

CROSSADERS LEAD IN N. E. TRIALS

Gilbane and Footrick Break Meet Marks

MacDonnell and Stanwood Fall in High Hurdles Heats

PROVIDENCE, May 20.—Body Cross placed 12 men in the trials of the 6th annual New England Intercollegiate track meet here this afternoon to lead the field, but Maine and New Hampshire, last year's champions, were close upon the Crusaders' heels with 28 men each.

Boston College placed nine men, gaining places in eight events, while Bowdoin, second as the favorite, placed eight, as did Brown and Rhode Island State.

Massachusetts' Institute of Technology will have seven men for mile, half-mile and half-mile hurdles, Northeastern and Colby five each, Wesleyan and Williams four each, Amherst three, Bates two and Boston University and Tufts one each.

All the field events and the 120-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash, 200-yard run and 400-yard run reached the finals today, but the trials were raced in the 100-yard dash and the low hurdles.

Two Records Improved

Two past records were improved today. Tom Gilbane of Brown set a new mark of 28 feet 8 1/2 inches in the shotput and Bill Footrick of Springfield College set a new mark in the javelin throw when he hurled the spear 217 feet 9 1/2 inches.

Few upsets occurred in the trials, but a peculiar circumstance retarded the high hurdles of the two men who were expected to put up a stirring battle for the championship.

Art MacDonnell, the Holy Cross man, who has been topping the hurdles in great form all season, struck the third hurdle in the opening heat and went toppling to the winners. He regained his feet, but finished far in the rear, Stanwood of Bates, defending champion, was with a similar fate. He struck the fourth hurdle and failed to place.

Dick Bell of Tech equaled the Brown field record in the 100-yard dash when he took his rival in 20 seconds, leading Gordon Winslow of Holy Cross by more than a yard.

Great 400 Final Assured

Arnold Adams of Bates, winner last year, Leslie McCallister of Holy Cross and Jack Holland of the Crusaders won their 400 heats, assuring a great battle tomorrow in the final. Alvin Sweet of Amherst ran a beautiful race in his half-mile trial, winning as he placed in the best heat of the day, the 1-2s.

Twelve men qualified for the semi-finals in the 100-yard dash, with Stanley Knight of Rhode Island and G. M. Miller of Williams setting the pace at 20 seconds flat. The final qualifying heat of this event was run in 43-2 seconds. Eight of Springfield College and Middlebury of Boston College were sure of placing and jumped over the crossbar.

Competition for places in the final events was keen. Six men qualified in the running high jump at 5 feet 9 1/2 inches, and six cleared 22 feet in the pole vault.

Only three inches separated the six leaders in the broad jump, assuring some hot competition in the final.

Gilbane's throw in the shotput was a foot 4 inches better than the past mark set in 1911 by Larry Whitney of Dartmouth. Gilbane also leads in the discus throw competition with a heave of 131 feet.

Bill Footrick of Springfield beat the old record in the javelin throw by 7 feet 1/2 inch. It was made by J. A. Johnston of Tech last year. The summary:

Bowdoin Lacks Two Points Of Title In Meet

Two points separated the winner, Boston College, and the runner up Bowdoin, in the 40th annual New England track and field games held Saturday at Providence, R. I. The men of Magee fought the Eagles every step of the way but with Captain Charlie Starwood, defending champion in two events, competing under the severe handicap of two heavily bandaged knees, the result of a Friday fall in the high hurdles, six points which would have meant victory for the Maine champions flittered away in the hurdles, and in the high jump he was unable to compete in defense of his title.

Boston College scored 21; Bowdoin 19; Brown 15; M. I. T. 17. Maine and Holy Cross, which led the qualifiers, tied for fifth with 12 each. Springfield and New Hampshire, the latter defending champion, scored 11, Wesleyan and Bates made eight each to lead Colby, Northeastern, and Williams with 7; Amherst and Tufts with 3 and Rhode Island with 1.

ADAMS DEFENDS

OF THE seven champions present to defend their titles in eight events only three, Arnold Adams, Daley, D. L. Gallwey, Bowdoin, and Tom Gilman, Brown did so successfully. Despite heavy showers, following upon extremely hot weather, and a track made soft by rain seven new track records for the Brown University field were made in the running events, while three New England marks were bettered in the field.

In the 400 yard race, about which local interest was chiefly centered because of the presence of Arnold Adams, Bates, defending champion and record holder, the Harvard star demonstrated his superiority in convincing fashion leading the field by a full eight yards. Bernie McCaffery, Holy Cross was whom Adams upset here last year, was slow at the start, and although a terrific surge carried him from 15th to second in the last 100 yards, he did not seriously threaten Adams whose time of 4:4 seconds set a new Brown field record but did not equal that which he turned in last week in the State meet.

Tough On Starwood

While it is undoubtedly true that with Starwood in condition and able to perform at his best, Bowdoin, whose handling job of Starwood, McLaughlin and Allen were responsible in no small part for the Maine meet victory of the Magee men, could have won the meet, still it must be recorded that the best McLaughlin could do was two points as both Whitehouse, New Hampshire, and Fleming, University of Maine star, surprised the Bowdoin entry.

Whitehouse won the 110 high hurdles in 15 1/2 seconds. McLaughlin was slightly slower, but the time was no better than that turned in by Starwood in the State meet last week. In the 220 yard low hurdles it was Fleming, second to McLaughlin in the State meet, who won out the Bowdoin star for first place, thereby taking from Bowdoin the two points here which would have given a tie, at least, with Boston College. Allen of Bowdoin was third, and Starwood a plucky fourth in this event.

Wilson Fourth

If Bowdoin lost expected points in the hurdles they gained one back when Lavender, Bowdoin, held gamely to third place in the two mile despite the desperate attempt of Norman Witter to pass him on the home stretch. Witter, paced by Johnson for the first three quarters of a mile, had set a too rapid pace early in the race, been forced to drop back, and then started a finish sprint just too late to carry him into third place.

New meet records, although absent in the track events, were set up in the weights by Thomas Gilman, Brown whose 48 best 18 1/2 inches in the shot put, bettered his previous day's mark by four inches. Dave of Williams jumped to a height of 4 feet 1 1/2 inches to take the high jump in which even Starwood, who did his best with this trouble in the State meet, was unable to compete. His points in this event would have won the meet for Bowdoin. The third record to go was the javelin where Patrick, Springfield sang the spear 120 feet for a new mark.

Meets Compare Closely

A comparison of times made in the New England and in the State meet at Bates reveal a surprising closeness which shows that when the four Maine colleges get together on the track their performances are on par with New England's best. For instance McLaughlin, Bowdoin won the 100 yard dash in the State meet here in ten seconds flat, while the winning time by Ed, M. I. T., at Providence was 10 1/2 seconds. Likewise was McLaughlin's time in the 220 yard dash better than that made in the New England by Frank of Wesleyan. The Bowdoin man won the State meet 220 in 27 4/5 seconds, three seconds faster than the New England time.

Starwood's State meet time in the high hurdles was equalled but not bettered by Whitehouse in the New England, while Fleming's winning time Saturday was identical with that turned in by the winning McLaughlin in the State meet. Both Hathaway and Webb could have gone higher than 12 feet 1 1/4 in the State meet polevault, while the winning marks by Hathaway and Brown, of Brown were only two inches more.

Differences In Weights

One and the eighth inches was the total difference in the high jump mark turned in by Erner, Williams, new England proved better, and Starwood of Bowdoin, in the State meet. Starwood could have gone higher in the State meet, but was not pushed.

In the weight events, the widest discrepancies are manifested. Mitchell's mark in the shot put was four feet under that of the New England winner, Gilman, while Patrick who won the State meet threw toward the platter 12 feet under the mark made by Kynch, Saturday. In the javelin, too there is a wide variation. Ponty's toss in the New England's being nearly 22 feet farther than Mitchell's mark in the State meet.

Only Gallwey, Bowdoin and opposite State meet scores in weight events against those turned in at the New England. His toss here was slightly more than five feet better than his mark of 120 feet 1 1/4 inches which was at Providence.

NITELAWES SCHEDULE

The Big Nitelawes were rained out at North Stratham on Saturday and the game has been postponed until Wednesday at 2 o'clock. The local newspaper contingent with a 4-1 win over Leavitt and a 21-7 decision against Edward Little is also slated to go against the strong Bradford town team, champions of the Merrimack valley league on Saturday. These two teams met last year and the Nitelawes won a wild game 12-14 when March state home.

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
