Northeastern JC — 6994 points**

Dennis Miller of Northeastern JC of Sterling, Colorado, won the 1976 NJCAA Decathlon title at Pasadena, Texas.

Miller took the lead after the high jump when he tied Ed Rice of North Idaho at 6'6" for first. He turned in solid performances in every event to slowly pull ahead. Miller set a new first day point mark of 3586 and went on to exceed John Cecil of Brevard (N.C.)'s record by 454 points.

Last year's first day record holder, Danny Curtis of Phoenix, also went over his record of 3399, but held second behind Miller.

The second day belonged to Miller and Keith Fritz of Catonsville, the eventual runner-up. Fritz was fourth in 1975 with a second day record of 3398 and set a new mark of 3411 with strong efforts in the hurdles (new record of 15.0); the pole vault and 1500 meters.

Good-looking newcomer, Brad Gronli of Willmar was strong in all running events, setting a new mark of 49.4 in the 400 meters plus good efforts in the 100 and 1500.

All throwing event records fell. Admittedly the weakest of the standards, all three fell by good margins. Wes Herbst of Mesa took both the shot and discus with marks of 42'11½" and 135'11" respectively, and Bill Baker of Florissant Valley had three throws over the javelin record topped with a 205'11". The top six all bettered the discus record, and Paul Dubyoski of Harford had a throw of 202'3½" in the spear.

As usual, the pole vault had a major effect on the outcome. Fritz stood at only ninth after the discus despite his hurdles mark, but won the vault at 14'3¼" for 896 points to move into second, while Dubyoski dropped from fourth to tenth on a 8'0½" vault.

Essex Upstages Mesa to Grab NJCAA Title

Essex coach Russ Rogers, boasting of the best over-all team he's had in his eight years at the New Jersey school, felt that nothing short of an off-the-track disaster would keep his boys from keeping their date with destiny this year.

It almost happened.

En route to the 25th annual National Junior College championships at San Jacinto Junior College, a car carrying six of Essex' top athletes came within inches of being rear-ended after an abrupt stop at a traffic light.

The Wolverines found nothing but green lights on the track, however, and pulled out all stops to rush to a lopsided victory in the national classic. They prevented three-time defending champion Mesa of Arizona from gaining a record-tying fourth consecutive title.

Essex scored a staggering 69 points during Saturday night's action after bringing only nine team points in after the first two days' activities.

Sprinter Colin Bradford took first in the 220, second in the 100 and boosted the sprint and mile relay teams to victory for a total of 23 individual points — highest among the more than 600 contestants in the meet.

It was somewhat of a moral victory also for Rogers' bunch, second-place finishers the last three years.

Dade-North suffered a key setback in the 400 intermediate hurdles when Richard Johnson, who brought the second-best qualifying time (53.9) into the finals, was scratched for jumping the gun.

Blinn College's Daniel Stagg breezed to a 51.8 victory in the event.

Earl Hunter of Essex finished a strong second as the New Jersey team began its relentless upsurge in the point standings.

Hunter's second-place finish, coupled with Maxwell Peters' and Mike Nipinak's 2-4 finish in the triple jump, combined with a 3-6 finish by Joe Coombs and Charles Hedlam in the 400 meters to push Essex past Miami Dade into the lead with 46 points. Meanwhile, Mesa continued to take the individual accolades.

Stocky Kenny McClendon, whose second-place finish in the triple jump last year provided Mesa with its third consecutive national title, leaped to a national record 51-10½ to win the event.

Lawrence Johnson raced to a thrilling victory in the 400 meters — the most talent-laden individual event of the night — by coming from five yards back to nip Coombs and Southwestern Michigan's Carrol Caston at the wire.

Those two first-place finishes enabled the Thunderbirds to move into second with 38 points, but Essex bounced back with its biggest coup of the night one event later when Bradford burst into victory in the 200 meters and got a fifthplace finish from teammate Tony Husbands.

Gideon Terer, the Kenyan half-miler for the New Jersey team, added a 1:50.04 victory in the 800 meters to put it out of reach for Essex.

2. Losers of Games 1 and 2 would play in Game 8. The winner of Game 8 would be required to play two games in one day.
3. Under this new plan there would be no need for a coin flip to determine who receives the bye when three teams remain in contention. The final team to remain undefeated (Winner of Game 13) would automatically receive the bye and advance to Game 19.
4. All games would be played on the championship field.
5. There will be NO PRACTICE on the official field for any team prior to the tournament.
6. Because of the no practice situation, participating teams would not have to arrive in Grand Junction until Friday in order to attend the Friday night banquet. This would help reduce team expenses.
7. The tournament would have to be extended one extra day over the current plan.
8. Two extra teams would have to divide current travel allowances of \$10,000 provided by Professional Baseball. The possibility exists that additional funds might be obtained from Professional Baseball to accommodate the extra two teams.
9. Additional per diem and game expenses will be incurred by Grand Junction. This would be approximately \$1000-\$1200.
10. There would be additional gate receipts generated by the one extra playing date.
11. The pre-tournament coaches and officials breakfast would be eliminated.
12. Grand Junction would desire a new five year contract to extend thru the 1981 NJCAA Baseball Tournament. Currently we split the profits 50-50 with the Grand Junction Committee. In the event profits would diminish because of this new format, a slight adjustment in this formula might be necessary.
