

# R. I. SUSTAINS TRACK THREAT

## Qualifies 16 in N. E. Meet to 13 by Holy Cross

### B. C. Third With 10 as Zaltz Sets Shotput Record

Although both suffered serious relapses at supposedly invulnerable portions of their respective encroachments, the prophecy that defender Holy Cross and challenger Rhode Island would engage in a dog-eat-dog fight for the New England track championship this afternoon apparently will be fulfilled.

Out on M. I. T.'s broad expanse of cinder and grassward in the trials of the first consecutive competitions yesterday the two squared off immediately, with Little Rhody gaining a slight edge in the matter of surviving contestants.

Sixteen men from Kingston pulled through trials in 11 events, Holy Cross being close up with 11 in its desperate efforts to fortify its throne. Back of this binding grapple between the favorites came Boston College with 10, the Eagles from the Heights putting on a bang-up show of sprint power.

#### Zaltz Pops a Long One

One record crumbled, that is the Tommy Zaltz, the resplendent Neuman from Boston College, who pegged the shot 511 1/2 feet on his second effort in the circle. Zaltz erased his own record of 501 1/2 feet, made at Portland two years ago, and has six tries for a better mark today.

There were minor spots in profusion, but none so vital to the forward march at Rhode Island as the dismal showing of "Shorty" Folwarty, its giant hammer thrower, who went pppfft—gaining no better than the fourth qualifying spot in his specialty. The Austrian muscle man was fully 50 feet off his "form" at 151 1/2 feet, and while Coach Fred Tortil was not ready to concede the meet lost right, he was despairing of his squad's chances.

Rhody, too, was dealt a telling blow in the 100-yard dash when John Taylor, its two-time 550 entry, was cleanly eliminated in his semifinal heat.

#### Cruaders Also Falter

But Holy Cross prevented this inviting retreat to safety and an opportunity to strengthen its defenses around the throne, itself faltering.

Bill Galingly, a 1935 scorer in the event, was shut out of the six qualifying spots in the javelin, and when the shotputters had completed their qualifying trials he was only fifth among the six finalists. Unless the versatile Warwick strong boy pulls out a good throw today, the Purple advance will be seriously impeded. He had a throw of only 411 1/2 feet, at least a foot back of his normal range.

The running of George "Black" Quinn, the closely cropped New Hampshire junior, and sophomore Bob Loyd of Boston College stood forth in the general run of uniformly sound performances on the track in the trials.

Quinn, contrary to expectation, is gaining for a "double," for he qualified in both the 440 and 330 with carefully calculated pace. Taking him off the fashionable efforts with which he took his trials in stride, it is going to take dynamic running to head him off in his search for two titles.

#### Lloyd in Great Form

Sprinting with the fast-class action of a seasoned dash man, young Lloyd of B. C. was positively terrific in the 100 and 220 trials. He sailed through his semifinal of the former in 16.1 seconds of the afternoon, and looked equally impressive in virtually rearing away with his darling trial.

Although Larry Scoules of the Cross, defender in both dashes, had an all-winning afternoon in the trials, he unquestionably will be expected to stand off this blazing Beltonite boy in the maroon and gold siks.

Whatever hope Boston College had of blasting through any apertures raised by Holy Cross and R. I. runners was defeated in the second semifinal heat of the high hurdles. Tom McFarland, steam-lined "Blazer," sat on the second flight while leading and sprawled to the track.

Twofold runner-up in both hurdles, Ray "Harpie" Henderson of Northwester, by virtue of his fast, flawless performances yesterday, remains the boy to beat in both events. McFarland returned to the line to try his trial and probably will be Henderson's chief worry there.

#### 330 Still Up in Air

The trials of the 330 failed to dispel the shroud of mystery surrounding that event. If anything they added to the general confusion. Ed Van Dwing of Amherst came tearing out of nowhere to win the trial heat in the very fancy trial of the 330. Carl Morrill of R. I., a 1934 state man, rolled off a fast 16.1. The co-favorites—Doug Raymond of B. U. and the crackling Quin of B. H.—will also be running the quarter-mile final 35 minutes earlier.

Also, Bill I. C. 4-A, champion from Maine and N. E. trial, is well set ahead of the javeliners; Bill Dow, the grand competitor from Rhode Island, fashioned late leads

# BATES, LED BY KISHON, FINISHES FIFTH IN N. E. TRACK MEET; LEADS RIVALS

State of Maine track athletes, particularly those wearing the garnet colors of Bates College, turned in fine performances at the annual New England Intercollegiate track and field meet at Tech field in Boston Saturday. Bates led other Maine teams, finishing fifth, behind Rhode Island who won the title.

Northeastern was second scoring 15 points, just six and half less than the team coached by Fred Tootel, former Bowdoin weight star. Holy Cross, defending champs, was third with 17 and Boston College fourth with 15. Bates followed with 12 and then came Brown with 11½. Other scores in order were: Maine 10½, M. I. T. 10½, Williams 8, Bowdoin and Springfield 7 each, New Hampshire 6, Boston University 5, Wesleyan 4, Colby 3, Middlebury 2, Vermont 1 1-2, Amherst 1 while Conn. State, Mass. State and Tufts failed to score.

For Bates, Tony Kishon won the hammer throw and finished third in the discus and fourth in the shot. Bill Lukke was fourth in the high and low hurdles and Gene Connell was third in the javelin.

For Maine, Murray was fourth in the 100 yard dash, Hardison finished in a four way tie for first in the pole vault with 12 feet and 6 inches, Bell won the javelin and Hurwitz was third in the 220.

For Bowdoin, Bob Porter won the mile, Melendy was fourth in the javelin and Stanwood fourth in the 220.

Colby points were won by Turbyne who finished second in the 220 behind Scanlon of Holy Cross who equalled the meet record of 21.4 seconds in that event.
