so much that Rhody coach Jeff Tootell conceded defeat early. He re-fused to double his ace Bob Black in the mile and two mile, sending longer run

But though the Rams' Thin Man tried valiantly, opening with a 4:35 first mile, he had no stamina at the end and coasted home in 9:37, eight seconds above the record. He beat Fred Schoeffler of Tufts by 60 years.

First inkling that Bowdoin was on its way today came with sopho-more Don Murphy's surprising vic-tory in the 120 high hurdles. The Providence boy, running with beau-tiful form, beat Eastern champion tiful form, beat Eastern champion Irving Meeker of Middlebury by two yards while Dick Palmieri of BU was right at Meeker's shoulder. Then the host team began to pile points up in the muscle field. Sopho-

more Bill Seffens won the javelin with his 198 feet, 3½ inch toss in yesterday's trials. A steady head wind prevented his onslaught on the record today.

John Sebasteanski, who had
been fifth in the hammer trials
yesterday, uncorked a pressure
pitch of 165-8% to squeeze by
Tech's John Adams by threeeighths of an inch. And finally Bill Nicholson, burly

blond senior from Dorchester, came blond senior from Dorchester, came through with a crucial double win in the shot put and discus. To do it the 207 pound athlete put the shot 47 feet 3¼ inches, the best effort of his career, and then he capitalized on his qualifying heave in the discus of 138, 10½ for victory

in the discus of 188, 104 for victory in that event.

So now the fight was strictly for second place. Holy Cross won by scooping seven points in the final event, the 220-yard dash. Captain Billy Gould successfully defended his title in this sprint while teammate Dan Kelley was getting a third. No records were broken. Nichol-

Muscling their way to four But this was a tight and interesting victories in the weight events, meet in the running events. Among the individual standouts was B. C Captain Irving Howe who sprinted madly down the stretch of the 440 despite a pulled muscle to retain his title.

Tech's At Dell Isola broke on top in this quarter mile but Howe nailed him at the turn to the stretch. Then the Purple's Dan Kelley challenged Howe and they were side by side for 50 yards before Irving spurted at the tape. Time was 49.4 seconds

Another great race was the 880 with Tech's Ed Olney defending his crown. Ed had to catch Williams' Kevin Delaney at the tail of the backstretch but then he drove on to win by one and one half yards.

However, Delaney ran his best nowever, Delaney ran his best race earlier in the mile. This crowded field saw Holy Cross' Dick Ahern and Rhody's Larry McLay collide before the first turn. Ahern went down; McLay suffered spike Ahern got up to finish fourth but

McLay was carried off and required several stitches in his right leg. Tech's Carol Belton worried leader Delaney for half a mile, then took the lead on the third lap. However, Delaney roared back on the final backstretch, got up to win by 22 yards over B. U.'s Dick Fitzgerald who ran down Belton in the final

15 yards. Northeastern got 11 points from two men. Sophomore Sal Mazzocca two men. Sophomore Sal Mazzocca won the high jump at six feet and was second behind B. U.'s Cort Ellis in the broad jump. And Dante Montuori, the sad-faced rookie from N. U., managed to get second place behind Nicholson in the shotput.
