17 IN N. E. I. C. FINALS

Little Rhody Qualifies 16 in Trials
On Brown Track—High Wind
Prevents Record Feats

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 23—

Progressing normally on the track and practically devoid of spectators afield, the trials of the 50th New England Intercollegiate on Brown's wind-raised premises this afternoon moved Holy Cross and R. I. State, anticipated dualists for the title, into tomorrow's finals with the greatest numbers of qualifiers.

The Crusaders, with 17 advancing athletes, exceeded Little Bloddy by one. The remainder of the field, headed by Maine with eight survivors, fell far behind. Boston College, Brown, Bowdoin and Tufts each had moved seven athletes into the finals at the completion of eliminations in 11 of the 13 events.

Spanolan "Hot" in Sprints

Although a following wind prohibited the efforts from being officially recognized two meet records were matched. Larry Spanolan of Holy Cross, unopposed in winning all his heats in both dashes, established a 58 seconds effort for the century and Al Hakanson of Northwestern rushed over the four hurdles in 4 seconds.

Spanolan's 58 seconds best in the running was also a noteworthy feat, being only a "fifth" shy of the championship record despite the fact the Kentdale Hurdler did not get on the ground.

Patrol by sophomore Bill Callagy of Holy Cross, who qualified in three field events, 14 athletes survived trials in two events apiece, some sort of a record for "doubleing" in these games.

The strategic masterpiece of the trials was the unexpected and successful move by Coach Bert Sullivan of R. I. State, who saw Capt Joe Murphy in the quarter, set the field pole. The extent of this move can be appreciated by Murphy's impressive win in his heat to give Holy Cross three finalists in this event. Al Bates and Bert Graham also qualifying with ease.

The only spot of any consequence came in the javelin, where the blustering breeze cut the efforts of all competitors nearly to wholesale distances, and brought about the elimination of Eugene of Brown, for two years a flyer.

While well off the meet record, Capt Stanley Johnson, of Tufts eclipsed the Brown field record in leading the six qualifiers in the broad jump, spanning 23 feet, 3 1/2 inches as Tufts and Brown qualified two men each in the event.

Good Year Third Hurdle

The final of the 100-yard dash tomorrow will be unique in that only three colleges will be represented. Holy Cross has Larry Spanolan and Walter Janiak, Boston University advanced John Cummings and Al Hicks, and the Maine school twins, Murray and Huff, complete the field.

Spanolan seems nearly impossible to head off from a sprint "double."

Pat Good of Bowdoin, with a good 14.8 seconds high hurdle effort, appears to be headed for his third successful "double" in the hurdles. Hakanson of Northwestern will afford very serious resistance over the low, however.

Off its sports account of being in the trials, Holy Cross can only win gaining its first New England title tomorrow by relegating. It should run up close to 24 points and may open up a gap of at least six points over the challenging R. I. State, whose defending champion, Jack Huff, was far back in a fourth qualifying position this afternoon.

GOOD, VEYSEY AND BELL OUTSTANDING IN N. E. 'S; HOLY CROSS IS WINNER

Providence, R. I., May 24—(AP)—Phil Good of Bowdoin and Cliff Veysey of Colby lugged back to Maine today records of outstanding performances in the New England I.C.4-A games here.

Each won his specialty for the third successive year. Good equalled the meet record of 24 seconds in the low hurdles, and led the high hurdlers to the finish. Veysey had but little opposition from a field of two-milers, and loped home in 2:41.

In the team scoring, the University of Maine, runner-up at Portland last year, tied for sixth place with M. I. T., each had 12 6-11 points.

Bowdoin was in fourth place with 17 3-11 points; and Veysey's victory gave Colby five points.

Holy Cross, with scorers in nine of the 16 events, piled up 35 3-11 points to become the new champs. Brown, with 23 6-11 points was runner up. Rhode Island State was third with 20.
