

Wins Both 100, 220 as Terriers Top Springfield by 37 Points

LEWISTON, Me., May 21—Boston U.'s celebrated cripples cavorted like health addicts on Bates' lushly groomed field today, rolling up their opposition like a rug in defending the N. E. college track title with 55½ points.

The terrific Terriers bagged six individual titles, none of which gave them a bigger lift than Bill Shearer's sprint double.

The junior from New Haven, coming off a February muscle pull and putting the pressure on for the first time, brought down a 39-year-old record in the 100 with a 9.7s which was disallowed on a skimpy "handkerchief test" by Referee Larry Johnson.

The B. U. sprinter came back to spring even with the 21.4s mark for the 220. The 191-pound Shearer had tremendous lifts in both races. He exploded from fourth position at 85 yards to outdrive "Sleeper" Clay Bywaters, Springfield senior from Baltimore who had never sprinted in competition until last season.

Beat Miller in 200

The B. U. defender faced up to the 220 challenge offered by Northeastern's unbeaten sophomore, Charlie Miller of Lowell, and overpowered him by 2½ yards in a fine finishing drive.

Despite the fact the eight-mile wind was quarterly, from the southwest, and obviously neither helped nor hindered the 100 finalists, Referee Johnson ruled Shearer's 9.7s record out through the agency of a suspended pocket handkerchief—a slightly outmoded method of determining wind velocity.

Dr. Lloyd Lux, Bates A. D. and meet director, checked the local airport for wind velocity and direction at race time and the report coincided with this agent's belief at the time—the breeze was quarterly and of neither help nor hindrance.

It marked the sixth time since Andy Kelly of Holy Cross made the 9.8s in 1916 that the record had been broken and disallowed.

Coach Doug Raymond's Cherry Shirts won not only the sprints, but the discus with Nat Baker, Providence junior; the broad jump with Bostonian Barney Bruce, who added it to his indoor IC4-A gold medal; George Terry, who set his own pace and won a 9.40 two miles by 55 yards from "Squeaky" Horn of Massachusetts; and Bruce Hecock, who vaulted 13-5-5-8 inches to dominate his field.

Additional contributions came from Hecock's second in the high jump, Dick Bates' second in the shotput Billy Smith's 1:54.7 and novice Fred Dunbury's 1:54.9 for two-three in the 880, third places in the hammer and javelin by Baker and Ed Allen, fourths in the discus and 100 by Bates and Lloyd Bell, and Jose Barbosa's tie for fifth in the vault.

The B. U. kids got a big charge out of Dunbury, a Marine veteran from Buzzard's Bay, 6ft. 3in. strongboy who had never raced until this year, and they were rooting for the expectant pappy

Barbosa to hit his true form, 13 feet, in the vault—but he was a too keyed up by the prospect of momentary fatherhood.

The only clearcut record efforts were Shearer's 21.4s to equal the 220 mark and the 184ft. 10¼in. hammer heave of Friday's trials by 6-3, 220-pound senior Don Seifert of Brown.

For me, Shearer's 9.7s was as honest as a Salvation Army lass. The day before he had raced 9.8s in the trials, against the wind. He has been the class of N. E. sprinters since he was a freshman.

The major form upset was perpetrated by Tom Hart, a Middlebury "sleeper" who walked up to the high jumper and beat the favored, but knee-kinky Hecock of B. U. with a magnificent 6-4½ jump.

Big Lew Thorgersen of Wesleyan had a fading run in the 880, where last year he set an all-time N. E. college mark of 1:51.5, but made it by seven yards over Wee Willie Smith, B. U., in a good 1:52.9. It was the meet's second-fastest run ever.

The 6-3 art-history major, however, did not go for a double in the mile, which Paul Murphy, Holy Cross senior from Marblehead, won with his best effort, a 4:18.3 run. Murph, 6-2, 145 pounds, set his own pace and made it crisp enough so that he was well ahead of the big finishing bang put on by Sture Bengston of M. I. T.

Converted Sprinter Wins 440

The "grab bag" 440 fell to a converted sprinter, Bob Behr of Williams, via Wellesley Hills. This senior who'd scored in the sprints a year ago, went up in distance because of a gimpy leg, drove far ahead of his field at the 220 post, and came flying home in control of his race by five yards on Doug

Faye of host Bates. Faye, from Milton, scored the host college's only points. Third, Northeastern sophomore Bob Hefford, out of Melrose, lost his first race of the season.

The hedgehopping events went close to form. Warren Lattof, 6-3 M. I. T. senior from Arlington Heights, Ill., hurdled faultlessly in a 14.8s high hurdles final, scoring by three yards on Maine's Bill Calkin, Lattof was defending and this was the final race of his career.

The low hurdles were bagged by Dave Settele, aggressive racing Northeastern sophomore from Weymouth. Settele, hitting the fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth hurdles in the highs, bounced back like a champion to flee over the 220 lows in the remarkable time of 23.6s.

Another notable effort was unprecedented three-year sweep of the shotput by Kazar Apkarian of Rhode Island, at 51ft. 1in.

But the B. U. boys were the boss men of the day. Their 55½ points has been exceeded as a total only once since 1918. Shearer, Hescoek and Bruce came here recovering from leg injuries, and Smitty had been having trouble with a balky appendix. But they poured on the coal and left the place in cinders.

And Bates, host for the first time since '31, put on a marvelous meet, under warm and sunny skies, and a bow at this point to Dr. Lux. It was just what the doctor ordered.

Belmont Hill Crews in Three-Race Sweep

Belmont Hill swept all three crew races against St. Mark's on the Charles River yesterday. It was the first regatta win for Belmont Hill this season.

The first boat won by two lengths in two minutes, 44.5 seconds. The second boat won by one length and the third by two lengths.
