charge of the field from the start in the mile run and raced on without even being threatened. Cavanaugh's first quarter was done in 24:25 seconds, the half mile in 50:25, the three quarters in 1:15:25 and the mile in its 2:55. H. P. McLaughlin, Boston College freshman, ran a game race and fought off William of Maine and Holt of Bates, getting second place in Cavanaugh's wake, while Hillman just beat Holt for third place.

Two-Mile to Lermont

George Lermont of Boston College allowed the big field in the two-mile to do what it pleased until half a mile from home when he went to the front. Payne of Colby led at the end of the first mile in 10:55, but, like McWhiffy of Bates, he cracked under the terrific pace that Lermont set. McWhiffy gained second place, beating Payne by a close margin, while F. W. Peaslee of New Hampshire was fourth in 22:15, a really high class performance under the conditions.

The finalists in the low hurdles were H. G. Littlefield of Bowdoin, Dudley E. Brown and G. M. Needham of Brown, J. P. Sullivan of Boston College, H. W. Ambush of Technology and C. S. Withard of Williams. Sullivan found the conditions too rough for him as Littlefield raced on to a remarkable victory and Withard of Williams called second place, while Ambush of Technology also finishing ahead of last year's champion in 2:45 seconds, a second slower than Sullivan traveled a year ago when he won.

Bob Merrick and J. P. Murphy of Boston College, H. G. Littlefield of Bowdoin, Charles D. Drew of Amherst and T. P. Coleman of Williams met in the final of the high hurdles race. Coleman had run second to Merrick in the trial and scuffed beats, and the followers of the Eagles were fearful that he might continue in the same manner. Merrick raced like a champion, and Coleman had a tough time keeping his strides between the sticks. Before he could get righted the others were out ahead of him and Drew picked up second place with Murphy third and Littlefield fourth in 3:24 seconds.

The only changes in the field events, in which performances were carried over from Friday, were in the shotput and broad jump, in the former of which W. Charles of Bowdoin tossed the iron sphere 42 feet 7/8 inches, surpassing the best put by C. C. Brooks of Northeastern the day before. F. E. Bishop of Bowdoin, who was the pole vault last year, repeated with a much better performance than in 1925 when he cleared 11 feet 6 1/2 of an inch. Sanford of Tech II was second, and W. K. Higgins of New Hampshire was third, with Ching W. Chen of Tech, and Philip Skamney of Williams tied for fourth.

W. J. Reid of Brown supplanted Maurice Finn of Boston University as the winner of the running broad jump, with a leap of 22 feet 5/8 inches. Drew of Tech improved his throw with the hammer to 142 feet 7/8 inches. W. Charles of Bowdoin, and, in fact, all of the discus throwers, were unable to improve their performances of the trials on Friday.

Hardy's Absence Costly

The failure of M. R. Hardy of Bowdoin, who won the high hurdles last year, to accompany the team from Brant-

wick, Me, took some scoring strength away from last year's champions, as he was looked upon as a sure point scorer in both timber topping events. The summary:
