DENISON University's able and agile thinclads rule the Ohio Conference track roost today after a solid triumph over nine other colleges in the third annual running of the indoor classic Saturday afternoon at the beautiful DU fieldhouse. Coach Jack Carl's Big Red rolled up 62 points to outdistance their formidable arch foe, Ohio Weslevan. The

Individual star of the meet was the Big Red's nonpareil hurdler, Ames, who garnered 10 points by winning both hurdling events. Both Denison and Wesleyan copped four "firsts" and shared in a fifth blue ribbon, but Denison's greater depth paid off handsomely. Wooster delimed to the control of the co ly. Wooster claimed two "firsts," Muskingum another, and Capital shared top honors in the high jump with the Big Red and the Bishops. Jim Donley Stars Besides Ames' twin wins in the hurdles, and Billingsley's triumph in the 55-yard dash, the Redmen snared the bunting in the 880, thanks to some superlative striding by frosh flash Jim Donley, who ran a near perfect race. And the incomparable Don DeJong, only recently released from basketball duty, casually picked up his spikes after a week's practice to share in a three-way tie for first in the high jump. The versatile young giant also picked up important points in the shot put.
Three Conference records toppled and another was equalled on DU's fast, perfectly-conditioned indoor arena. Wesleyan's fine dash man, Chuck Beckley, broke his own mark in the 440, negotiating the distance in 52.3 seconds. The Bishops' flying mile-relay team cracked its own record with a 3:36.-6 performance; Jack Hayward of Wooster bettered his own figure in
