

# BOWDOIN QUALIFIES 15 MEN, MAINE 14

## Close Battling in New England Meet—Tech and B. U. in List, Eagles Third

BRUNSWICK, Me., May 26—The shades of night were falling fast as the 15 or more contestants in the trials for the pole vault struggled for supremacy at the 41st annual championship meeting of the New England Intercollegiate Athletic Association this afternoon, and before the contest had simmered down to the six men qualified to compete in the finale tomorrow afternoon it was so dark that the crossbar, 11 feet 8 inches above the ground, could be seen only with difficulty.

In spite of the heavy rains for the past week, Whittier Field, on which the meet is held, is in fairly good condition, and if the sun shines in the morning, as the Weather Man has promised, the field will be in condition for record-breaking performances Saturday afternoon.

It rained today nearly up to the time for the meet to start and then let up for the trials.

The meet is the first one ever held under the auspices of the association outside of Massachusetts.

One hundred and nine athletes qualified at the trials this afternoon. Of that number Bowdoin and Maine qualified the greatest number, 15 Bowdoin men and 14 from Maine surviving for the finale.

The number qualified by the other colleges were:

Boston College 11, Holy Cross 10, Massachusetts Institute of Technology 9, Williams 8, Bates 8, University of New Hampshire 6, Boston University 5, Brown 5, Rhode Island State 3, Wesleyan 3, Worcester Polytechnic Institute 3, Middlebury 2, Northeastern 2, Tufts 2, University of Vermont 2, Amherst 1 and Massachusetts Agricultural College 1. Colby failed to qualify any men today.

### Hussey, B. C., Qualifies

In the finale of the 100-yard dash will be found Francis Hussey of Boston College, Ernest Merrill of Boston University, Howard Mestrom of Bowdoin, Jim Quinn of Holy Cross and a group of lesser lights. Hal Broada of Brown, who expected to figure in this event, did not start, being held for the 440-yard run.

J. S. Collier of Brown made the best time, 13 4-5 seconds in the high hurdles and is the favorite to win tomorrow. Capt. H. G. Steinbrener of Technology, although making the slowest time of any heat winner today, should do much better tomorrow. Nate Greene of Bowdoin, who won the event at the Maine intercollegiate last week, ran a close second to P. V. Tolin of New Hampshire.

One of the surprises of the meet came in the trials for the 440-yard run when C. T. S. Keep, Williams, who had been picked as a possible winner, was shot out.

This happened in the third heat. On the first turn Hal Broada of Brown, who started well on the outside, jumped for the pole, which he snatched from Keep, who from that point on began to lose ground and finished in 15th position.

Frank Burns of Holy Cross won the first heat in this event handily. Neither James Baker nor Max Wakeley of Bates, who won the State meet last week in a dead heat, placed in the trials.

### Best Put by Thompson

Dan Torrey of Maine, after failing to place in the high hurdles, defeated J. L. Collier of Brown in the trials in the 22-yard event in the fastest time of the afternoon.

Capt. Steinbrener of Technology and P. V. Tolin of New Hampshire cleared the barriers well in advance of competitors in their respective heats.

A majority of the stars who qualified in the trials for the century dash also qualified for the finale. Francis Hussey of Boston College with 22 1-5 seconds was credited with the best time.

Although Boston College qualified four out of the nine men in the 800-yard run, Max Wakeley of Bates is looked upon as the probable winner, his time, of 2 minutes 1 1-5 seconds, in the second heat being two seconds better than was made in either of the other heats.

As was expected, Thompson of Maine made the best put in the shot, but "Doc" Hill of Bowdoin, who was the favorite for second place, barely nosed into the finale, his best put being nearly three feet less than he made at Orono last Saturday.

Seven men cleared the bar at 5 feet 8 inches in the high jump and were allowed to qualify for the finale. The University of Maine had four men clear the bar at 11 feet 5 inches in the pole vault today to qualify; Kendall of Bowdoin and Jack of Tech being the others to survive for the finale. Today's vault was the highest that Gaffey, Sutherland and Proctor of Maine had ever made.

Stan Howe of Bates, who was expected to win the broad jump, only qualified in third position; John White

of Tech leading the field with a leap of 21 feet 3 inches.

### Hoile in Form Again

In the hammer throw special interest was centered around R. Bruce of Rhode Island State, a pupil of Fred Toocell, former Bowdoin star. Bruce qualified with a throw of 137 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Winslow Pillsbury of Bowdoin made a throw of 124 feet 10 inches, as compared with his throw of 145 feet 1 inch, which won the event last year.

R. Hoile of Bates, who failed to even qualify in the discus at the State meet last week, with a throw of 129 feet 4 1/2 inches is nearly five feet ahead of his nearest competitor.

A bad arm prevented Jack Lyden of Maine from exerting himself in the javelin throw this afternoon, his best throw being 120 feet 8 inches. With warm weather tomorrow he is expected to break the record of 194 feet 11 inches made by Sager of Bates last year.

Late this evening the clouds cleared away and the stars came out, giving promise of a pleasant day tomorrow.

Brunswick, Me., May 21.—(AP.)—

Two records were broken and two equalled at the 41st annual New England at Bowdoin College today. The meet was exceedingly close with the University of Maine the winner over Bowdoin by two and one-half points.

Bowdoin captured second place by 3-4 of a point over the Massachusetts Institute of Technology which had 21.

Boston College finished fourth, with 20 points. The other teams to score were: Bates, 15; Holy Cross, 13 1-2; Brown, 8; New Hampshire, 8; Rhode Island, 7; Colby, 7; Vermont, 5; Williams, 4; Boston University, 3; Middlebury, 3; Worcester Tech, 2; Wesleyan, 1 1-2.

Captain Otis A. Kendall of Bowdoin cleared the bar at six feet, one and one-eighth inches in the high jump, breaking the record of six feet, three-quarters inches established by R. H. Clark, of Amherst in 1922. In the 220 yard low hurdles Captain H. G. Steinbrenner of Massachusetts Institute of Technology was clocked in 24 seconds, clipping two-fifths of a second off the record of W. A. Savage of Bowdoin, which has been standing since 1916.

In the 880 yard run R. F. McCloskey of Boston College tied the record of one minute, 55 seconds, held by G. J. Leness of Massachusetts Tech, and in the 120 yard hurdles Captain Steinbrenner equalled the mark of 15 and 1-5 seconds made by A. B. Shaw of Dartmouth in 1918.

The strength of the University of Maine in the pole vault won the meet for that college.

Favorites won practically all events, the only real upset of the afternoon being in the final heat of the 220 yard dash when Howard Mostrom, the Bowdoin flash, who pulled a tendon in a trial heat, failed to place. Excellent weather and track conditions prevailed. Massachusetts Aggies scored one point, while Amherst, Tufts and Northeastern failed to score.
