

Victories in Weight Events Decisive; Holy Cross 2d; R. I., B. U. Tied for 3d

BRUNSWICK, Me., May 20—Little Johnny Magee, 38-year veteran of coaching here at Bowdoin, stood among his Polar Bear giants this afternoon and chuckled at the wreck they'd made of the 63d New England intercollegiate track meet.

Muscling their way to four victories in the weight events, the men of Magee soundly trounced 20 other college teams in a major upset.

Bowdoin's strong boys totaled 282.7 points (20 of them from the discus, shotput, hammer and javelin). Holy Cross limped into second place with 20 points. Favored R. I. State was tied with B. U. for third at 15.5-7 while M. I. T., Connecticut and Northeastern followed in that order.

But this was a tight and interesting meet in the running events. Among the individual standouts was B. C. Captain Irving Howe who sprinted madly down the stretch of the 440 despite a pulled muscle to retain his title.

Tech's Al Dell Isola broke on top in this quarter mile but Howe nailed him at the turn to the stretch. Then the Purple's Dan Kelley challenged Howe and they were side by side for 50 yards before Irving spurred at the tape. Time was 49.4 seconds.

Spill Mars Mile

Another great race was the 880 with Tech's Ed Olney defending his crown. Ed had to catch Williams' Kevin Delaney at the tail of the backstretch but then he drove on to win by one and one half yards. Providence's Bill Sherry caught Delaney at the line as Kevin quit too soon.

However, Delaney ran his best race earlier in the mile. This crowded field saw Holy Cross' Dick Ahern and Rhody's Larry McLay collide before the first turn. Ahern went down; McLay suffered spike wounds.

Ahern got up to finish fourth but McLay was carried off and required several stitches in his right leg.

Tech's Carol Belton worried leader Delaney for half a mile, then took the lead on the third lap. However, Delaney roared back on the final backstretch, got up to win by 22 yards over B. U.'s Dick Fitzgerald who ran down Belton in the final 15 yards.

Northeastern got 11 points from two men. Sophomore Sal Mazzocco won the high jump at six feet and was second behind B. U.'s Cort Ellis in the broad jump. And Dante Montuori, the sad-faced rookie from N. U., managed to get second place behind Nicholson in the shotput.

Only one of the six defending champions failed to retain his crown. That was Don Mullen of New Hampshire who was out of the money in the hammer. Besides Gould in the 220, Black in the two-mile, Howe in the quarter and Olney in the 880, the other two-time champ was Art Sherman, Rhody's fine pole vaulter.

Sherman left Jose Barbosa, Roy Brain and Hank Langevin at 12 feet in the vault. He still wore his sweat shirt and hadn't missed a jump at 13. But when he tried to erase Boo Morcom's meet record of 14 feet, he failed at 14-1 on three tries.

The 100-yard dash went to Connecticut's Carlos Fetterolf. Yankee champion and All-America soccer player. A burly, driving runner, Carlos beat Gould by one foot as he ran him down in the last 15 feet.

Barrage Stuns Foe

The barrage of points from Bowdoin's field men stunned opponents so much that Rhody coach Jeff Tootell conceded defeat early. He refused to double his ace Bob Black in the mile and two mile, sending him out for the meet record in the longer run.

But though the Rams' Thin Man tried valiantly, opening with a 4.33 first mile, he had no stamina at the end and coasted home in 9:37, eight seconds above the record. He beat Fred Schoeffler of Tufts by 60 yards, however.

First inkling that Bowdoin was on its way today came with sophomore Don Murphy's surprising victory in the 120 high hurdles. The Providence boy, running with beautiful form, beat Eastern champion Irving Meeker of Middlebury by two yards while Dick Palmieri of BU was right at Meeker's shoulder.

Then the host team began to pile points up in the muscle field. Sophomore Bill Seffens won the javelin with his 198 feet, 3 1/2 inch toss in yesterday's trials. A steady head wind prevented his onslaught on the record today.

John Sebastianski, who had been fifth in the hammer trials yesterday, uncorked a pressure pitch of 165-8 3/4 to squeeze by Tech's John Adams by three-eighths of an inch.

And finally Bill Nicholson, burly blond senior from Dorchester, came through with a crucial double win in the shot put and discus. To do it, the 207 pound athlete put the shot 47 feet 3 3/4 inches, the best effort of his career, and then he capitalized on his qualifying heave in the discus of 138, 10 1/4 for victory in that event.

So now the fight was strictly for second place. Holy Cross won by scooping seven points in the final event, the 220-yard dash. Captain Billy Gould successfully defended his title in this sprint while teammate Dan Kelley was getting a third.

No records were broken. Nicholson was the only double winner.
