A four-man mob from Tufts stood off 23 rival squads to retain its New England I. C. team championship after a comfortable raid at Briggs Field, Cambridge, yesterday. It was a numerical miracle. Jack Goldberg, Bob Jones, Andy Howitt and Clayt Williamson scored all 26 1/2 points.

Between them the two pre-med students, Jones of Brockton and Goldberg of Dorchester, harvested 22 points . . . or enough to have tied the entire Brown team, which was runnerup.

It was reminiscent of the days of the famous Tiny Tim A. C. at Tufts, when Ed Dugger, Walter Hall and Bill Atkinson performed such singular deeds for Coach Ding Dussault.

Goldberg, 6ft. 2in., 172-pound Boston Latin alumnus, who fell asleep over his German text while studying for an exam the night before, scored a fast hurdles double in 14.8s. for the highs and a record 23.4s. for the lows.

### Jones Scored 12 Points

Jones, a 5-foot-11, 160-pound work horse, scored 12 points in four events, doing as much racing across the grass to reach the scene of his various activities as he did on the track. He jumped Gerry Ferrara of Rhode Island to a 6ft. 2in. tie in the high jump, sprinted into second place in the 100, leaped to second in the broad jump, and then shored up the winning margin in the low hurdles, next-to-last event, by finishing third.

Andy Howitt ran a solid second behind accomplice Goldberg in the high hurdles, and Williams picked off 1 1/2 points in the vault.

Boston University, pre-meet favorite, collapsed to finish fourth behind Tufts, Brown, and Rhode Island (20 1/2) with 18 points. B. U.'s bouncy little distance boy, Johnny Kelley, failed to finish either the mile or two-mile races. He would have had to score an impossible double, as it turned out, for B. U. to win the team championship from Tufts.

The afternoon, fair with a slight following wind for the sprints and hurdles, produced a riot of racing.

George West, a biology major from Middlebury's junior class, via Newton Centre, scored an impressive 100-200 sprint double in 10s (by 5 1/2 feet over Tufts' Jones) and 21.3s, a record which was disallowed due to a lively puff or two of wind during the long sprint. Two unofficial watches caught him in 21 seconds, flat.

Both the 440 and 880 were implausibly close. Dud O'Leary of B. U. won the quarter by inches from Mel Holland of Brown in 49s. O'Leary forged the pace all the way, went "dead" 40 yards from the tape and grimly fought off Holland from there in.

### Fourth Straight for M. I. T.

The half mile was roughly patterned the same. Jack Wathen of Maine, via Watertown, was on top going to the final curve, when M. I. T.'s Charles Vickers pulled the cork on a sprint, burst into a 3 1/2-lead into the home stretch. Then Wathen responded, drove to Vickers'

## Iowa Freshman Beats McEwen First Time as College Two-Miler

EVANSTON, Ill., May 24 (AP)—Don McEwen of Michigan, champion two-miler of the Western Conference, today was defeated for the first time in his collegiate career.

Rich Ferguson, Iowa freshman, defeated McEwen in the two-mile event, beating him in a stirring stretch burst by six yards. McEwen, off in front, set the pace until Ferguson moved up from last place.

The event was run under rain-soaked conditions in a triangular meet in which Michigan piled up 85 1/2 points to 62 1/2 for Iowa and 13 for Northwestern.

It was the fourth straight year an M. I. T. entry has bagged this title for Oscar Hedlund. Runnerup a year ago, Vickers is an electrical engineering senior from Cambridge, N. Y.

The canny veteran, Walt Molineaux of Brown, not yet in his best racing condition, outmaneuvered the milers easily in 4m, 22s.

While B. U.'s young Kelley fretted at the shoulder of pace-maker Christian Lohner of Providence in 62.9s and 2:08.6 to the quarter and half, Molineaux laid carefully back. Kelley stormed ahead to lead at three-quarters in 3:20.5, but yielded passively when Molineaux blazed past him on the backstretch. Dick Ollen, Northeastern, injected a lot of sail to finish a driving second.

A Northeastern sophomore from Dedham, Ed Shea, ran a Phi Beta Kappa race in the two miles, slipping past Tech's Bill Nicholson on the pole lane coming into the home stretch and sailing away to a 14-yard win in 9:29.7. Shea paced himself superbly, had an enormous sprint left.

Wesleyan's freshmen medley relay upset B. U.'s kids and broke the record with a 3:34.2 performance, despite a 1.55 half-mile leg by Billy Smith of the Toy Terriers. Best varsity performances afield were Sal (Northeastern) Mazzecca's new Briggs Field record of 23-8 1/2 in the broad jump, Cliff (B. U.) Blair's 179-11 1/2 hammer toss (he fouled one record throw of 189 feet), and a 13ft. 6in. pole vault effort by Bob Linne of Rhode Island.

Friday's trial performances won the shotput (49.9) by Bob Sweeney, Brown; javelin (182-10 1/2) by Norman Steere, Brown; and discus (143-5 1/4) by Jim Low, Boston College.

It is of no consolation to the brethren to know that Tufts' Four-Man Mob will be back intact next year at Brown's Stadium.
