

Power In Field Events Brings Title To Rams

Holy Cross Second; Dugger Sets Hurdle Record; Flaherty Is Upset

Cambridge, Mass., May 24—(AP)—Rhode Island State's prowess in the field events produced all but seven of its 30 2-3 points today to regain for the Rams the New England intercollegiate track and field team title in the finals at Briggs Field.

Maine Places 4 To Finish In 10th Place

Cambridge, Mass., May 24—The University of Maine, placing men in four events, finished 10th in the New England track and field championships here today.

The men from Orono earned a total of seven points to top the totals of five amassed by Bowdoin and Colby and Bates' total of three.

Herb Johnson, a junior, made the best showing for the University of Maine, taking second in the discus throw. Bob McLeary threw the javelin 181 feet, 4 inches on his last attempt in the trials yesterday to place third. Sophomore Dwight Moody ran fourth in the two-mile, and John Radley took another fourth in the 440.

The only first place earned by a State of Mainer went to Colby. Gil Peters won the high jump to earn his team's five points. He later failed in trying to break Danny Miles' meet record of 6 feet, 4 1-4 inches.

Ray Huling, taking second in the broad jump and John Dickinson, placing third in the 220, scored Bowdoin's five points. Bates' three came when John Sigsbee placed third in the shot put and Dave Nickerson landed a fourth in the 300.

That superiority spelled disaster for defending Holy Cross, which finished second with a total of 24 1-3 points in this 55th annual competition, its glaring weakness in the field producing but three and one-third of the point tally.

Boston College finished third with 22, most of its scoring coming from the muscular ability of its Sugar Bowl football heroes, while the Tufts combine of dusky Ed Dugger and Walter Hall piled up 16 points in the two hurdle events to give the Jumbo team fourth place.

One association record went by the boards despite the squally day, marked by occasional bursts of rain. Dugger, winning his fifth and sixth New England titles in the hurdle events over a three-year span, whipped over the low timbers in 23.7 seconds, one-tenth under the old record, which he shared with Ken Clapp of Brown.

Dugger also won the high hurdles in 14.5 seconds, equalling his own association record. Hall ran second in both events.

Rhode Island spread its scoring over eight events, captured four individual titles in regaining the crown it held from 1937 to 1940.

Norman Wilcox of the Rams won the hammer throw with a toss of 172 feet 8 3-4 inches to upset favored Matt Flaherty of New Hampshire. Bill Forsstrom leaped 23 feet and 7-8 inch to capture the broad jump, his mark being scored in Friday's trials. Jack Kreuger heaved the 16-pound shot 48 feet 2 inches and Bob Nichols won the mile in 4:20.2 to round out the quartet of titles.

Nichols and Kreuger were two of seven sophomores who dominated the title grabbing. The former, a resident of Cranston, R. I., won the association title in cross-country last Fall; ran second to Les MacMitchell of

NYU in the IC4A race and third in the National collegiate event. His victory today was a decisive upset over favored Jack Haley of Holy Cross. That and a complete shutout of the Crusaders in the 880, in which they expected to score several points, ended any Holy Cross hopes that weakness in the field could be offset by superiority in the running events.

When Lloyd was obtained by the Braves in May, it was hinted his brother might join him before the season ended. Manager Casey Stengel said then he was dissatisfied with his outfielders, that Lloyd would replace one of two who were to be released.

Since coming to Boston, Lloyd has been used as a spare for 40-year-old Johnny Cooney. But on the recent western trip with the Braves, Lloyd compiled a phenomenal batting average of .650 with 13 hits in 20 trips to the plate.
